# Pastor's Study Desk Notes



Dear St Pius And St Anthony Churches,

31st Sunday Ordinary Year C Luke 19:1-10

**Happy Tree-climbing!** As kids we often would go out to play in the yard and neighborhood and we often made up our own games or activities. Of course, we might play some common games like 'hide & seek', 'pitch & catch' or 'pickle'. We might also have made up some contest like seeing who could throw a walnut the farthest down the railroad tracks. But we were always on the lookout for the *best trees to climb*-the ones with low enough branches to grab hold of and swing up onto the next level limbs to get you started climbing to the top. I always wonder if kids' fascination with trees, is what makes children love the Zacchaeus story so much: The fact that Zacchaeus is not above climbing a good old tree again (enjoying such a kid's game). Jesus did say in Mathew 18:3 "unless you turn and become like children, you will not enter the kingdom of heaven." So, maybe Zacchaeus was playing a little 'hide and seek' because of the shame he felt over his past behavior when it came to meeting Jesus (notice the last lines of today's gospel Lk 19:10-'Son of Man came *to seek'*).

Yet, I think everyone loves this story of conversion! Do you? And if so, what is it about Zacchaeus that warms your heart? The story does have a great ending, as not only is Zacchaeus' soul saved, setting him back on the right track again, but other people benefit greatly from his making amends for his offenses, too. He makes restitution and pays his victims back four times over their loss and gives away half of his estate to help lift up the poor (perhaps the impromptu celebration dinner at his house that night with Jesus, inspired him to open a shelter for the homeless and a food service to the hungry.) There is a lot to love about this story.

Of course, we know that Jesus knows all: He knows us all individually. I suspect Jesus' eagerness to call out Zacchaeus by name and so boldly invite Himself over to Zacchaeus' house, had to do with Zacchaeus already being on Jesus's radar for a while. My suspicion is that since Zacchaeus was a 'chief tax collector', he may have been Levi-Matthew's boss. Ever since Levi converted back in chapter 5 of Luke, Jesus had been watching for Zacchaeus' 'turn' to gospel living. Back when Levi converted and answered Jesus' call, we learn that Levi also threw a banquet celebration that night with Jesus and other fellow tax collectors attending (Luke 5:26 says 'a large crowd'). I imagine Zacchaeus in that group. Or at least I imagine Zacchaeus hearing the office talk about Jesus, later on as he agents raved about Jesus. I can see such excitement among his workers, arousing his curiosity about Jesus. So, I suggest that Jesus had been praying about and preparing Zacchaeus (and how many others) for them to accept Him at a later time.

Yet, even if Jesus didn't first encounter Zacchaeus at Levi-Matthew's banquet, still, Jesus always knows his sheep. John 10:3 tells us that the Good Shepherd, "calls his own sheep by name". Jesus did that, calling up the tree to 'Zacchaeus' by name (Luke 19:5). This is not the first time that Jesus has stated that he knew someone before he formally met them for the first time. He performed a similar 'personal' calling and individual recognition before ever publically meeting the person, back in the beginning of John's gospel too. As Nathaniel approached Jesus for the first time, Jesus calls out to him "Here is a true Israelite...."(Jn 1:47) How does Jesus know him already? I think Jesus is pointing out how Hebrew, the name Nathaniel is: 'Nathaniel'. It means 'God-Given'. So of course, God knows the identity of the person with such a name: God gave it to him, so of course God knows it- Jesus knows Nathaniel is a true godly man. In John 1:48, Nathaniel says, "'How do you know me?' Jesus answered, "Before Philip called you, I saw you under the fig tree."' I'm not saying it for sure, but since Jesus says He saw Nathaniel under the fig tree, it sounds like at that moment, Nathaniel was 'ripe for the picking', so Jesus called him. I find this to be another example of Jesus' personal touch in calling us. Jesus 'softens' or prepares the hearts of those that He will later approach with the big 'ask' of 'Come, follow me!' Jesus knows His sheep. Do we hear Him call us?
