From the Pastor's Desk

Easter Greetings,

I am writing this during Holy week and on the second week of Spring. Yay!! There is something about Easter and Spring that renews our spirits and gives us hope. After days in this Lent season, it is good to remember Easter is coming and after long weeks of cold winter months, it is great to know that it is Spring season at last.

I once read a story about a teacher who overheard a conversation from her young students. Little Maria threw out the question: "Who loves God?" All of them responded, "I do! I do!" but Billy said, "I love Jesus." Kelly Protested, "But he died." Billy said, "Yea, but every year he raises from the dead!" Obviously, young Billy's understanding of the meaning of Easter is still developing. We know that Jesus died once and for all (Romans 6:10, Hebrews 10:12), and of course, rose from the dead once.
