ToughTraffic Issue: Data

Crash Stats Stump Sources; Big Picture Elusive

Early in March, Michael Reach of Elberta saw a deputy struck on Highway 98.

Stuck in a long line of traffic in a construction roadblock near Raleigh's cafe, Reach glanced

in his rear view mirror. A red van "shot out without stopping to look or anything,"he said, struck the officer and the deputy was thrust into the opposing lane of traffic.

"With the long delays from road constructions, drivers are getting shorttempered," Reach said.

Two weeks later, he saw another victim lying in the middle of the same slice of road. In the middle of March, a driver struck a Lillian woman crossing Highway 98 to the Catholic church.



The woman, locally known as the "Cat Lady" from Key Street, told friends she was "thrown in the air and spun like a rag doll." She was airlifted to a hospital and is recovering well, according to people who know her.

Many Lillian drivers on social media platforms blame rising wrecks on the decision to do the road construction work during the daytime rather than at night as originally planned.



Hannah Whitall Smith (1832-1911), Was a Prominent Quaker Speaker and Writer

It seems like each month has its own designation. February was African-

American history month and March was Womens History's month.

Though March is complete, I want to jump back to recognize a least one other woman, a little known woman, Hannah Whitall Smith (1832-1911), a prominent Quaker speaker and writer who lived in the United States and England. She is known for her writings on Christian spirituality and the inner

life, including her best-selling book "The Christian's Secret of a Happy Life" (1875), which was widely read and influential among Christians at her time.

Smith was closely associated with the Higher Life movement, a spiritual movement that emerged in the mid-19th century and emphasized the possibility of living a life of deeper spiritual fulfillment and holiness. This despite a difficult marriage to a husband involved in adultery numerous times and losing four of her seven children to illnesses before they reached age six. Smith's emphasis on the experience of joy and peace in the Christian life was considered radical at the time, and she faced some criticism from traditional Christian leaders. Smith's message of joy and peace found in the person of Jesus Christ resonated with many people, and her writing and speaking career spanned several decades and several countries, speaking more widely than women at her time were usually given opportunity to do.

Today, Hannah Whitall Smith's writings continue to be read and appreciated by Christians seeking a deeper spiritual experience. Her emphasis on the im-

portance of faith, trust, and surrender in the Christian life remains relevant, and her insights into the human heart and the challenges of living a joyful life are still helpful to readers today.

A few quotes from Smith's books and speeches include:

"Why, I asked myself, should the children of God lead such utterly uncomfortable religious lives when He has led us to believe that His yoke would be easy and His burden light? Why are we tormented with so many spiritual doubts, and such heavy spiritual anxieties? Why do we find it so hard to be sure that God really loves us, and why is it that we never seem able to believe long at a time in His kindness and His care? How is it that we can let ourselves suspect Him of forgetting us and forsaking us in times of need? We can trust our earthly friends, and can be comfortable in their companionship, and why is it

then that we cannot trust our heavenly Father, and that we seem unable to be comfortable in His service?"

"Put together all the tenderest love you know of dear reader the deepest you have ever felt and the strongest that has ever been poured out upon you and heap upon it all the love of all the loving human hearts in the world and then multiply it by infinity and you will begin perhaps to have some faint glimpses of what the love of God in Christ Jesus is. And this is grace."

To conclude, this year Easter Sunday falls on April 9. The grace and peace and love of God in Christ Jesus spoken of by Hannah Whiteall Smith over 100 years ago is still available today. I hope that on Easter Sunday you will be able to be present in one of the wonder churches in Lillian or the surrounding area. I hope you will discover that God's yoke is easy and His burden is light. And that he really loves you.

It's That Time of the Year Again: The Tax Man Cometh ...

Hello procrastinators, it's April and time is running out to file your taxes, if you haven't done so already. For some of you, it's worse than pulling teeth. Here are some tips that might be helpful and make the task less painful.

You can do this job yourself if you stay calm and determined. There are several ways to get started. Many folks that have investments with large companies have access to discounted software. Fidelity, for example, has coupons for Turbo Tax, HR Block, Tax Act, and several other companies that offer on-line tax preparation services and advice to help you prepare your own taxes. The questions in the software guide help to determine what's taxable and what's not, and if you get confused there is often a human out there to help you.

The IRS has a free guided tax preparation service if your Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) is less than \$73,000. Of course, you have to know how to calculate AGI, which is total income less adjustments (like IRA contributions or Educator Expenses), but it easier to just count income to see if you're eligible for free filing. Determining whether any portion of your Social Security is taxable might be your biggest challenge. If you plug in the numbers, the software will calculate that for you.

You can buy software to prepare your taxes, like Turbo Tax or Tax Act at any local Office Depot or many other retail outlets. Again, there are usually a set of questions to help you decide what information to use. Many do not include state tax preparation software, but will allow you to download it for an extra fee. But check, many states have free filing on their websites. Ask Mr. Google, he

knows all!

Lastly, you can print the forms and instructions supplied through the www.irs.gov and state websites and fill them out and mail them. Not many people do this anymore and I don't really recommend it because of the way information on one form has to be put on the others to calculate tax. It's too confusing for most people. If you do your own taxes, download a copy of Pub 17 from the IRS website. It's a comprehensive guide to Federal Income Tax.

The IRS has some advice for taxpayers who complete their own tax forms. The most common mistakes to watch for:

Missing or inaccurate Social Security Information. Check the numbers carefully and also make certain you use the names as they appear on the Social Security cards. This is often a problem with newlyweds who change their name but do not notify the Social Security Administration.

Inaccurate Information – Check the wages, pensions, social security, dividends, bank interest and other income to make certain you report the correct amounts. Double check the tax withholding for both the Federal and State.

Review your Filing Status. IRS Publication 501 helps you determine your correct filing status. Recently divorced or widowed taxpayers could make mistakes in determining your correct status for the IRS.

Math Errors. Tax software helps reduce math errors, but if you are filling in the forms by hand, double check your math.

Tax Credits & Deductions. You can easily make mistakes determining whether you are eligible for Earned Income Credit, or in computing the

Child or Dependent Care Credits. Again, tax software can be a blessing if you answer the questions correctly.

Bank Information. If you want direct deposit or direct debit of amount owed, check the routing and account numbers to make certain you have entered these correctly.

Lastly, sign the return and if filing with your spouse, both of you must sign and date the return.

Remember, you have until April 18th this year to file and pay.

So, if you have thrown up your hands and want someone to prepare your taxes, run do not walk to your tax preparer's office. Remember your tax preparation is only as good as your tax preparer, so here's what to check:

Qualifications. The IRS website has a Directory of Federal Tax Return Preparers with Credentials and Qualifications. This tool helps taxpayers find a tax return preparer with specific qualifications.

The Preparer's History. You can ask the local Better Business Bureau about the preparer, or you can check for disciplinary actions and the license status for credentialed preparers. For Enrolled Agents, go to the Verify Enrolled Agent on the IRS website. For CPA's, you can check with the State Board of Accountancy or for Attorneys, the State Bar Association.

Service Fees. You should avoid preparers who base fees on a percentage of the refund or who boast bigger refunds than their competition.

Electronic Filing. Make certain your preparer can electronically file and direct deposit your refund.

Availability. You want a preparer who you can contact throughout the year in case you have a question or

problem.

Records and Receipts. Good preparers will ask to see a taxpayer's records and receipts. They'll ask questions to figure things like the total income, tax deductions and credits.

Blank Return. You should never use a tax preparer who asks you to sign a blank tax form.

Review. Before signing a tax return, make sure you understand it and how the tax was calculated. Ask questions when something is not clear. Remember, you are the one responsible for the accuracy of your return, not the tax preparer.

Tax Preparer's Responsibilities: All paid tax preparers must have a Preparer Tax Identification Number (PTIN).

By law, paid preparers must sign returns and include their PTIN on the return they file.

Abusive Tax Preparers. Most tax return preparers are honest and provide good service to their clients.

You can report abusive tax preparers and suspected tax fraud to the IRS. Use Form 14157 Complaint: Tax Return Preparer.



Spider Mites: Prevention is Key to Control This Pest

Benjamin Franklin said "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure." While he was speaking specifically about preventing fires in Philadelphia, it is still sound advice. With the gardening season beginning here in Lower Alabama, it is time for that ounce of prevention.

Spider mites, *Tetranychus urticae Koch*, are arachnids and are closely related to ticks and spiders. These arachnids have four pairs of legs, no antennae, and a single, oval body region. As adults, they tend to be yellow-orange in color, with two dark spots, one on each side of the body. They are very tiny, about 1/50th of an inch long. They are about the size of a period in a sentence, or the head of a straight pin.

All spider mites go through the same stages of development. Adult females usually lay eggs on their host plants. Each female may lay over 100 eggs! The eggs hatch in 1-2 weeks into larvae. Higher temperatures lead to faster development in this mite. Larvae are round bodied and have only three pairs of legs. After hatching, the larvae build colonies on the undersides of leaves and produce webbing over infested leaf surfaces. This webbing gives them the name "spider" mites.

The young mites will feed for a few days, find a sheltered spot to rest, and then molt into the first nymphal stage. The first nymph now has an additional pair of legs. It had 3 pairs as a larvae and now has 4 pairs! The nymphs will molt two more times before adulthood. The adult males usually have pointed abdomens. The females have rounded abdomens and are the largest mites present.

Spider mites have tiny mouthparts modified for piercing individual plants to sneak a snack. Two-spotted spider mites can infest over 200 species of plants. This includes fruits like blackberries, blueberries, and strawberries; some vegetables like cucumbers, snap beans, peas, tomatoes, and lettuce; and trees or

shrubs, like azaleas, spruce, and roses.

This abuse by spider mites results in tiny, yellow or white speckles on the infested plants. When many of these colonies occur near each other, the foliage takes on a yellow or bronzed cast. Once the foliage of a plant becomes bronzed, it often drops prematurely. Severe spider mite feeding can stunt a plant's growth and can even kill the plant. Some plants, like azaleas, may develop distorted leaves and flowers.






Have you ever thought about how hard it may be for some people suffering from loneliness to reach out to a total stranger and admit they would like to form a friendship or some type of social bond?



Challenges to Consider in the Long Journey Into Alzheimer's

If you have a family member who has been diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease, or is starting to show symptoms, you will face some real challenges. Navigating the Alzheimer's experience involves a long journey, and there's no easy answer for how you can cope with your emotions. But you can at least address some of the financial issues involved to help give yourself a greater sense of control.

Here are some moves to consider:

Plan for care costs and identify insurance coverage. The list of Alzheimer's-related medical expenses is long and includes ongoing medical treatment, medical equipment, home safety modifications, prescription drugs and personal care supplies. As a caregiver, you'll want to know the extent of your loved one's health insurance: Medicare, supplemental policies, veteran's benefits if applicable, and so on. One big question is how much coverage they might have for adult day care services, in-home care services and full-time residential care services, and other long-term care options. Long-term care is one of the largest health care costs not covered by Medicare, so you'll want to determine if your loved one has a long-term care policy or another insurance policy with a long-term care rider.

Identify assets and debts. You'll need to know your family member's financial position, both what they own — bank accounts, investments, property, etc. — and what they owe, such as credit card debt, a mortgage, lines of credit, and so on. This knowledge will be essential if you're granted power of attorney to take over your loved one's finances.

Look for tax breaks available to caregivers. If you're a caregiver, you may have to pay for some care costs out of pocket. Consequently, you could receive some tax credits and deductions. These benefits vary by state, so you'll want to

consult with your tax advisor to determine your eligibility.

Ensure necessary legal documents are in place. As a caregiver, you may need to ensure some legal documents are in place, such as a durable power of attorney for finances, which lets you make financial decisions for your loved one

with Alzheimer's, and a durable power of attorney for health care, which lets you make health care and medical decisions on their behalf. It's important to have these and other necessary documents drawn up before someone is diagnosed with Alzheimer's or when they're just starting to exhibit the earliest signs of the disease, so they can understand what documents they are signing. If you wait until they no longer have this cognitive ability, things will get much more challenging. You could apply to become a conservator, which grants decision-making abilities similar to a power of attorney, but the conservatorship process takes time and could involve court procedures. To avoid this potential difficulty, work with your tax and legal specialist.

Finally, you don't have to go it alone. To help deal with the emotional challenges of caregiving, you can find local Alzheimer's support groups that can offer practical suggestions for coping. As for the financial issues, consider working with a financial professional who can look at your family's overall situation and recommend appropriate actions.

Guardians of the bridge!



Others see rapid residential development as the culprit causing a spate of crashes and pedestrian injuries.

"It's horrendous," said Dave Williams, a local advocate for limiting new housing developments in the Lillian/Elberta area. He tells of waiting five minutes to pull onto Highway 98 near CR 91.

It isn't easy to obtain figures about accidents on US Highway 98 between Lillian and Foley. But figures from the Lillian Volunteer Fire Department, which responds to these calls, show collisions are on the rise over the last several years - if not as dramatically as Lillian people seem to experience.

We do know 13,000 vehicles cross the Lillian Bridge every month, according to a Florida-Alabama traffic planning organization.

"We know it isn't getting any less," Williams said.



The LVFD responded to 50 motor vehicle accidents in 2021, 53 in 22 and 14 so far this year, according to their numbers.

But those statistics don't reveal the whole picture. County Highway Department officials don't keep figures on Highway 98 because it is a federal road, according to media spokesperson James Gordon. Alabama Law Enforcement Agency spokesperson Anna Peoples could not, over two weeks, produce numbers - though she said she tried.

The Elberta Volunteer Fire Department likely responded to more accidents, but a spokesperson did not respond to The Lillian's request for figures.
