Preaching, Painting, and Promoting Health Three Projects for Three Weeks at La Loma Luz Hospital, Belize




At Work

MAKING A DIFFERENCE

ith excitement our group of volunteers boarded Continental Airlines destined for Chiapas, Mexico. This Southern state bordering Guatemala was in a state of unrest ten years ago, but gradually things settled down, leaving the people as needy and poverty stricken as ever.

The work was multifaceted:


- Vacation Bible School in various villages with anywhere from 100-300 children in attendance at EACH session.
- Home visitation taking clothes, toys, medicines, nurses and eye glasses to surrounding
- Opening medical and dental clinics in Pantepec, the town the group stayed in, so people from surrounding villages could come in to be seen on certain days.
- Building two churches and adding a second story to the third one – all to be done in ten days.

Our group of 45 had to be spread out to accomplish all this.... And that is where the adventure began! Since we arrived on a Friday, we had a little time to get used to things before work started on Sunday. When Sunday came, so did the work

Heidi states that the first thing she helped with was the morning VBS program in a village about 45 minutes away. About 50 children came to the long, narrow, covered porch

of an old building where the meetings were held. The children as well as the adults enjoyed the songs, stories, crafts, puppet show, and hand-outs.


Over 300 children attended nightly Vacation Bible School presentations with puppet shows that teach lessons to ALL languages, colorful crafts, stories and songs. You can imagine that by the end of the week we were elated and felt blessed.... And also very, very tired.



Visitation was the next thing I did. We gathered supplies we brought with us for giving away and piled into the vehicles for the ride to the village. Once there, groups of approximately seven people went to separate homes that were on the list of needy people. We visited with the people there; attended to any medical needs as best we could (we were thankful to have nursing students from Linda Vista University helping us) gave away a toy or two, clothing, vitamins, tooth brushes, toothpaste, shoes, whatever seemed appropriate for that situation. But most importantly we prayed with the people in the house. The day I went on visitation we visited two villages. It was a very good experience for me to see how the people lived.

On a trip like this there are so many things to be done that it really doesn't matter what your skill is, you will probably rotate and do everything anyway. Lanita's 14 year old Benjamin pulled several teeth – in fact everyone wanted a turn at the dental



area! The work started around 8:30 and people would already be forming lines as early as 4:00 am. Hundreds of teeth were pulled and fillings were given. We came close to running out of supplies, but God provided until we finished. One women had 14 rotten root tips removed—and when those awful things were out of her mouth she felt so good. Bus Barraged By Bandits

unday morning we packed up to leave Chiapas at 5 a.m. One bus and one van held our group and luggage as off we went to San Cristobal, the ancient town that was founded soon after Christopher Columbus landed. After a three-hour curvy bus ride; we experienced seeing local indigenous people show their wares and bargaining with them for their colorful blankets, dresses, beads and purses. Another four-hour extremely curvy bus ride to Agua Azul similar to Niagara Falls but on a lesser scale - where water cascaded down, down, and ended up in the bluest water - climaxed with a beautiful sunset. Hunger set in and we talked about eating at a little town about 45 minutes away

ous." Everyone loaded the bus and before taking off, we decided to say a special prayer for protection on our trip that evening

"We need to leave; it's dark out

- as we still had three hours to go before arriving at the airport. The bus lumbered up the steep hill slowly. groaning under it's heavy load, when suddenly it stopped. I was in the front seat and stood up to see why: a tree across the road with three men beside it. As quickly as I voiced, "It's just a tree in the road," my eyes saw the men were masked, with machete's and guns, and I felt the two driver's assistants fling themselves on the floor and slither between the luggage lining the aisle. I immediately realized that this was a bandit assault.

The driver grabbed the first suitcase he saw and flung it to block the door: it was the suitcase that I had been guarding carefully; it contained all our important documents and money to pay all the workers and for supplies not yet paid for. In a panic I took it from him and hurled it to the back saying, send this as far back as you can; we are be-

ing assaulted, pray like you've never prayed before.

In its place a HUGE water bottle was wedged in the door instead. while the bandits banged the door. shined flashlights in the windows, beat the side of the bus, and banged the door again. Our driver immediately took ther - we were going over an embankoff his white shirt so he would not be a target— his dark skin blended into the night—and then crouched by my feet. He was in a panic, knowing he had to save his bus, yet in fear for his life. He'd experienced this before; we had

utes we huddled there, praying, reciting when they stopped to help! We didn't Psalms, thinking all sorts of thoughts, vet at the same time there was never panic, hysteria. People were calm, peaceful and full of praises and prayer. We knew we could die at any minute. we prayed that our assailants would see God's glory and angels surrounding our bus like Elijah in Bible times. We knew that God would work this situation out for the best. Yet it is still a terrifying experience – not knowing what will happen or when.

In vain they had tried to radio for help – we were in deep mountain ranges where no signals would go out. Others apparently knew better than to be driving this road at night also though it was only 7:30 p.m. While the such high speed. I felt sure that God masked men still surrounding the bus

pounding and hitting it, yelling for us to let them in, someone suggested that our bus driver try to back up the bus. He took the risk and with his head down, tried to back the bus downhill around a sharp corner in the dark. Just then someone yelled not to go any farment! But at that point, no one was brave enough to go outside to see how steep it was – besides, we had a few moments of silence from our intruders but we didn't know if they left.

> Had a miracle been performed right in front of our eyes? Indeed! We looked up and the tree had been rolled off the road, and the men weren't there. Were they hiding in the dense jungle, waiting for us to come out? It seemed like an eternity before we could decide what to do. Should we get out and risk an attack, or stay in the bus and risk going over the embankment and down the steep cliff.

Suddenly, lights appeared! Car lights! It was the chief police

What a relief mind too much that they were a bit drunk – they went and got help, (at that point we weren't sure if we could trust those men- yet we also felt that God had His hand on us and we needed to act...) and soon they brought the police from a town farther out. By 2:00 a.m. a tow truck had our bus back on the road - nearly seven hours after it all started.

> Now our goal was to get to the airport - still another three hours away. Our bus driver must have been in the same hurry as we-he went hurtling down that range of mountains at breakneck speed. I dared to open my eyes at times then quickly clamped them shut when I saw those curves coming up at

At different times we spoke with the bus drivers about this experience, encouraging them to place their trust in Jesus, because they had seen Him work in our lives through that experience that night.

That morning, as I pulled out my passport at the airport, I found a Bible verse that I had copied to have with me on this trip. Philippians 4:6.7: Don't fret or worry. Instead of worrying, pray. Let petitions and praises shape your worries into prayers, letting God know your concerns. Before you know it, a sense of God's wholeness, everything coming together for good, will come and settle you down. It's wonderful what happens when Christ displaces worry at the center of your life. (The Message). Then the song He's Able To Carry Me Through as on this same piece of paper.

Our plane was on its way

home, and we were ready to go home. But this trip would not soon be forgotten. My children's lives are stronger for it, and so is ours. Praise God!

We took eye glasses to the different villages as we visited them. Every- Friday the last piece of roofing was one wanted a pair of glasses! It's hard to screen people for glasses when they for their first Sabbath meeting. Andon't know how to read, so we tried to ask if they could see the outline of the mountains clearer. Sometimes our screening locations were dark little huts – making it hard to see anything!

One woman came in to see which ones would work for her. "How about these?" "Oh – they make me so dizzy!" "These make me feel nauseated!" "This pair makes me see double!" We went to pair after pair, and nothing seemed to work for her. Finally I brought out this beautiful bluerimmed pair, nice and clean looking and put them on her. "OH! She exclaimed. I can see now! Oh THIS is the pair I need! I can see so clearly! Oh thank-you, thank-you!" And off she trotted down the dirt path, happy as could be. Five minutes later she came back. "Um... these glasses I just care of you. 'Go ye therefore, and got.... they have no lenses!"

There were three construction sites. One was the former cow barn from an ancient hacienda where people had been meeting for church and decided to convert it into a church building. Within two days the walls were up, windows in, and by the fifth day most of the struc-

ture was finished.
