Throughout the last six months, my constant refrain seems to have been, "Stay tuned!" Well, I'm continually encouraged by how many of you have indeed "stayed tuned" for the many adjustments necessary to survive and thrive amid a worldwide virus pandemic. Spring brought unprecedented school, church, and business closures that had some of us in a bit of a panic. Summer enticed us with beautiful weather that allowed many of us to get outdoors for exercise and limited travel, but event postponements and wide-spread festival cancellations kept us from enjoying the warmth and sunshine in quite the way we're accustomed to. Now this fall's "new normal" includes evolving school schedules and off-then-on sports seasons.
