First UU will be taking a special collection for the employees on December 7. Our employees have given us much loving help this year. Please consider them at this time.






Christmas Shopping?

Third Local UUA Common Read By Rita Chamblin

Reclaiming Prophetic Witness: Liberal Religion in the Public Square by Paul Rasor (Skinner House Books, 2013) has been selected as the 2014-15 Unitarian Universalist Association Common Read. The Common Read is a book, read and discussed in a group, and is a basis for deep, meaningful conversations. Our first Common Read together, The New Jim Crow, was an education. Next, Behind The Kitchen Door, was a spur to action.

The current book asserts that conservative Christianity is not the only valid religious voice in our national social policy. It includes insights from our liberal religious theological heritage that have bearing for us today, and calls us to prophetic, faith-based justice work. Rasor explores the forces and tensions that have weakened our prophetic witness in the last quarter century. He also makes a strong

case for the necessity of a liberal religious presence in the public square to complement and strengthen secular voices raised for social justice. *Reclaiming Prophetic Witness* offers new ways to think about how to remain culturally engaged and yet able to speak and act for justice from a faith-based position.

Mary A. Livermore: Raised a Calvinist and married a Universalist minister. Became a

newspaper writer and editor and an associate in the Civil War Sanitary Commission. Started a Chicago newspaper, *The Agitator*, which favored temperance and women's rights.

Dana McLean Greeley: After serving as president of the American Unitarian Association, became the first president of the merged Unitarian Universalist Association.

She has also written essays about whimsical events during travels in Europe.
