PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Jewish Community and the Future of the Jewish People

Some good things happened this month in our KJCC mishpoche. In our Religious School class, parents and their young kids expressed their interest in

learning this year more Jewish History and more Hebrew language. In our Adult Hebrew class, we have new students eager to remember their basic Hebrew School studies, and more advanced students interested in starting modern spoken Ulpan Hebrew.

Coming to Hebrew classes is not only about learning a language; in each class we find ourselves conversing about the Jewish World, Israel, Jewish heritage, culture, values, and the meaning of Jewishness. From those conversations we get ideas for our Adult Education lectures and seminars, where we can discuss many aspects of Judaism and Jewish Community.

Patty Silver (Schocket) has been looking into a program for the KJCC, an organized trip to Israel, and has suggested a tour that, in my opinion, will enrich and strengthen our ties to Israel and our Jewish Inheritance.

It was also this month that leaders of the Jewish Communities of America gathered in Los Angeles, to discuss the relationship of the Diaspora and Israel, and the future of the Jewish People. It seems to me that guest speaker Tzipi Livni, Israel's Foreign Minister, expressed our concern for Jewish Identity and Jewish Continuity, in a very moving speech, and that we, in our small community, with our "small" KJCC activities are already playing a role in this Jewish "Drama". The following excerpts from that speech gives us an important message:

FM Livni addresses General Assembly of the United Jewish Communities

Livni: "We face a regime that denies and mocks the Holocaust while seeking the weapons to perpetrate one. Iran's words and actions are not only a direct threat to Israel, but they are no less a threat to the values that the international community as a whole claims to hold dear."

(The following is a transcription of the text of Foreign Minister Tzipi Livni's speech to the General Assembly of the United Jewish Communities in Los Angeles on November 12, 2006.)

H.E. Tzipi Livni

Vice Prime Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs

State of Israel

"Dear Friends,

I am here today as a Jew and as an Israeli, in that order.

Many miles separate Los Angeles from Jerusalem, but the ties that bind us cannot, and should not, be broken by distance, because we are one people.

We are one people, but we cannot take the bond between us for granted. I believe that Jewish identity is a choice and a responsibility as much as it is an inheritance. Our Jewishness is more than a fact, it is a profound feeling that must be created, nurtured, and sustained.

I know that all of us are here because our Jewish identity is precious to us - it shapes who we are and who we want to be. Too often our relationship is defined only in terms of common dangers. We do indeed face common dangers, but our bond goes far beyond that.

Our bond is built on shared history and shared fate - on a rich tapestry of tradition, values, and culture, and on a mutual responsibility not just to protect our Jewish identity, but to make it flourish in our generation and in generations to come.

As an Israeli, I have to ask myself whether we are not in danger of creating a new Israeli identity that feels removed from its Jewish heritage, and a result, from the Jewish Diaspora. I am sure, too, that you ask yourselves whether there is a risk that Jewish identity in the Diaspora is evolving in such a way that the deep connection to Israel may, in time, no longer be one of its central pillars.

I believe strongly that we share a responsibility to prevent a rift developing between Israeli identity and Jewish identity. Together, we need to ensure that Jewish children throughout the Diaspora see Israel as their home, just as the Jewish children of Israel must see you as their family.

At the same time, the collective mission of the Jewish people cannot be limited to focusing on our own predicament.

Our unique history and talents as a people oblige us to work also for the betterment of the world as a whole, to stand against the suffering of others, of the kind we see in Darfur, and to continue to make exceptional contributions to the societies in which we live.

Dear Friends.

The principles that shape the identity of the Jewish people have also shaped the collective identity and national story of the State of Israel - a story of courage and rebirth greater than any Hollywood scriptwriter could have imagined.

From its establishment, two core values have formed and driven our national character. The first - that Israel, with Jerusalem at its heart, is the national homeland of the Jewish people - it is both the spiritual and cultural heartbeat of our ancient people, and their refuge from persecution.

The second - that Israel is a democracy; that the values of justice, peace and humanity - first expressed by the prophets of Israel - are an integral part of our nation's sense of mission.

The decisions we take as a state, those that I make as foreign minister and member of the Israeli government, are guided by these core principles and values on which our society is based. They must take account not only of the interests of Israel, but also the interests of the Jewish people as a whole.

Together, in upholding these values, we face challenges on three different fronts: as a people defending our basic right to a national homeland; as Jews against the dark hatred of anti-Semitism; and as members of the free world against the forces of global terrorism.

In each case, what is at stake is not just our physical security or existence, but our very right to a Jewish national identity and a place our people can call home.

During the war in Lebanon we learned again of the courage of our soldiers, the resilience of our civilians, and the strength of our economy.

We also saw you, once again, our Jewish brothers and sisters, in action - organizing rallies, coming on solidarity missions, contributing with extraordinary generosity and thoughtfulness - with unconditional kindness - in so many ways: university scholarships for students called up for army duty, air conditioners for bomb shelters, camps for the children of the North and so much more.

I cannot tell you how much these efforts

meant to us. I cannot express in words how important it is for us to know that we are not alone

We live in a world in which perception can matter more than reality.This is a serious challenge that requires us to close the gap between the image of Israel and the reality of Israel

In this spirit, I have launched an initiative at the Foreign Ministry on branding Israel. Working with a broad cross-section of Israeli society, as well as leaders in fields of public relations, education, tourism, and others, we want Israel to be seen not only in the shadow of conflict and terrorism, but also in the bright light of its vibrant culture and rich identity.

We want every Israeli to identify with the resilience, spirituality, creativity, and vitality that is Israel. We are proud of the values and qualities that make us who we are and we want to be associated with them.

We want the world to see what Warren Buffet saw when he purchased Iscar last spring: "Some Americans have come to the Middle East looking for oil," he said. "We came to the Middle East looking for brains, and we stopped at Israel."

And today, I ask you to join me in helping the world see more of Israel than the image they see on their television screens.

Let your hometown come to know Israel's Nobel Prize winners and performing artists. Get your federation to host an Israeli film festival or hi-tech fair. Help us widen the lens and let the world see who we really are.

In this, as in so many other things, you are our partners. We have a shared connection to the past, and a common objective for the future. We will stand with you in good times and in bad, just as you have stood with us.

We in Israel greatly appreciate your efforts, your friendship, and your support. However unaccustomed you are to hearing this from an Israeli, let me say the obvious, and let me say

it out loud, in my name and in the name of the people of Israel:

Israel: Image and Reality, Revealing Israel's Diverse Nature, Its Creativity and Achievements

FM Tzipi Livni spoke of the need to improve Israel's image in the world. The following report on a UN conference in Israel this last month gives a good example of how it can be done. Israel does it by contributing to the International Community creativity and high level Of education.

Report: UN conference at Ben-Gurion University highlights

Israel's leadership in desert research

"With the support of the Israeli Ministry of Foreign Affairs, an international conference on desertification was being held in November in Israel. Over 200 people from 30 countries have come to Israel to learn about "Deserts and Desertification: Challenges and Opportunities." The conference, which highlights Israel's role as a leader in the field of desertification, was organized by the Jacob Blaustein Institutes for Desert Research (BIDR) at Ben-Gurion University of the Negev, together with the United Nations Convention to Combat Desertification -Annex IV nations (UNCCD) and, as mentioned, in collaboration with the Israeli Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

Speaking at the opening plenary session, Ambassador Gregoire de Kalbermatten, Deputy General Secretary of the United Nations Conference on Combatting Desertification (UNCCD), lauded Israel's success in developing solutions for desert living. He presented a statement prepared by the United Nations Development Programme

that acknowledged Israel's role as a leader in dryland agriculture:

"The United Nations Development Programme is pleased to have collaborated with Israel in a number of ways. Israel's technical prowess and technological innovation are well-known around the globe, and provide us with lessons about how to achieve the potential of the world's drylands. They have not only set standards in production, they have become experts in meeting the standards required by global markets."

Statement by the UNDP

This is the first time that a UN General Assembly resolution has welcomed an Israeli initiative on an issue that is high on the global agenda and it comes as an acknowledgement of the State of Israel's leadership role in the worldwide battle against desertification.

Organizer Prof. Alon Tal explains, "We have brought together social activists and scientists, technicians and politicians, so that they can confront the urgency of combatting desertification."

University President, Prof. Rivka Carmi, welcomed the UN initiative and the guests from around the world. "Near this hall lies the gravesite of David Ben-Gurion, visionary founder and first prime minister of the State of Israel. He is buried on the edge of the cliff overlooking the Zinn Canyon because he believed that the desert holds all the potential and hope for the future," she said. "Combating desertification and making the Negev desert bloom were Ben-Gurion's passionate missions and this conference is also serving as a living memorial to this great man's ideals."

"We are very proud that the Israeli event marking the year of Desert and Desertification has been organized by the BIDR. This is just part of the ongoing commitment to realize the mission of BGU and to contribute to the development of the Negev and other drylands of the world," said Director of the BIDR, Prof. Avigad

Vonshak. "Our researchers represent Israel on a number of multi-lateral and international committees. By hosting the conference here in Sede Boqer we are able to highlight the Institutes' role in the worldwide effort to stem desertification."



KJCC Religious School News

What a warm welcome this teacher received returning from the northlands to her first class this season on October 29th. Most remarkably, a good deal of it was in Hebrew. Our children showed not only that they retained much of last year's learnings but that they have been expanding and adding to the knowledge, reading skills, enthusiasm, and mini-"menschlichkeit" they already have.

An exciting new dimension has been added to our school this year: a wonderful increase in the ranks of tutors. It is almost unheard of in traditional synagogues for post Bar and Bat Mitzvah graduates to return to their religious schools in any fashion. But to return with

CABBAGE SOUP

1 small head of cabbage 1 tbs Kosher salt
1 can tomato soup 2 soup cans water
1 large can peeled Italian tomatoes 1 small onion
1/2 cup sugar 1 1/2 lbs flanken

Shred cabbage and soak in water and salt for 1/2 hour. Grate or shred the onion. Drain cabbage but do not wash off the salt. Combine all ingredients in a heavy kettle. Simmer on low heat until meat is tender.

MAGIC MACAROONS

16 oz shredded coconut 1 15 oz can sweetened condensed milk

2 tsp vanilla extract 1/2 cup mini chocolate chips

Preheat oven to 350°. Blend ALL ingredients together thoroughly. Grease cookie sheet or shallow pan well. Drop batter by teaspoonful, spacing macaroons about 2" apart. Shape with fingers. Bake 10-12 minutes. Cool 1 minute and remove to wire cooling rack.

CHEESE BALL - GREAT FOR COMPANY

1 lb medium or mild cheddar cheese

8 oz cream cheese

1 garlic clove, peeled

OPTIONAL

1/2 cup chopped walnuts chili powder

Let both cheeses come to room temperature. Mash cheeses with a fork in a medium size bowl. Press garlic, add to cheese mixture and mix well. You may add the nuts at this time, if you wish. Form cheese with your hands into 2 small balls or logs. For "hot" flavor, sprinkle chili powder on waxed paper and roll the cheese ball until evenly coated. Wrap finished balls in plastic wrap and store in refrigerator.
