Each church building was different, but the one thing I noticed in all of our churches were the altars. They all looked different as far as the construction but they were all alike in the fact that they were tear stained. I've thought about those tear stains and couldn't help but wonder what they represented. I remembered the altar in my home church in Joplin, Mo. I saw tear stains where mothers have plead for the souls of their children, fathers seeking guidance and wisdom from God, wives and husbands praying for the salvation of their mates. I saw tear stains when one of our little girls finger had been cut off and God healed. Tear stains were left there by a young 5th grade girl for the salvation of a friend who later became a member of her family as well as the child of God. Some of the stains reminded me of the time that God had healed a little boy who had drank furniture polish and when another little guy's feet were burned so badly and God intervened. I see the stains where we as a church have prayed for revival and God has sent the needed refreshing. There are stains where two of our young men were in serious accidents, both unconscious for days and even though it seemed hopeless to man God saw those tears and heard those prayers and intervened. I saw the tears left a few months ago when we prayed for one of our little girls who had a hole in her heart and birth defects and I also saw the tear stains of rejoicing when the victory was won and the hole completely healed. There are also stains that have been shed by all the faithful pastors we've had in our behalf. Tears have been left as we have prayed for our pastors, and for our Bible College, youth camps, VBS's, and other churches in need of pastors. Yes, the altars in our churches are tear stained where burdens have been taken to the Lord and where victories have been won. What a wonderful testimony for our churches-tear stained altars. May we as Apostolic Faith believers never let our altars become just another piece of furniture but may we keep them precious to us by our tear stains. Thank God for answered prayers at those tear stained altars.

Bylaws of the Apostolic Faith Bible College, Inc. ARTICLE VII Doctrine

It is recognized that the true church of Jesus Christ consists of all believers in the saving grace of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ who have accepted him as their personal Saviour. It is recognized and agreed that no organization or man has been granted authority by the Lord to exclude from or accept anyone into the Kingdom of Heaven, as this is done by Jesus Christ only. It is further recognized and agreed that we as Christians are to love all members of the Body of Christ (Christians), and this love and fellowship derives from the unity instilled by the Holy Spirit. Although differences in doctrinal beliefs and interpretations should not influence our love for one another, adherence to similar doctrinal beliefs and modes of worship have bonded together those of the Apostolic Faith Movement as founded by Charles F. Parham in the early 1900's. The scripture teaches us to adhere to the truth and proper doctrine. These common doctrinal beliefs are essentially as follows:

Triune God; Father, Son and Holy Spirit

Creation and Formation

Man is basically sinful and in need of Salvation

Salvation by Grace upon repentance toward God and acceptance of Jesus Christ as one's personal Saviour, which is the conception of Spiritual Life.

Sanctification of the Spirit, Soul and Body. A second definite work of Grace by the Lord Jesus Christ.

Baptism of the Holy Spirit; evidenced by speaking in other languages.

Water Baptism (of all believers) by immersion in water in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

Washing of Feet.

Divine Healing through Jesus Christ for all believers.


Do not condone divorce and remarriage. Matthew 19:8-9 Destruction of the Wicked.

Conditional Immortality.

Rapture of the Man Child Class.

Return of Jesus Christ to earth again; bodily and visibly. A Ministry supported by tithes and offerings.


Boy's Dorm

Mother's Reward



It was an Egyptian princess who said it, but the words sound like an echo of the voice of God speaking to every mother with a newborn babe: "Take this child away, and nurse it for me, and I will give thee thy wages" (Exodus 2:9).

This text relates to one of the big events of history. It is doubtful if all the decisive battles of the world taken together were of greater importance to mankind than this event that took place on the banks of the Nile.

Yet it is a simple story. Pharoah's daughter and her attendants have come to the riverside to bathe, and have found a crudely built ark in the bulrushes. Their curiosity aroused, the little boat is brought to shore. To the amazement of the princess, there is a baby boy in the ark.

Picture the scene-the baby waving his dimpled hands, kicking his chubby feet, with tears on his cheeks; and the princess drawing him to her, speaking soft words of comfort, trying to quell his fears.

There was a young girl watching, and as she saw the princess fondle the little bundle, a glad and daring thought crossed her mind. Running from her hiding place, she said, "Shall I go call a nurse?" Surely the Lord was working in the heart of that princess, because she accepted her offer without question.

The decision that the child should live was indeed important. But something equally important took place when the princess decided WHO should care for the child. Suppose, for instance, she had determined to train him herself-she would have made him a heathen. Moses was destined to be an emancipator and a genius, but wrongly trained his genius might have been as destructive as the lightening's flash, though just as brilliant.

Unwittingly, the woman chose to have the child nursed by his own mother who loved and believed God. What emotions must have gone through Jochebed's heart as her son was

handed to her. The princess spoke proudly, haughtily, as became her rank: "Take this child away, and nurse it for me." But the Israelite slave heard this as the voice of God.

When God wants to train a leader, He gives him a good mother. Moses' mother was not working for the princess, but for God. She was a woman of faith, for in Hebrews 11 we read that Moses was hidden by faith. Notice she was eager for her task. She knew hardship was in store for her but she accepted gladly and willingly the task God gave her. Unfortunately, there are some today that look upon the responsibilities of motherhood as a kind of prison.

Home is of utmost importance. Today's civilization is what the homes of yesterday made it. Without Christian homes, we cannot have a Christian civilization. So when God raised up this man Moses to remake the world, He put him in a pious home.

What was Jochebed's task? She was not to govern the world, nor was she to lecture before great crowds, but in training her child for God she had the highest and holiest of all tasks.

Observe that this woman was to be paid for her services. But she received much more than the wages the princess sent down each week. First, she was given the privilege of loving this child. Second, she had the privilege of serving-the blessing of giving rather than receiving. Then, in the third place, there was the joy of seeing the effect of her training on the character of her son.

Oh, it is a blessed reward, the reward of success in the high enterprise of motherhood. The privilege to love, to give, and to bless-there can be no richer reward. Mothers, you can have the same joys as this old-time mother. While your children are about you, listen for the voice of God saying, "Take this child away, and (train) it for me, and I will give thee thy wages!"

Divine Healing

Isaiah 53:5, But He was wounded for our transgressions, He was bruised for our iniquities: The chastisement of our peace was upon Him, and with His stripes we are healed.

I Peter 2:24, Who his own self bare our sins in His own body on the tree, that we being dead to sins, should live unto righteousness: by whose stripes ye were healed.

These two passages of Scripture gives a perfect picture of God's plan for the healing of His people. Isaiah said we are healed; Peter said ye were healed. Many church organizations cannot see the difference between spiritual and physical healing. According to St. John 3:16, For God so love the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life. Now what we are trying to do here is to separate the different atonments that are made both for the literal healing and also the spiritual.

God gave His son that we might have spiritual life. But Jesus gave His own body freely at the whipping post of Pilate and was beaten with 39 stripes to fulfill the two above prophecies so making the double atonement for both body and also for everlasting life. How do we claim the promise for salvation? Simply by repentance and an act of faith in believing that Jesus died for our sins. So how do we receive healing for our bodies? By believing that Jesus really fulfilled the double atonement and Isaiah's prophecy when He allowed them to whip Him with the lash at Pilate's judgment hall. Later, Peter repeated what had already happened there. Divine healing is one to the things like a lot of other things that is sadly being neglected in teaching our people. Some way people are just not as enthused about Divine healing as we were in the past days. I have been asked the question many times, why is it much easier to trust the Lord for salvation than it is for healing? That is a question that I cannot answer. Is it because we have more faith in man than in God? Or because of pain or fear? I do not know. When we were pastoring a church one time we were called one morning to pray for a lady of the church which had taken ill suddenly. When we got there we found out that she had already called the doctor. We began to pray and seemed like we were getting no where. While we were praying she suddenly raised up and said, "Where is the doctor? Why doesn't he get here?" I wonder who her faith was in, God or the doctor. One time when Jesus was ministering to the people He said something that should show us the healing power of God. Luke 5:17-25. I will not try to write out all of these scriptures, but the thought of it is in the 23rd verse, Jesus said whether is the easier to say, Thy sins be forgiven thee; or to say, rise up and walk? Too many church people today think that all miracles of healing passed away with the disciples, but what did Jesus say to the people in Mark 16:15-18? And He said unto them, Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature. He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned. And these signs shall follow them that believe; In my name shall they cast out devils; they shall speak with new tongues; they shall take up serpents; and if they drink any deadly thing, it shall not hurt them; they shall lay hands on the sick, and they shall recover. James 5:13-16. Is any among you afflicted? Let him pray. Is any merry? Let him sing psalms. Is any sick among you? Let him call for the elders of the church; and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord: And the prayer of faith shall save the sick, and the Lord shall raise him up; and if he have committed sins, they shall be forgiven him." Confess your faults one to another, and pray one for another, that ye may be healed. The effectual fervent prayer of a righteous man availeth much."

LOST – A BOY!



Here even the drudgery of household chores takes on brightness because doing dishes and cleaning house are to help make a happy fireside.

"In the Christian home there is mutual trust and unfailing courtesy. Not that misunderstandings won't come, for they do; but there is forgiveness to heal any breach and to make the way smooth again.

"It is the place where honest effort is made to live the Christian life—the life that tolerates no jealousy, no malice, no hate, no harmful gossip or wounding words. It is the place where good for others is plotted, where friends may come and enjoy a pleasant welcome, and where strangers may find refuge.

"The Christian home is not determined by its furnishings or decorations, not by its conveniences or its gadgets. It is true that the Christian home seeks the bright and beautiful things of this life—but it is not the glitter that makes the gold. It is the atmosphere, the spirit, the intangible something that impresses you as you cross the threshold delicate perfume from flowers across which the breeze has flown into an open window, instead of the stale odor of a place long closed up."

We live in a fast food society made up of instant coffee, fast hamburgers, instant milk, quick pizza, instant oats with throw-away plates and silverware. And we find many in our affluent country are suffering from malnutrition. Yet we wonder why the new easy instant gospel has not produced strong, healthy Christians.

We have seen the no work, get rich quick schemes come and go, and realize that financial wealth does not come without hard work. Still we expect the true riches, spiritual blessings, to come with little or no effort on our part.

We want to see souls brought into the kingdom, young Christians to grow and mature in holiness, and we desire to draw closer to our Lord. These will never happen without much travail in intercessory prayer.

The apostle Paul who has probably won more to Christ, either directly or indirectly, than any other Christian, gives us his example of travail. "My little children, of whom I travail in birth again until Christ be formed in you," (Gal. 4:19). "For ye remember, brethren, our labour and travail; for labouring night and day, because we would not be chargeable unto any of you, we preached unto you the gospel of God." (I Thess. 2:9, II Thess. 3:8,9)

Paul's love for souls was such that he was willing to work day and night that sons and daughters would be brought into the kingdom. He reminds the people of his labour (physical work) and travail (spiritual work).

Many of us today find our prayers filled with asking for the physical and the financial. Paul's prayers were filled with his desires for the spiritual growth of others. (I Thess. 3:9-13; Eph. 3:14-21) Is there not room in our prayers for more unselfish intercession of Paul's kind?

May we also remember Paul's exhortation; "Pray without ceasing." (I Thess. 5:17)

Let us take a look at Christ's prayer life. "And in the morning, rising up a great while before day, he went out, and departed into a solitary place, and prayed." (Mark 1:35)

"And it came to pass in those days, that he went out into a mountain to pray, and continued all night in prayer to God." (Luke 6:12)

Jesus Christ, the very Son of God, felt the need for intense, consistent, and sometimes lengthy times of prayer. In times of great pressure, weariness and stress He renewed His strength by spending time alone with God. (Isa. 40:28-31)

Do we, His servants need the strength and courage that comes from waiting upon the Lord any less?

Jesus said we are His friends if we keep His commandments. (John 15:14) Throughout the Gospels we find the command to pray and to "watch and pray."

Jesus said to look around us and see the abundant harvest of souls which are ready to be brought into the kingdom. Then He said to pray for labours to be sent into the field of harvest. (Matt. 9:37-38).


When the disciples asked Jesus to teach them to pray, He included the phrase: "Thy kingdom come,..." He said to pray that His kingdom would come into the hearts and lives of individuals. Christ wants us to pray for a lost and dying world. Christ desires that we would lift the unsaved up before the throne of God. Praying that the enlightenment and conviction of the Holy Spirit may rest heavily upon them, that they would be saved." The effectual fervent prayer of a righteous man availeth much." (James 5:13-20)

Isaiah 66:7, 8 says; "Before she travailed, she brought forth; before her pain came, she was delivered of a man child. Samuel Chadwick once said, "The one concern of the devil is to keep Christians from praying. He fears nothing from prayerless studies, prayerless work, prayerless religions. He laughs at our toil, mocks at our wisdom, but trembles when we pray."

LIGHT – LOVE – HOLY SPIRIT By Albert Wayne Blythe




