We end this month with another celebration of life. Rest in eternal peace, Roger Hartmann. We take comfort in knowing that your body has been restored and you are rejoicing in heaven.

We were blessed with wonderful sermons from Pastor Chris Matthy, Pastor Zacharda, and Pastor Richards this month. If you missed any of them, you can go to our Facebook page "Saints Paul's" and watch them. Our supply pastors are wonderful gifts to our congregation! So... I looked up the word "supply". As a verb, it means "to make available or provide". So in essence, a supply pastor "provides" us with pastoral needs. The make themselves available to provide us with a great sermon, a listening ear, prayers, leadership guidance, and many other gifts. I offer a heartfelt thank you to our supply pastors for their time and talents!

This month I attended my first Finance Meeting. The group met with Jeff Gilbert, our representative of Thrivent Financial. He came to discuss the church's Investment Funds and other assets. I will be the first to admit, that my knowledge of the church's finances is not my strong suit. But our finance committee is wonderful and knowledgeable. I will continue to learn more by attending meetings and asking questions. After all no one person knows everything about everything! Maundy Thursday is on April 18th. We will have a service at 7:00 p.m. -

Maundy Thursday's service has always been the service closest to my heart. It seems inappropriate to say it is my favorite, but it is one service that I make a point to attend every year. Unfortunately, it is one of the most poorly attended. I would like to invite all of you to mark your calendars to experience this service. The service symbolizes Jesus as a suffering servant, and His command for us to do the same. The word "Maundy" comes from the Latin word "Command". The night commemorates the last supper and Jesus' instructions on what to do to remember him after his crucifixion.

A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another, just like I have loved you; that you also love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another. John 13:34–35

The service concludes in silence with the stripping of the altar. This isn't a clearing off and redecorating for the Good Friday service. This is a deliberate act of transformation. One candle at a time removed, one cloth at a time carefully folded and put away, a black cloth replacing the red and the cross is veiled. A visible change that reflects the change from the celebration on Palm Sunday to mourning as we remember the sacrifice Christ made for us. It is easy to leave in silence, there is so much to think about and reflect upon.

We aren't like the disciples who didn't know what would happen next, we don't go home with fear or wondering. What should we do next? What is going to happen? We know that while Christ will be sentenced to Death the next day, we will be celebrating his resurrection on Easter morning. But on Thursday night we begin to become aware of what it cost and why we really celebrate on Sunday. On Easter we celebrate the resurrection but on Maundy Thursday we remember the events that led to his death. We remember our sin which led to a need for an Easter and we realize the fullness of Christ's love for us. It overwhelms me to think about it.


