The Paper

Karl Friedl gave his paper titled

"What Food Tells Us about a Culture"

Humans are an exploratory species that thrive in an environment filled with new and unusual experiences. This includes food experiences. A varied diet is an important aspect of health, but how the ingredients are prepared, presented, and consumed also enriches our environment and is important to brain health. There are many different food practices solutions to the common human problem of a balanced and varied diet, and regional specificity has been surprisingly resistant to globalization forces. Even the worldwide spread of food brands (e.g., KFC, Starbucks) or food types (e.g., pizza) have to be modified to gain regional acceptance. Well preserved regional food practices both influence and reflect cultural traits which have been established by factors such as geography, genetics, local resources, and beliefs. These practices provide cultural insights and contrasts such as melting pot diversity or rigorously retained traditions; highly regimented or unrestrained societies; and stoic attitudes that have been shaped by harsh environments and basic survival needs. The preservation of this wide range of diverse food practices is also reinforced by early food imprinting and traditions. This highlights the fact that humans are born with some common protective dislikes that help us to avoid eating spoiled or toxic substances, but we are born with fewer common likes and these tend to be shaped within our cultures. This preserved diversity of food practices ensures that humans can be stimulated and enriched by exploratory forays into a seemingly endless variety of experiences in food flavor and context, and this is good for the brain.

Members are sure to recall the visuals comprising extraordinarily brightly colored montages of culinary delights, seemingly from the whole world.
