


Indigenous Reconciliation Fund: Thanks to the federal inquiry known as the *Truth and Reconciliation Commission*, which took place between 2008 and 2015, we now have a better understanding of what happened to Indigenous people in our country. The Commission in question recorded the testimonies of hundreds of residential school survivors. This same Commission issued 94 calls to action in order to right the legacy of the residential schools and to promote a road to reconciliation in Canada. Some of these calls for action were specifically addressed to the Catholic Church.

It is long overdue for Canadian society and the Church to pay genuine attention to Indigenous people and their culture as well as the challenges they are facing. In recent decades, the Catholic Church has made efforts at reconciliation. It is now seeking to embark on a journey leading to reconciliation and solidarity.

During this Holy Week, let us pray to the Lord to help us move forward together towards healing and reconciliation.



Exploring our Faith

Bad Things, Good People – Doesn't Make Sense

Imagine you are one of the disciples sitting at the table during the Last Supper. As Jesus comes and takes his place at the table, things look like they do at every other Passover meal they have shared. There is nothing that would suggest that this would be the last meal they would share together as a group. Life can be, and often is, like that. Today doesn't look a whole lot different than yesterday and tomorrow will probably not look a whole lot different than today. Until it doesn't.

Things can change suddenly and without warning. A car accident can claim the life tomorrow of someone sitting at your table tonight. Devastating news can come to a loved one that will change their life and the life of the family forever. I can remember when our daughter was diagnosed with cancer. On Monday evening her and I were sitting on the couch at home watching the Canadiens game and Wednesday evening we were sitting in her room at the IWK after receiving her diagnosis. To say that we didn't see it coming was an under statement. But in fairness, Jesus tells us in the Passion reading we hear this week that darkness will have its hour in all our lives.

While most times we cannot control the circumstances creating the rough time we are going through, we can control how we react to it. I can remember lying in bed the night we received our daughter's diagnosis asking God why He would do this. Where is the sense or the fairness in a little girl one week away from her 12th birthday being diagnosed with cancer? Then I came to the realization that God did not do this. In my faith journey I have come to believe that God has no vested interest in seeing anyone suffer. Having said that, I have had many people say to me over the years (as I am sure you have), "God won't send you anything you can't handle." This has always perplexed me as I am trying to think of what bad thing I would do to one of my children just to see if they could handle it. I haven't been able to think of anything yet, but I will continue to try. Our daughter survived her fight with cancer. Sadly, some children do not. Does that mean that we were better equipped to "handle" what had come our way than some other families? Or that we were better people? Or prayed better? I don't think so, but I will be the first to say that I certainly do not have all the answers. All I can do is base my faith on what my experience of God has been. Why some people and families survive crises and others do not is a mystery that I don't think any of us can solve.

These times are hard, but they will pass

Now we can debate forever the eternal question of why bad things happen to good people but if we do, I think we are missing the point. Jesus was not spared hard times in his life so it would be foolish to think that we would be. One thing Jesus did know, as evidenced by his heart wrenching prayer in the garden, was that in all of what was happening, he was not alone; and neither are we. Jesus promises us that we are never alone. It doesn't get more comforting than that. To know that someone who has been through the tough times is now walking along side us to help us in our need. Fr. Henri Nouwen once said, *"It is foolish to think that someone can lead you out of the desert who has never been there themselves."*

I can say that I believe with all my being the saying, "Whatever doesn't kill you makes you stronger." Perhaps that is the blessing of coming through hard times; that we are now a little more capable of being God's instrument of peace and healing to someone else who needs it. That is certainly what Jesus has become for us. As we journey though this Holy Week, perhaps our deepest ask of God is that He let us have the privilege of being the answer to someone's prayer.

Bioethics and Cooperation with Sin A Recipe for Life and Understanding An Introduction to Catholic Moral Teaching

Last week as we explored some of the basics of Catholic moral theology, we recognized principles which we can embrace without very much debate. The sanctity of life, the dignity of the human person, a person being a social and relational being, and the Goodness of Creation both body and soul.

The study of bioethics brings all of these principles into play and allow us to practically live out our faith in this particularly challenging and ever changing aspect of our life.

Many basic tenets of our faith, such as life begins at conception and lasts until a natural death occurs, are generally understood by Catholics but are not the practice of society in general. Having a deeper understanding of our faith, and the "right reasoning" that has gone into the development of this reasoning will not only help us make proper decisions but help us to better express our faith in order to bring others to our way of thinking. Our stand on the sanctity of all life is the most powerful argument we have to express our position on abortion, capital punishment, euthanasia and all the other debates which are going on in society. All life is valuable and there are no gradations to make one more valued than another.

I draw most of this work from "The Essential Moral Handbook" by Fathers Kevin J. O'Neil C.SS.R and Peter Black C.SS.R and it is only intended to be a beginning of our journey to a full understanding of Catholic moral theology. "Throughout this work, we have raised the issue of what it means to be virtuous in the moral life, that is how to tend toward the good. Attaining human flourishing in cooperation with God's grace in the area of bioethics will entail tending toward particular goods which promote human life, the dignity of the person, and each individual's integral good as body/soul people."

Balancing autonomy with relationality is an important concept in our faith. We believe that people need to be free to shape their own lives according to God's call to the fullness of life with Him. That doesn't mean we are free to do whatever we want. Our judgement must be informed and our conscience prepared to make proper decisions. We need to recognize that there is always a relational aspect to our decisions and this tempers our freedom as we have a fundamental call to give and receive love. Our decisions will always affect others.

Suffering is a dilemma that cannot be avoided as health affects body, soul and spirit. It affects our family and friends and even our broader community. As difficult as this may seem, it can be a wonderful time to give and receive love. How often has tremendous healing occurred in a family as estranged members come to a reconciliation with a parent or a child. Just the recognition that a loved one is about to die, but living their faith out to the end can have a profound effect on the other. Our relationships can be powerfully changed at these special times.

Principles are not created in a vacuum but in real life, and that experience is reflected upon, with good judgement and right thinking applied, and the teachings put into words to help us handle difficult situations.

The principle of double effect recognizes the complexity of moral action. Our response to human suffering can combine good and evil. We provide painkillers to the terminally ill that hasten death; we provide warm clothing to the poor that was created in a sweatshop with children working in unsafe situations instead of being in school; we provide a safe injection site, even though the person is poisoning themselves. It is hard to find a situation where we do not cooperate with evil in some fashion.

The Church teaches: 1) The action must be good or neutral 2)One cannot intend the evil effect of the action, even though it is foreseen. 3)The good achieved cannot be the result of evil. 4)There must be a proportionate reason for the evil.

We can apply this to our recent history with vaccines. In dealing with the evil of people dying from the virus, vaccines were created with human genes emanating from those taken from an aborted baby. Catholics see this as an evil, the world cares very little. The thought process would lead us to see the action of saving lives as morally good. The intention of the act is to save lives, not to support abortion and more needs to be done to create drugs from other means. The good is achieved by stopping the virus, not causing abortions. The good is proportionally greater than the evil.

The principle of cooperation with sin can be recognized in our commitment to doing either good or evil. Formal cooperation with evil means we support in principle the evil. A person who supports abortion, votes for or financially supports abortions. Material cooperation does not support the evil in principle but still plays a part in the evil occurring. The legislated norms of society may force someone to unwillingly take part in an abortion, capital punishment, medically assisted suicide. This can involve just doing the paperwork or anything that moves the process along. One should never cooperate formally with evil. There are times when material cooperation is inevitable, but never if one's cooperation is indispensable to the evil.

The principle of Totality reminds us that all right moral acts promote authentic human good. Health consists as a human good when biological, social, spiritual and psychological integrity are achieved. Sometimes we need to sacrifice a part of this for the good of the whole person. The person who has lost a leg is still a whole person. The action must be morally good or neutral.

There are many issues involving bioethics that could never be covered in this short introduction. We began at the beginning of Lent to look at the topic of moral theology in a spirit of humility and charity. Pope St. John Paul II reminded us "The meaning of life is found in giving and receiving love." How best to share that love in truly trying circumstances requires us to venture into the dark and difficult corners of this world. Catholic faith, through the teachings of our Church, is always trying to help us navigate this complicated world. Decisions have consequences. We cannot always find the perfect answer. Through the guidance of the Holy Spirit, our conscience is formed, scripture and tradition guide us, natural law and the magisterium light our way to be children of the Light.
