#### DO YOU LOVE ME MORE THAN THESE...?

Acts 5:27-32, 40-41; Psalm 30:2, 4-6, 11-13; Rev. 5:11-14; John 21:1-19

In Jeremiah 17: 5-8 we read: "Thus says the Lord: Cursed is the one who trusts in human beings, who seeks his strength in flesh, whose heart turns away from the Lord. He is like a barren bush in the desert that enjoys no change of season...Blessed is the person who trusts in the Lord, whose hope is the Lord. He is like a tree planted besides the waters..."

Following Christ is not just a call but it is also a commitment. At baptism (and confirmation), you and I made a commitment when asked: "Do you reject Satan?" And we responded, "I do!" Many made a commitment, when on their wedding day, they said: "I do!" Some, on their ordination day, said: "I am!" In other words, I do commit myself to Jesus and His teaching through the Church. We commit ourselves to our families - to our work and to what we hold dear to ourselves and to what we believe to be true.

We live in a society that is more and more relativistic. More and more people are becoming disinterested in making commitments. Many in society frown upon "organized religion" simply because they do not want to commit themselves to the demands of belonging to such groups. In this country, our relativistic tendencies have allowed many to think that it is all right for a minor to purchase the "Morning After Pill" without her parent's permission. It has allowed some to think that it is all right to destroy innocent lives just because they believe it is inconvenient to be pregnant. Our relativism has induced many to be nonchalant when lives are destroyed with weapons of war. Our relativism has turned us into a society that condones the destruction of human embryos in the name of seeking a cure for illness - a society that tends to worship the creatures rather than the Creator. Our relativism drives some of us to love material things "with all their hearts" far and beyond their love for God, the Creator.

In today's Gospel, Jesus asked Simon Peter, "...Do you love Me more than these?" Earlier, in Matthew 4: 18-22, Peter made a commitment to follow Jesus, when he and his brother, Andrew left their boat and their father behind to follow Jesus. Initially, they were thrilled and excited; thus, they left everything behind and followed Jesus. But, when the going got tough, together with the other disciples, they fled. Peter denied that he ever knew Jesus. It probably seemed boring after Jesus died. There was a vacuum in the disciples' life. It was a moment of despair and emptiness. The void had to be filled. Thus, forgetting the commitment he had made, Peter said, "I am going fishing." "I am going back to my old ways!" The other disciples followed, "We also will come with you." In moments of temptation and trial, we often forget the commitment we made to God, to our spouses and/or to ourselves.

Today, you and I are challenged to profess whether we love Jesus "more than these." Do you love Him more than your "convenience?" Do you love pleasure more than Jesus? Do you love to follow the masses rather than suffer ridicule for practicing what the Church teaches? You and I must not forget that following Christ is a life-long commitment. In fact, "Once the hand is laid on the plough, no one who looks back is fit for the kingdom of God" (Luke 9:62). Remember, in today's Gospel, the Apostles were only able to make a "great catch of fish" with Jesus' help. Therefore, if you and I want to gain something greater than life itself, we must prefer to love Jesus more than anything else. Let's strive to do that in practical terms!

# YEAR OF FAITH



In the midst of Eastertide Holy Mother Church reminds us of our origins as we listen to the words of the Acts of the Apostles and the various accounts of the Risen Lord's appearances to the disciples. Each gives us insight into the nature of our faith community. Our Creed, given us by the Fathers of the Councils of Nicaea and

Constantinople, defines it succinctly: "I believe in the one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church."

The Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) teaches that the oneness of the ecclesial community is "because of her source...The Church is one because of her 'soul.' It is the Holy Spirit" (813). Though visibly diverse, for example, in liturgical rites, there are bonds of unity which are enumerated in the CCC: "profession of our faith received from the Apostles; common celebration of divine worship...apostolic succession through the Sacrament of Holy Orders" (815). It is, therefore, a great grief to all Christians that the prayer of Jesus at the Last Supper calling for "one shepherd and one flock," is not a reality. Too often scandal has been given where the followers of Christ are in a tug of war rather than a fraternal embrace.

The Catechism then goes on to recognize: "The Church is held, as a matter of faith, to be unfailingly holy...The Church is the holy People of God and her members are called saints" (823). This teaching of the Constitution on the Church from the Second Vatican Council calls us into a closer walk with Christ for He is the cause of the holiness of the Church. The signs of this holiness in us, as Popes Benedict and Francis have taught us so eloquently in our time, is charity. This is what creates a contrast with the world. Its consumerism and materialism must be confronted by our prioritizing the needs of others in sharing our "daily bread."

Cardinal Dolan recently highlighted for all of us the traditional meaning of "catholic." When questioned as to whether the Church excludes anyone, he quickly responded in the words of James Joyce defining Catholicism as "here comes everybody." There is no segment of the population which is excluded from being part of the Church. In fact, the Second Vatican Council sought to exploit the aspects of commonality with people outside of the communion of faith, stressed love for them, while recognizing aspects of life and tradition which hamper the fullness of unity. Though some act as if this is a new teaching, it is not.

The final mark of the Church is that of being apostolic. Again the CCC reminds us that she is built upon the foundation of the Apostles called by Christ. We possess and share the same teachings. And finally, they strengthen the Church from their thrones in heaven as their successors, the bishops, provide us with guidance and wisdom on earth. Though some would seek new paths built upon post-modern consciousness, we revel in the fact that rooted in the past; we stand firmly in the present in our witness to Christ reaching out to a future in much need of wisdom, love, and mercy.

Come to Church! Meet the Lord! Care for your brothers and sisters!

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
