A View from the Pew

Some thoughts on sharing the Good News--- Life Saving Service---



I recently heard this parable for a third time and note it is an illustration of the decay of an organization's purpose and goals with the passage of time. The story portrays potential dangers churches may experience and the resultant impact upon the spiritual life of congregations.

The United States Life-Saving Service was a United States government agency that grew out of private and local humanitarian efforts to save the lives of shipwrecked mariners and passengers. It began in 1848 and ultimately merged with the Revenue Cutter Service to form the United States Coast Guard in 1915.

On a dangerous seacoast notorious for shipwrecks, there began a crude little lifesaving station. The station was merely a hut with only one boat but, the few devoted members kept a constant watch over the turbulent sea. With little thought for themselves, they ventured out day and night tirelessly searching for those in danger as well as the lost. Many lives were saved by the group's courageous team of rescuers.

Some who were saved as well as others along the seacoast become associated with this little station. They willingly gave their time, energy and money in support of its objectives. New boats were purchased and new crews trained. The small station that was once obscure, crude and virtually insignificant began to grow. In time, some members became unhappy complaining that the hut was unattractive and poorly equipped. Thus, they began to "upgrade" furnishing as they felt a more comfortable place should be provided. Emergency cots were replaced with lovely furniture. Rough, hand-made equipment was discarded and sophisticated, classy systems were installed. The hut, of course, had to be torn down to make room for all the additional equipment, furniture, systems, and appointments. By its completion, the life-saving station had become a popular gathering place, and its objectives had begun to shift. It was now used as sort of a clubhouse, an attractive building for public gatherings. Saving lives, feeding the hungry, strengthening the fearful, and calming the disturbed rarely occurred by now.

Fewer members were now interested in braving the sea on lifesaving missions, so they hired professional lifeboat crews to do this work. The original goal of the station was not altogether forgotten, however. The lifesaving motifs still prevailed in the club's decorations. In fact, there was a liturgical lifeboat preserved in the *Room of Sweet Memories* with soft, indirect lighting, which helped hide the layer of dust upon the once-used vessel.

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About this time, a large ship was wrecked off the coast and the boat crews brought in loads of cold, wet, half-drowned people. They were dirty, some terribly sick and lonely. Others were "different" from the majority of the club members. The beautiful new club suddenly became messy and cluttered. A special committee saw to it that a shower house was immediately built *outside* and *away from* the club, so victims of shipwreck could be cleaned up *before* being allowed inside.

The next meeting brought contention with strong words and angry feelings resulting in a division among members. Most of the people wanted to stop the club's lifesaving activities and all involvements with shipwreck victims. "It's too unpleasant, it's a hindrance to our social life, and it's opening the door to folks who are not *our kind*". As you would expect, some still insisted upon saving lives, that this was their primary objective—that their only reason for existence was ministering to *anyone* needing help regardless of their club's beauty or size or decorations. They were voted down and told if they wanted to save the lives of various kinds of shipwrecked people, they could begin their own lifesaving station down the coast! They did.

As years passed, the new station experienced the same old changes. It evolved into another club and yet another lifesaving station was formed pursuant to the original goal of saving lives. History continued to repeat itself and if you visit that coast today, you will find a large number of exclusive, impressive clubs along the shoreline owned and operated by those who have lost all involvement with the saving of lives.

My brothers and Sisters in Christ, you are operating a life station here in St. Mary's County. The lifesaving you are offering is salvation from eternal hell. There are shipwrecks around each of us each day and we are called to respond. When is the last time you told anyone about Christ's lifesaving promise? May St. Paul's never become complacent to our calling as they did along the seacoast.

col 4:2-6 NIV ² Devote yourselves to prayer, being watchful and thankful. ³ And pray for us, too, that God may open a door for our message, so that we may proclaim the mystery of Christ, for which I am in chains. ⁴ Pray that I may proclaim it clearly, as I should. ⁵ Be wise in the way you act toward outsiders; make the most of every opportunity. ⁶ Let your conversation be always full of grace, seasoned with salt, so that you may know how to answer everyone. Stewardship

Do you have a "got to" or "get to" attitude?

As the Apostle Paul traveled to churches, he collected offerings for the Christians in Jerusalem who were experiencing hard economic times. When Paul was speaking to the Corinthians, he used the Macedonian believers as an example of people who, in spite of their own economic troubles, gave joyfully to the people in Jerusalem. The Macedonians' love for Christ and their concern for their fellow believers moved them to give beyond their ability. The Macedonians gave themselves first to the Lord, and then, Paul said, they "urgently pleaded with us for the privilege of sharing in this service to the saints" (2 Corinthians 8:4). In Christ, they saw their giving as an *opportunity* to help other believers in need.

Does someone who views giving as an obligation plead for the opportunity to give more? Probably not. When giving is an obligation, we will give, but giving as an obligation will not give us the joy or the attitude of pleading for the privilege to give that the Macedonians had. As God's people, we have both an **obligation** and an **opportunity**. Scripture is clear that we are called to give. Paul said, "On the first day of the week, each one of you should set aside a sum of money in keeping with his income, saving it up, so that when I come no collections will have to be made" (1 Corinthians 16:2). Giving is an **obligation**, but, just as God changed the hearts and minds of the Macedonian people, He changes us so our attitude toward giving can change from being an **obligation** to an **opportunity**. As renewed and changed people, our attitude toward giving changes form a "got to" to a "get to" attitude. We stop giving grudgingly, and we start giving willingly and cheerfully. We want to give, because giving is an expression of our love and gratitude to God for who He is and what He does for us through His Son, Jesus.

So what opportunities to serve God are calling to your heart? What opportunities can you get involved with here at St. Paul's that would cause you to "urgently plead for more of the privilege to share?" I believe that the Vacation Bible school staff, even though very tired after the long week, were all very sad that the opportunity to share God's word was over. Many of you find great joy in keeping the church and church grounds clean tidy. I have seen the heartwarming look on many faces in the congregation when you know that you have helped support different mission projects or by simply volunteering to put up the church Christmas tree. The more we give of ourselves and our gifts, the closer our relationship with Christ becomes, and the more we want to give, and the more God blesses us which only further enables our continued giving. "You will be made rich in every way so that you can be generous on every occasion, and through us your generosity will result in thanksgiving to God" (2 Corinthians 9:11). So as I have in the past, I want to encourage you to step up and take hold of the opportunity that God calls you to serve in. I call you to be a part of the greatest thanksgiving to God. Join the Bible study, volunteer to teach Sunday school, cut the grass at the church, attend the next Men's Prayer Breakfast, join the church Altar Guild, ask how you can participate in the next mission project or make a special donation to the Altar Paraments Fund. Whichever opportunity you take hold of, remember the Macedonians and start the processes of changing your "got to" attitude to a "get to" attitude. Think about it, by serving in an area that you are passionate about, we "get to" enjoy the task and praise God! What an amazing privilege.

Jesus said, "Freely you have received, freely give" (Matthew 10:8). By grace, God enables our giving and, as He strengthens our faith and changes our hearts, we can generously give our time and our talents. We thank God that he fills us daily with His love so that we as members of His Church here on earth see giving as a *privilege* and an *opportunity* to praise and thank Him.

"You were the first to not only give but also to have the desire to do so. Now finish the work, so that your eager willingness to do it may be matched by your completion of it, according to your means."
