

The State of the Birds

Ursula Sherrill will speak at the Rio Grande Campus of EPCC, 100 West Rio Grande, Building 4010, Rm 119 on Monday, May 19 at 7:00 p.m., on "State of the Birds," a scientific analysis of 42 years of Audubon Texas Christmas Bird Counts. Ms. Sherrill

will also discuss the results of conservation partnership programs launched by Audubon Texas in response to declines of common birds. The work of individual landowners and conservation groups partnered with Audubon across the state is central to sustaining bird diversity, according to Iliana Peña, the Director of Education and Conservation for Audubon Texas. One initiative on which the speaker will focus is the Important Bird Areas Program (IBA), which restores and protects historically critical habitats. AT FEATHER LAKE


The water level at Feather Lake Wildlife Sanctuary continued its roller-coaster ride over the past 2 months. Rain in early February brought the lake to 2.6 feet deep. The water level then dropped steadily until the basin went dry in mid-March. Finally, late March brought the first irrigation water to the basin. At this writing, the central part of the basin is flooded; the east and west parts are still dry.

Our hope is intermittent deliveries of irrigation water will keep at least part of the basin flooded into the summer. If this happens, Feather Lake will remain open to the public through the end of May.

With or without water, Feather Lake will also be open on **Sat., June 5**, for our bi-monthly workday. It starts at **8 a.m.** Join us to enjoy the cool, green expanse of the lake's cottonwoodwillow bosque and to help with ongoing maintenance.

Work on excavation of the Feather Lake II basin, immediately west of Feather Lake, is now underway. Come on down and check it out. Feather Lake II looks bare and open right now – much like Feather Lake after it was expanded in 1986-87. Feather Lake has changed dramatically in the years since. Take a look at Feather Lake today, and you can glimpse the future of Feather Lake II 20+ years from now.

Audubon's Feather Lake Wildlife Sanctuary is located at 9500 North Loop at Bordeaux in El Paso, 0.3 miles west of Americas Ave. Hours are 8 a.m. to noon on Saturdays and 2 p.m. to dusk on Sundays. Admission is free.

Rio Bosque now has **two** pairs of White-



the lake just above the dams.

FeatherFest

What: FeatherFest celebration will be held Saturday, April 24 from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at Keystone Heritage Park located at 4200 Doniphan in the El Paso Desert Botanical Garden. EPTP Audubon Society will have a table there with photos of the birds of Keystone, chapter literature, and spotting scopes set up so festival goers can view water birds, waders, and shorebirds at the wetland. We will probably see a Pied-billed Grebe and also Mexican Mallard, Cinnamon Teal and Bufflehead ducks. We hope to see a Black-necked Stilt, American Avocet, Greater Yellowlegs, Least Sandpiper, and Long-billed Dowitcher. A large group of Ring-billed Gulls will probably drop in, possibly accompanied by a rare gull.

Field Trips

Big Bend National Park Fri., Sat., & Sun., April 16, 17, and 18, 2010

Big Bend National Park in Texas is one of the top birding areas in the U. S. Many of the exceptional geologic formations, fossils, plants, mammals, birds, reptiles, amphibians, and fish that occur there are found nowhere else. We will hike to Boot Springs, elevation 6,300 feet, Boot Canyon, and the Pinnacle, which are the favorite nesting areas of the Colima Warbler, the most famous bird in the park. Big Bend is the only place where it can be found.

We will also watch for Hutton's Vireo, Acorn Woodpecker, Mexican Jay, Common Raven, Zonetailed Hawk,



White-breasted Nuthatch, Bushtits, Broad-tailed and Blue-throated hummingbirds. We will stay in the Rio Grande Village campground, elevation 1,850 feet, on the river at the eastern end of the park. Here Gray Hawks have nested in the past. Birds found in this area are Vermilion Flycatcher, Orchard and Hooded oriole, Lesser Nighthawk, Elf Owl, Yellow-billed Cuckoo, Summer Tanager, and Painted and Varied buntings and much more. The park checklist has 50 warbler species alone.

Sierra Vista in Southeast Arizona Fri., Sat., Sun., and Mon., May 28-31

Southeast Arizona is an international magnet for birders seeking an outstanding experience in the field. More than 400 bird species are found here annually, and 514 species have been observed. Of these, 36 birds are found nowhere else in the U.S. and more than 40 occur only in this border region with Mexico (Taylor 1999).

Some of the birds we will seek are the Broad-billed, Violet-crowned, Magnificent, and White-eared hummingbirds. Also on our wish list are the Spotted Owl, Sulphurbellied and Buff-breasted flycatchers, and Tropical, Thick-billed and Couch's kingbirds. We could see the Gray Hawk, Elegant Trogon, Bridled Titmouse, Bell's Vireo and Abert's Towhee, as well. We are almost certain to find the Mexican Jav. Acorn and Gila woodpeckers, Cassin's Kingbird, and Painted Redstart. Though we will plan to lodge in Sierra Vista, AZ, we will be birding in Fort Huachuca's Garden Canyon, the Nature Conservancy's Ramsey Canyon, Miller Canyon and the Hummingbird Sanctuary at Beatty's Guest Ranch, San Pedro Riparian National Conservation Area, Patagonia-Sonoita Creek Preserve and the Kino Springs Golf Course.

This Memorial Day weekend trip runs from Friday, May 28 until Monday, May 31. We will stay in Sierra Vista at one of the many motels. Camping facilities are scarce. One thing is for sure, it's not your average bird count or fund raiser! Birdathon is unusual and different: a wild weekend of birding and our organization's most important source of income for conservation & education programs.

Birdathon! 2010 will occur on May 1st-2nd.

CHAPTER OPERATIONS & FEATHER LAKE WILDLIFE SANCTUARY

Scouts, students and adults can enjoy seeing birds up close in a natural habitat. When the lake has water, we have docents on duty to answer questions, provide printed trail guides & lend binoculars.

RIO BOSQUE WETLANDS PARK

Each year, this site along the Rio Grande becomes more valuable as habitat for birds and other wildlife.

AUDUBON TEXAS

Our support helps keep National Audubon's state office an effective voice for birds, other wildlife and their habitats in Texas.

How Birdathon Works

On the weekend of **May 1-2**, our dedicated Birdathon counters will be busy scouring the countryside, trying to find as many bird species as possible, in a single 24-hour blitz. These hardy, energized & intrepid individuals will start early, stay out late, visit varied wildlife habitats and give their eyes, ears and bird knowledge a full workout. Why do they push themselves so hard? For the pleasure of a day out in the field, for the chance to collect meaningful data for a nationwide census project, for a test of their birding skills and **most importantly, for a better West Texas environment**.

Each counter will be backed by sponsors who pledge either a given amount for each species seen or a fixed total amount. Most counters will identify 50 to 100 species. A pledge of, say \$0.50 per species for 60 species would result in a contribution of \$30.95% of Birdathon income goes to the programs and projects; 5% to fundraising (printing, paper and postage).
