A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR ROBERT.....

Brothers and sisters in Christ,

As I write this our national gun debate has once again been ignited in the wake of yet another deeply tragic school shooting. It is sad that we live in a world where these kind of senseless acts of destruction occur, but alas here we are. So as the debates once again ignite regarding possible solutions as to how we can prevent incidents such as this in the future, I would like to make a suggestion; As we look forward and attempt to create a safer world for the next generation can we please remember that we are all in this together, and at least try to remain civil. Every time this topic comes up people instantly go into attack mode against those they disagree with thus closing their minds down to any sort of honest and open discussion. If we actually care about the future generations of our country then we must be willing to put our ego in check and actually try and listen to what those who disagree with us are saying, rather than simply attacking their views.

I was twenty two years old when thirteen people were killed at Columbine high school in 1999. I remember how deeply rattled that left my friends and I as we continued to talk about it months after the incident. Ten years later I remember reading the book Columbine by Dave Cullen in the wake of the Amish school shooting in Pennsylvania just north of where Patrice and I lived at the time and the Virginia Tech shooting just south of where we lived. Then a couple of short years later in 2012 there was the Sandy Hook shooting where 20 children, around the same age as our daughter Clara at the time, were mercilessly gunned down. Now this year almost twenty years after Columbine another 17 people were killed in a tragic school shooting.

School shootings are just the tip of the iceberg regarding the real problems regarding violence in our country yet they are the ones that make the headlines. It is important to note that in general gun related homicides are down from where they were in 1999 when the events of Columbine took place, even though there are more guns per capita disbursed throughout the US. This leads me to think that the problem our country faces in regards to how to prevent future mass murders, and other types of violence, goes beyond the gun control debates. Personally the more I think about this the more my mind keeps returning to the parable of the Sheep and the

Goats in the Gospel according to Matthew (25:31-46). In this passage Jesus tells his followers that when they clothe, feed, and generally care for those in need, they care for him and when they do not do these things then they have not cared for him. Thus who in our society has been abandoned, who have we neglected, and how is that related to these public acts of aggression that plague our country?

Not all people who commit mass murders are mentally ill but the topic of mental illness is important to this discussion. Since the 1980s year after year mental health services have been slashed on the state and federal levels. As a result thousands of people needing care have been literally thrown out onto the streets, as mental health hospitals were forced to close, with little or no resources to deal with whatever mental issues they may have. Subsequently many of these people find themselves in jail for one reason or another where the staff are ill prepared to deal with complexities of these people's conditions. Meanwhile those dealing with mental conditions that are able to be kept in check through medication are forced to deal with the rising costs of medication causing those medications to go out of reach for some leading many to self-medicate through the use of illegal substances.

If this wasn't depressing enough, the only time our nation talks about the problem with how we deal with mental health is when a mass shooting occurs. This is extremely unfair to those suffering from mental illnesses because the vast majority of them do not act out violently and on those rare occasions when they do it is usually toward themselves. Yet since the topic of mental illness only makes headlines after incidents like what just happened in Florida it perpetuates a stigma around mental illness pushing those who suffer further into the closet out of fear regarding how people will view them.

When you combine all of this with the fact that according to our latest statistics regarding the proliferation of guns throughout the US, which estimate that there are 88 guns per 100 people in private hands, leads me to believe that it is pretty easy for anyone to get their hands on a weapon in order to do damage to themselves or others. I don't know how any of this could be construed as caring for the "least of these" according the Gospel of Matthew and I believe that we as Christians can push our country to do better.
