INTRODUCTION TO SPANISH LINGUISTICS (SPAN-4320) Fall2018

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Overview: This is an introduction to linguistics in general but with a special focus on Spanish. We will look at how the Spanish language works and will also compare it to how languages work in general & to English in particular. We'll primarily learn about how sounds pattern in Spanish (phonetics/phonology), how Spanish words are formed (morphology), how words are combined to form Spanish sentences (syntax) and how words and sentences are assigned meanings (semantics, pragmatics). Also, we will briefly discuss how Spanish has changed over time. We will also consider how Spanish varies according to society norms and geographical region.

Student Learning Outcomes: At the end of this course, the student will be able to

1. express a better value, appreciation, and respect for the Spanish language, and language in general.

2. describe processes in the production/perception of Spanish in a more formal & systematic way

3. analyze Spanish data at various levels of structure (symbols, rules, notations, etc.) using linguistic concepts and notions discussed in class and the textbook

4. identify the major issues in modern Spanish linguistics and express opinions on them.

Text: -"Introducción a la lingüística hispánica" (by Hualde et al), 2nd ed. (2010).

Grading System: -Major evaluations: 3 tests: -Minor evaluations (hwk., quizzes, pops, orals,etc; in class/@home NOTE: You must earn a grade or C or higher to advance to the next course in the language.

Scale: 90-100 = A; 80-89.9 = B; 70-79..9 = C; 60-69.9 = D; 0-59.9 = F

Tests = 60%; Assignments (submit via Bb unless specified otherwise) = 15%.; quizzes: 25%.

<u>Expectations</u>: The following are the regular expectations for this class. Even if they are not included in the grading system, they might affect your grade significantly. I will assume you will comply with these. Failing to comply with these may cause a low grade, a failing grade, or being automatically dropped out of the course. -Regular attendance (check regular NGU policies regarding this and my policies below)

-Read before the class, review after the class, and practice/apply whatever is learned.

-Acceptable in-class conduct (respect for others, cooperation, reasonable participation, and the like)

-Constant homework (not necessarily for handing in but for your own practice)

NOTE: You are <u>required</u> to answer exercises in the chapter (in the textbook) covered in class. I recommend that you answer the page(s) corresponding to the content of each class after this class is given. By the end of the chapter, you need to hand in all the answers. -Cells off

-Arrive (and leave) on time (tardies may count against your attendance; and I CONSIDER CONSTANT TARDIES AS A SIGN OF DISRESPECT & DISINTEREST)

-Talk directly to the instructor first (or email him) regarding any doubts/problems/comments you have about anything related to this class.

-If you foresee that you may not comply with some of these expectations (or any other regulation for this course) at a certain point (for ex., you need to leave earlier), please, discuss about this with the instructor IN ADVANCE.

Incompletes or WPs: Do not consider 'I' or 'WP' as an option in the last weeks of the semester. Students who can not complete the work in the course on time or are seriously struggling otherwise must talk with the instructor and make arrangements at least three class weeks before the course ends.

Required Grade for Advancement: You must earn a C or better in any course in the Department of Modern Foreign Languages to advance to the next course.

<u>Attendance policy</u>: You are required to attend classes regularly. Even though there is no percentage of the grade directly assigned to attendance, you may be automatically dropped out of the class due to unjustified absences. If

you miss the equivalent to 2 weeks of classes, you may fail the course. You are responsible to keep track of your absences and tardies (3 tardies equals 1 unjustified absence).

Also, **pop quizzes** are possible. If any, they will be included in your grade system. Pop quizzes are not announced in advance. If you don't show up the day of the pop quiz, you simply miss that grade, unless you justify your absence with proper documentation (doctors' notice, hospital prescription, NGU authorized personnel letter, etc.). It'll be during the first 5 or 10 minutes of the class. Arriving after this will imply a zero in that quiz.

Please, follow these guidelines for your own success and for an appropriate dynamics in the class.

The final exam must be taken as specified by the University; otherwise, talk to me at least 2 weeks before. *Final note*: Students below the C grade range, especially by the middle of the term, may be required some other work. If this is your case, YOU ARE REQUIRED TO VISIT ME DURING MY OFFICE HOURS to find out about this extra work. Do not wait for me to initiate this conversation.

Also, any question or discussion out of class time regarding the class is to take place in my office (not in the halls or elsewhere).

Do not inform me about your need to get an A, B, C, etc, or your need to maintain a scholarship. This is something only you need to keep in mind during the course of the semester. My philosophy in this regard is: "I don't GIVE you a grade. You give YOURSELF a grade. You grade yourself by the type, level, and quality of your work and effort. I just formalize it in writing".
