Directions: from Hwy 63 take St Hwy 14 west appx. 1-1/2 miles, look for flags.



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The bike show on 3/27/01, sponsored by Tony Ackerman of Thayer Motosports Farm, was well attended. Thayer M/S Farms is a motorcycle park near Thayer, MO. It is home to a 3/4 mile MX track and about 4 miles of woods trails. They hold MX races about every other weekend. This is also the place where the last Hillbilly Gran Prix was held. The Ackermans are super nice folks who are developing a first class motorcycle park. I encourage everyone to make the trip to Thayer Motorsports Farm.

I would estimate about 200 people came through between 1:00 and 6:00. Team KTM displayed their factory semi. West Plains



We talked to lots of people about off-road racing and riding. Enduro is not an easy form of racing to explain. Al-



As 13 "AA" riders blasted around the first turn at round 2 of the Missouri Hare Scrambles Championship, defending series champion Steve Leivan was still on the line in an attempt to get his bike started. As the last of the pack roared out of sight, Leivan's WR426 came to life and he set out on a charge that would see him carve through the pack until he finally took the lead on the final lap and secured the overall victory.

"The start was all my fault. I haven't spent much time on the bike for about four months, and I think I just got a little ahead of myself and paid the price. Once I got going, I felt pretty good and just put myself in a position to capitalize on the mistakes the other guys made," said SCR/Yamaha/Answer/DunloptSilkolenetScott/TsubakiClarke/ NGK/ProClean 1000/Flatland Racing-sponsored Leivan.

Having suffered a severely broken femur two weeks prior to the race, Brush Busters leader Jay Williams called on a group of buddies to help put on the event. The guys laid out a 9.2 mile course that included rocky single-track trails, fast fire roads, creek crossings, field sections, and a couple of slick hill climbs. 231 riders competed with the top riders making five laps.

Aaron Shaw blasted into the lead on his Yamaha with Bobby Duncan on his J&W Cycles/WD-40/Wiseco-backed Kawasaki in tow. Round one winner Brandon Forrester got a good start ahead of Chris Nesbitt and Jerry Heinam, who rounded out the top five.

Within a few miles, Leivan had charged through the pack and up to sixth, but by the time he got there the five front runners had pulled away, and leader Shaw had really pulled away.

"I looked back after a couple of miles in a field section and couldn't see anyone, but then I started to get nervous and thought I might wear myself out by going too fast too early. I tried to calm down and just cruise after that," Shaw explained.

One mile into the second lap, Leivan was handed the fourth position when Nesbitt took a nasty spill and was pinned under his bike for several seconds before getting underway in sixth behind Hemann.

Leivan closed the gap on Forrester, who in turn caught up to the rear wheel of Duncan. The three riders freight-trained through the trees in an effort to run down Shaw, who had built a 15 second lead.

As Duncan attempted to launch across a section of ruts, he came up a little short and was sent over the bars. Leivan was able to steer around and move up to third while Forrester took over second. Shaw made a bobble while trying to pass a slower rider and center-punched a tree, allowing Forrester to take over the lead, while Shaw got going just in front of Leivan, but was soon passed and Hemann was hanging tough in the number four spot. Duncan had recovered from his fall and held fifth.

Early in lap three, Shaw caught and passed Forrester for the lead, although only temporarily as Forrester would be back in front by the lap's end. Leivan clocked in nearly 20 seconds back, having lost time while negotiating the "Moon Rocks" section. Hemann pulled off for fuel just before the check, allowing Leivan back into third, while Duncan suffered another get off, but still held fifth.

Things started to come apart for Shaw starting the fourth lap as he began to suffer handling problems. It was later learned that his rear shock seal had let go, leaking out the oil and reacting to the rocks like a pogo stick. Leivan was soon around and set out after Forrester while Shaw just tried to keep going forward.

Knowing that the race was winding down, Leivan reeled in Forrester and was content to follow, while checking out lines and using the Kawasaki rider to pull him through the rutted bogs.

"Late in the race, most of the bad spots had been rerouted, but there were a few places where you had some options. I was kind of watching where he was going and deciding where I wanted to go the last lap to try to pass him," explained Leivan.

As it turned out, Leivan almost didn't have to make that last lap pass as Forrester swung into the pits for a splash of fuel heading into the final lap.

"I thought that he would probably stop and when he did. I thought about

"I thought that he would probably stop and when he did, I thought about trying to get away. But I thought if I could keep him behind me for a few miles and save some energy, I would push really hard the last few miles and try to get away," Leivan said.

Forrester had other ideas. He caught back up and chose a faster line through a rutted hillside to re-take the number one position. With roughly five miles left in the event, it was a two-man show, and the race was on.

Leivan glued himself to Forrester's rear tire looking for a mistake or opportunity. Oddly enough, the opportunity came in one of the areas that had been rerouted earlier.

"They had changed the course the lap before, and we swung wide around a cedar tree. I wondered why we weren't ducking through the branches and making a straight line out of it and figured by the last lap that would be the line. Fortunately, no one had gone there and Brandon never saw it, so I just dropped my head and bashed my way through and into the lead," said Leivan.

Forrester hung close and made one final run in the final couple of miles, but lost time in his attempt to take the lead. "I went the same way through the last mud hole that I had been going all day, but there was a guy stuck in the rut I was in. I had to jerk the bike out of it and lost some time," Forrester explained.

Leivan, noticing that he could no longer hear Forrester behind him, upped the pace while heading for home. As he entered the final grass track, he looked back and couldn't see Forrester and knew that the win was his. With his fist in the air and his pit crew cheering loudly, Leivan put his 59th career victory in the books and looks forward to going after an unprecedented ninth overall championship.

Forrester finished in second and that result, combined with a win at the opener, gives him the points lead. The 17 year old has smoothed out over the last year and looks to be a front runner all year.

Hemann was able to reel in a struggling Shaw on the final lap and take the final podium position away during the last mile of the race. Claiming at the season opener that he would only be riding "until it gets hot," he has proven

that he has the pace to run up front: maybe his summer vacation will have to wait. Shaw finished in fourth after setting the pace for much of the event. Team Green/Moose/Scott/Pro Circuit rider Nesbitt recovered from his early crash to take fifth, just ahead of Mike Windmann on a 400 KTM thumper. Seventh overall went to "A" class winner Kevin Borts on his DR400 Suzuki. Borts led every lap and beat over half of the "AA" riders. Dale Rector put his YZ426 into eighth overall, second "A," with Les Busenbark and Brad Barnett rounding out the top 10.


