PASTOR'S CORNER BY TED BURKE

The late Dawson Trotman, founder of The Navigators, was visiting Taiwan on one of his overseas trips. During the visit he hiked with a Taiwanese pastor back into one of the mountain villages to meet with some of the national Christians. The roads and trails were wet, and their shoes became very muddy. Later, someone asked this Taiwanese pastor what he remembered most about Dawson Trotman. Without hesitation the man replied, "He cleaned my shoes."

How surprised this humble national pastor must have been to arise the next morning and to realize that the Christian leader from America had arisen before him and cleaned the mud from his shoes. Such a spirit of servanthood marked Dawson Trotman throughout his Christian life. He died as he lived, actually giving his life to rescue someone else from drowning.

One of the plainest expressions of love in Scripture is fellowship—*sharing* with others. One of the most valuable things we can share is ourselves: our time, our talents, our energies in serving others in the Body of Christ. Dawson Trotman was a master at spiritual fellowship, but he also knew how to share himself in serving others.

The greatest example and teacher of servanthood was of course the Lord Jesus Christ. Paul said of Him that He took "the very nature of a servant" ([Phil. 2:7](#)), and Jesus said of Himself that "the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many" ([Mt. 20:28](#)).

Although Jesus' entire life was one of service, the most notable example of His servanthood was that of

washing His disciples' feet on the evening of His betrayal, recorded for us in [Jn. 13:1-17](#). The instance was notable both because of the setting and because of the mundaneness of His service.

If we are to master the scriptural principles of true biblical fellowship, we must master this one: *true greatness in the Kingdom of heaven consists in serving one another*. Jesus said, "... whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant" ([Mt. 20:26](#)).

Jesus recognized that in the world, the lesser serves the greater. At one time He said, "For who is greater, the one who is at the table or the one who serves? Is it not the one who is at the table? But I am among you as one who serves" ([Lk. 22:27](#)). But though this may be true in the world, in the Body of Christ it is to be different. Again Jesus said, "I have set you an example that you should do as I have done for you" ([Jn. 13:15](#)).

It is not easy to be a servant to others in the Body of Christ, regardless whether we are serving upward or downward or simply serving our neighbor or friend. As someone once observed, the true test of whether we are servants is that we don't mind being treated like servants!

On November 6th at our annual Charge Conference we will elect our officers for 2017. The question I ask of you is, "Who will be a servant and help guide this church?". You will find another article in this newsletter listing different opportunities to serve this church. Please take time to look at the needs of the church and volunteer to be a part of this church. Call the church office to volunteer!

LAY LEADERSHIP— SERVING AT CHAPEL HILL

On November the 6th Chapel Hill will be joining the United Methodist Churches of Henderson and Union County for our annual Charge Conference. One of the major responsibilities of the Charge Conference is to elect officers for the coming year. Here is a list of areas we need you to consider being a part of. If you have questions please contact Pastor Ted Burke

Discipleship- this team focuses on spiritual growth at Chapel Hill. Their major emphasis is small groups, the library and devotional materials

Need 3-5 people to serve on the team

Evangelism- this team focuses on inviting people from our community to our church and creating an environment for these guest to feel welcomed. Their major emphasis is the welcome center, Trunk or Treat and advertising.

Need a chair person and 5-7 people on the team

Fellowship- this team focuses on our members loving and caring for one another. Their major emphasis is church wide events, Thanksgiving dinner, Christmas events, bereavement dinners and sending food and cards to those in need.

Need 2 or 3 people on the team

Ministry- this team focuses on reaching out to the hurts and needs in the world. Their major emphasis are: Celebrate Recovery, Driving Ministry, Christian Community Outreach, support Methodist Children's Homes, Salvation Army and many other ministries.

Needs 4-6 people on the team

Worship- this team focuses on special worship services and enhancing our current services. Their major emphasis surround holidays, decorating the sanctuary and finding ways to improve our current services.

Need: chairperson and 3-5 people

Staff Parish- this committee focuses on the staff and the relationship between staff and the church. Their major emphasis are staff evaluations, communication with the District Superintendent, hiring of new staff and dismiss-

ing staff when needed.

Need: 2 or 3 members needed (You can not be related to a staff person to serve on this committee)

Trustees- this committee oversees the buildings and grounds of the church. Their major emphasis is proactive care for the building, repairs, maintenance and serving as officers for the church.

Need: individuals who have expertise in carpentry, electrical, painting, etc.

Finance- this committee has the responsibility of overseeing spending in the church and maintaining excellent financial records. They also help us in the area of stewardship.

Need: chairperson and 5-6 members

Lay Leadership- this committee has the responsibility of nominating and developing leaders in the church.

Need: 5-7 new members

Administrative Council- this committee oversees the church and is made up of chairpersons of all the teams and committees along with elected members. If you are interested in service on the council please contact Pastor Ted Burke.

Teams: You do not have to be a member of the church to serve on a team or help one.

Committees— You must be a member of Chapel Hill.

Do we not often personally sacrifice our own desires and wants so that we are more capable of meeting theirs? I can recall my father placing cardboard in the bottom of his work shoes due to holes in the soles; he only had enough money for one pair of shoes in that months' budget, and my sister was going to a formal dance and wanted a new pair of shoes. That is a true sign of love.

I said all of the above to emphasize what was seen on a small country church sign in the Lakes area over the Labor Day weekend: IF YOU LOVE JESUS, TITHE; ANYBODY CAN HONK.

If one truly LOVES Jesus, one will give of ones finances, time and efforts toward the building of His kingdom. Anybody can honk.



EVANGELISM TEAM

Easter Service: We advertise and promote the Easter Service at the HFAC through yard signs, billboards, etc. and we help out at the service.

A sign-up sheet is kept in the center, and the time commitment for this is about 20-to-30 minutes per shift. You simply collect contact information from first time guests and give them a gift bag. In September, we also handed out vehicle window decals.

“Text in Church” program: Volunteers collect information from registration pads after the 11:00AM service and enter it into a computer data base. The commitment is about 15-to-20 minutes.

What is it about having small children that prompts strangers to offer unsolicited words of wisdom? No, kind lady at Target, I'm not sure I want to hear your birthing story—though I'm sure it's got the entertainment value of an action film—I'd prefer my curious seven-year-old *not* have nightmares tonight.

So I've been keeping my sister's newborn baby girl one day a week for the last few months. Harlie Grace (HG) is simply perfection. I also have two kids of my own, the seven-year-old, Lilah, and a three-year-old, Ezzy. A few days ago, Ezzy and HG were taking an afternoon nap. (Isn't it amazing how getting two kids to nap simultaneously makes you feel like a superhero? I almost made myself a bedazzled cape.) My three-year-old rarely naps anymore, so I was euphoric.

Now, Lilah's bus drops her off the bus stop at 2:40pm. Ever since the Mom-Missed-The-Bus-Drop-Off debacle of '14, I watch the afternoon clock with manic intensity. And, wouldn't you know it, Ezzy kept sleeping, and sleeping, and sleeping. 2:35pm hit and HG woke up with an acute need for a bottle. Cue The Chaos:

2:35pm – Baby screaming

2:36pm – Bottle is inserted in baby's mouth (not quickly enough for her liking, as she takes turns wailing and gulping)

2:37pm – My shoes have grown feet and walked right on out of my house

2:38pm – Ezzy won't wake up after multiple attempts or with a still-screaming infant in her room

2:39pm – I hear the telltale screech and motor combination that means the bus is in the neighborhood

2:40pm – I literally RUN to the end of my driveway, in my pajamas, barefoot, a crying baby in my arms, and an unsupervised three-year-old napping in my house

PLEASE JUDGE ME. I DESERVE IT.

I realized, in that moment, that the cherry on top of my shame sundae was the fact that the nightgown I had on was the precise one I had picked up Lilah in the previous day. As my pre-teen schlepped off the bus, she sprinted by me, grumbling, "MOM, YOU ARE SOOOO EMBARRASSING!" And over HG's yelps, I did manage to hear the bus driver as she opened her window to say to me (AKA to scold me) "I really hope you're enjoying this season of life. They grow up so fast." Well, thanks, lady bus driver. Because I'm not really enjoying it right now. In fact, can I get on that bus and be dropped off at your next stop, because I do NOT want to enter my house again for at least 24 hours?

Listen, I know how blessed I am to have young kids. I have personally experienced the hollow ache that occurs in the

wake of a miscarriage, and I love my girls with an almost unhealthy intensity, but parenting in this phase is HARD. It hurts. It's exhausting. It can feel like you never measure up, like you're never doing enough. Like it's a competition and you're losing.

So here's *my* unsolicited advice to parents of young kids: IT'S OKAY IF YOU ARE NOT PARTICULARLY *IN LOVE* WITH THIS SEASON OF LIFE.

Along those lines, here are a few other things that are okay.

- ♥ It's okay if you count down the minutes until naptime.
- ♥ It's okay if you hide in the pantry and eat chips topped with squirt-cheese as a coping mechanism.
- ♥ It's okay if you go to work and it feels like a vacation.
- ♥ It's okay if you don't discipline with complete perfection for every act of domestic terrorism our tiny psychos so creatively execute.
- ♥ It's okay if your kid's art project looks like a sad homage to the glittery Disco-era.
- ♥ It's okay if you pick up your kid two days in a row in the same pajamas. (But if it's day three . . . the jig is up. Call in reinforcements.)
- ♥ It's okay. It's okay. It's okay.

It's true – *they grow up fast and it's important to look for joy every day*. But that's really hard to do when you're just trying to survive.

In a few years, I'll look back on this phase and smile. I'll miss my kids' chubby elbows and awkward teeth. I'll miss holding a baby and the way Ezzy can't pronounce her Rs. Because there definitely is something magical about *every* age, *every* stage, and *every* season. But it's OKAY if today you're ready for tomorrow.

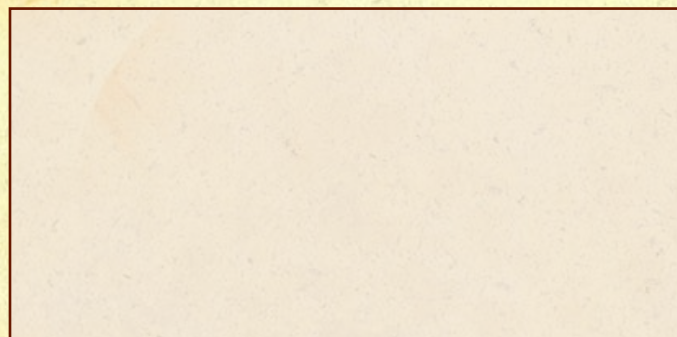
