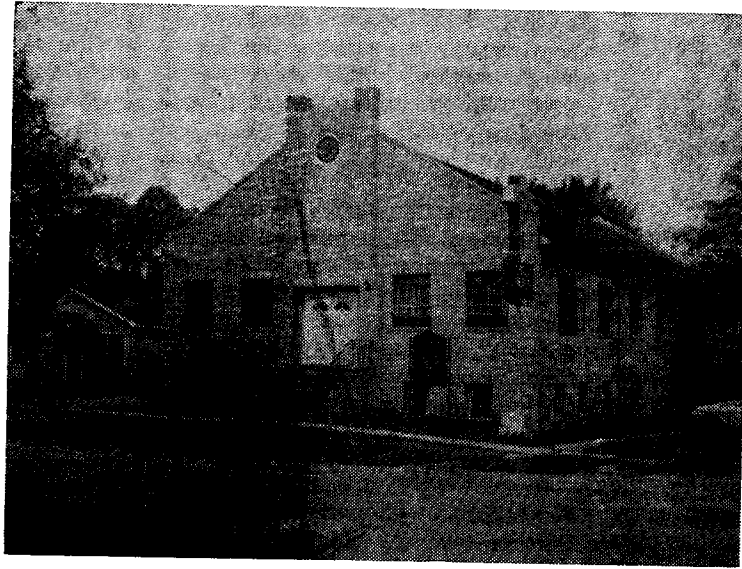

Character Building

Matt. 7:24. "... I will liken him unto a wise man, which built his house on a rock".

Matt. 7:20. "... shall be likened unto a foolish man, which built his house on the sand".

Dig deep, build firm and strong; carve carefully, and add each day with diligence to the life that is your own. We all have a cause or purpose for which to stand. There is a pathway to keep well marked by right. The trouble weeds of wrong will do no good; they only spell sorrow and regret.

The best foundation for character is the solid rock, Christ Jesus, upon whom we can build firmly by true repentance and a personal knowledge of full salvation. We have a soul to save, a Christ to serve, a judgment to face, and an eternity to fill. This knowledge becomes a balance wheel as we build.

There are many rules of society to follow in character training. The rule of the home which will carry its influence through life; the plan of the school with its teachers; and the law of the land with its leaders. Each in their respective fields to lend a hand in producing right methods for solid advancement. Of course, underlying these must be the Righteous Law of God. He made character easier to build by giving us the Golden Rule. Here is a pattern by which we can build confidence in one another, an indispensable factor in well regulated society. A real good character may be built by shunning the evil and choosing the right. Truthfulness and trustworthiness combined to make a bulwark against lying and thieving.

By the law of the Golden Rule we learn to be charitable in judgment and kind in action, and conscientious about the reputation of others. Even the quickness of temper and the sharpness of the tongue can be controlled in character building. You have a planned life covering events of every day living to the crisis which all of us do meet at times. True greatness will be found by a spirit of unselfishness. This may not be plainly shown in the general every day life, but a

crisis reveals the intent of the heart. Distasters often give proof of real Christians and note-worthy characters. What is your attitude and, as much as is possible within the law of reason, your action when another is in trouble? Do wrecks, accidents, loss of home and loved ones of another stir you? We must bear the load.

True greatness of character is herein revealed. Our acts must be motivated by desire and willingness and not compulsion. There can be a habitual moral sluggishness that will not be awakened unless the fire of faith stirs deep in the soul. As we learn more about God, His place for us to work and how to work, and His desire for us, there will come a loftier purpose for us. Let us open wide the half-sealed fountains of love and usefulness, so that the possibilities of what we can do will be realized fully all the time. "I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me" was the yard stick of Paul's measurements. (Phil. 4:13).

It has been said that imagination can build and strengthen character. This is true of mighty builders, great educators, and firm Christians. They seek to mold themselves, influence others, and build for a better tomorrow. The very events of everyday living can be stumbling blocks or stepping stones. One whole, black, dark night cannot put out the light of one small candle.

To have a strong dependable character the interpretation of right values must be present at all times. We must seek correct entertainment, choose the right reading material, and build our close ties with the people who, too, have worthwhile goals in life.

Thoughtfulness is also important in building character. We are more or less what we think. It is not possible to be original without thought.

Again a helping hand or pure action cannot be undertaken if it has not been thought of. Thoughtlessness shows weakness and needs correction. The Bible says, "Consider your ways", Hag. 1:5. The habit of observing and reflecting upon others can be helpful and broaden our vision and deepen our feeling.

We cannot allow good interests and good intentions to evaporate. No man lives to himself nor dies to himself. We must admit that we are all the products of teaching and training. It was for this reason that Paul commanded that his teachings be committed to faithful men, who shall be able to teach others also. II Tim. 2:2.

God in His wisdom left not the building of character to man without an example but sent His Son in the flesh that we might follow Him in all righteousness.

Sinking sand characters are the destroyers of human hopes and civilization. They are selfish and materialistic and thoughtless of the final end result.

True characters are the salt of the earth—lights in the night—cities on the hills—and voices in the wilderness.

Great characters are not easily forgotten.

12 INCH ANSWER

QUESTION: How can I be an effective witness against eternal security?

ANSWER: Rather than a witness against eternal security, I would like to present a few scriptures which prove conditional immortality.

God has given man the **power of choice**. Matt. 16:24. "If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow me". Duet. 30:19, "I call heaven and earth to record this day against you, that I have set before you life and death, blessing and cursing: therefore choose life, that both thou and thy seed may live." Matt. 11:28,29. "Bids us come unto Him and take His yoke". These and many other scriptures place upon us the responsibility as well as the **privilege of choice**. He does not take this away from us when we are saved.

Now a few scriptures of admonition. II Peter 1:11. In this short article it is impossible to quote verbatim all the scripture references we hope to give, much less to enlarge upon each of them. Here are a few high points to watch for in these verses.

1st. Peter directed these words to those who **had obtained** like precious faith, therefore they were saved.

2nd. He gave some commandments to keep adding to faith, virtue, etc.

3rd. If ye have these things ye shall not be barren, but he that

lacketh these things is blind and hath forgotten he was purged from his old sins.

4th. The admonition to make your calling and election sure with the promise that if ye do these things ye shall never fall. The implication is that if you don't, you **SHALL FALL**.

II Peter 3:17. "Ye therefore, beloved, seeing ye know these things before, beware lest ye also, being led away with the error of the wicked, **FALL** from your own steadfastness".

Hebrews 10:35-39. In verse 35, "Cast not away your confidence" implies a choice to cast it away or keep it. Verses 38, 39, The just shall live by faith. The Lord has no pleasure in those who **DRAW BACK** (backslide). We—who cast not away our confidence—are not of them who draw unto perdition, but to them that believe to the saving of the soul.

There is a great deal of human reasoning in the doctrine of eternal security. One of the main ones being that once a man has a son born to him, he is a son forever. A son is a son only as long as he lives. The dead cannot inherit. A man who has lost a son in death has a son no longer. He becomes the memory of the son he once had. Again there is the matter of disinheritance. A perfect picture of the backslider who is dead while he liveth, or one who is disinherited by God who will not condone **SIN**.

Another human reasoning is that God will not mar his books by

placing a name in it then scratching it out. Exodus 32:33. Moses, in pleading for Israel, ask that his name be blotted out of the book for them. The Lord's answer "whosoever hath sinned against me, him will I blot out of my book".

Rev. 3:6. God promised the overcomer that He would not blot his name out of the book of life. To blot out is not to scratch off. "Blessed is the man to whom the Lord will not impute sin." Rom. 4:8. As we study the 4th and 5th chapters of Romans, Paul is teaching that we are justified by faith and **not** by law. In Romans 5:13, "For until the law, sin was in the world: but sin is not imputed when there is no law". I see no connection between this and the man who fails God.

Because of limited space I will merely list a few more scriptures with some thoughts for guiding your study.

Heb. 4:11. Lest any man fall.

Heb. 3:6. If we hold fast.

Ezek. 33:13. Righteousness shall not be remembered.

Ezek. 33:18. Righteous turn and commit iniquity, he shall die.

I Tim. 4:1. Some shall depart from the faith.

Rev. 3:16. I will spue thee out of my mouth.

Rev. 2:10. Be faithful unto death.

In bringing this article to a close, may I admonish you to fight the good fight of faith, lay hold on eternal life, also to hold that fast which thou hast, that no man take thy crown. I Tim. 6:12 and Rev. 3:11.

In a world where too much is new.

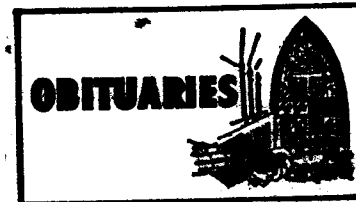

How Others Do It

PICTURE STORY BOX

Materials needed: an empty card box, (size 8x6½x1¼). This can be obtained from local gift shop, etc.) Two dowel pins, 9½ inches in length and ¼ inch in diameter, (can be obtained from Hardware store) and colored pictures to illustrate story to tell.

Directions for making; Prepare the box by putting holes through the sides of both the lid and the bottom so that the wooden dowel pins may be inserted. Cut out a portion of the box top or lid (size 3x4 inches) with a razor blade to make the window.

Paste pictures to illustrate story on a long narrow strip of paper or construction paper about 3 inches wide. Fasten each end of the strip to the dowel pins with staples. These hold much better than paste. Wind at both ends, leaving just enough paper to fit the space between the holes in your box. Place pins through holes in the bottom part of the box and then carefully work the top of the box over the pins. Roll the pictures from one pin to the other as you tell the story.

This can be used for Bible Memory work, an extra surprise story, or even a song. The same idea can be used with a large box representing a TV set etc. Cover it with shelf paper and you have a fascinating tool to use for God.
