The Manzanero family members were devout Catholics who were brought up in the tradition of image worship. ## Rain, Floods and Winds <br> Challenge Church Construction

Excerpts condensed from monthly reports by MPI layman Reyman Salazar, working along Mexico's south coast near Guatemala.


March 2003 - So far I have 10 interests in the town of Morelos. The new believers are so eager to have a house of worship that one man donated land, we've raised $\$ 15,000$ pesos [ $\$ 1,500$ dollars], and have begun construction. The walls are $11 / 2$ meters high, but we ran out of money. We need another $\$ 15,000$ pesos to finish the walls and roof, and hope to raise $\$ 5,000$ pesos by visiting believers in other towns. We would be grateful if MPI could help us with $\$ 10,000$ pesos. We could also use Bibles and literature for evangelism so our little group can grow.

July 2003 - Thank you for the Bibles and literature. We now have 35 interests tightly squeezed in a private home to worship. The walls of our church building are two meters high. I kindly remind you of our need for funds to finish our house of worship.

Sept. 2003 - Four more people have made their decision to follow Jesus this month and plan to be baptized. The Devil isn't happy. Twice this month heavy rains flooded
 our house, washing away our clothes, shoes and kitchen utensils. We are grateful to be alive.

Nov. 2003 - I am still preaching, but continue encountering obstacles. Strong winds blew the roof off our house, and knocked down one wall of our new church. We need finan-
 cial assistance to finish this church! We made a temporary shelter inside the new church for our meetings - our group continues growing and we don't fit in the house any more.

Jan. 2004 - We received funding sent by MPI, and the believers are working hard to finish our new house of worship! Two more people were baptized this month.

Sept. 2004 - Our church is completed and we have trained 20 new believers, who are actively involved in outreach in three nearby communities. We need many more Bibles, study guides and literature. Soon we will need more new church buildings! The new believers send their greetings and express gratefulness to MPI.

We also contacted Mr. Ed Mackenzie. The decision was made; the only problem was the money. Through generous donations from Ed Mackenzie and MPI, with the hospital agreeing to put in the rest, the deal was made.

On December $17^{\text {th }}, 2004$, we were able to go down to Belize City and drive back to the hospital the brand new 2005 Christmas gift for La Loma Luz Adventist Hospital. This was indeed a special gift to us. This vehicle is badly needed for special trips as well as for Outback Clinics to needy communities.

We wish to express our heartfelt thanks to all the MPI donors who so lovingly give to make dreams come through for us in third world countries. Your gifts of love will continue to touch many, many lives long after our work on earth is done. We take this opportunity to wish all the MPI family a Prosperous New Year ,and the entire La Loma Luz family sends our love and appreciation.
