

Jesus and the rich young man in Grace Church Chiangmai, Thailand

Sometimes when we read a Gospel passage, it is possible to pick up a certain atmosphere or feeling when we immerse ourselves into the world of Jesus and his followers.

The rich man presents himself in front of Jesus today and one can sense the enthusiasm from him. He wants to join the entourage of followers and become a disciple of Jesus. What must I do?', he asks. The fatal question you might say! He's going to get an answer that will move him from enthusiasm to great sadness. 'Sell everything you have, give to the poor and come follow me,' says Jesus. The famous phrase that knocked the stuffing out of the rich man. We might find a certain portion of this Gospel scene entertaining as the man leaves Jesus and goes back to his life of great wealth. But the teaching is quite profound. Jesus turns to his followers, who have witnessed this scene and tells them that those who leave everything behind to follow Jesus, will be repaid a hundred times over. This is in recognition of the many sacrifices the disciples have made to follow Jesus on his journey to Jerusalem.

don't play the Lotto but I know a lot of people who do. A recent jackpot in a part of the United States gave 800 million dollars to the winner. I'm not too sure what I'd do with it if I won, but 800 million dollars might be a step too far. It could very well be the ruination of me!!

There is nothing wrong with money as such, or even with being wealthy. Some of the world's greatest people who did most for the welfare of humanity, have been wealthy people. But at a deeper level the fact is that I own nothing and my hold on things is provisional, temporary. "There are no pockets in the shroud... and there is no hitch on the back of a hearse", are two sayings that come to mind!

Then there are some who give up everything to follow Jesus. He doesn't call everybody to do this. But being a follower of Jesus does mean having to leave something behind. It involves a change of priorities, a new way of valuing things. Those who leave everything to follow Jesus are among the most blessed of people, dedicated souls like Padre Pio, Mother Teresa of Calcutta, aid workers in places torn by war and disease, and many other unsung heroes. Such people are blessed with the riches of God's grace and bring much blessing to the lives of others.
