Joint Statement on the Death of George Floyd

NASHVILLE (BP) -- Southern Baptist leaders have published a statement grieving the recent death of George Floyd and calling for the end of "racial inequity in the distribution of justice in

our country." The statement, co-authored by SBC president J.D. Greear and New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary president Jamie Dew was unanimously signed by all

people, Southern Baptists grieve the death of George Floyd, who was killed May 25, 2020, in Minneapolis, Minn.

While all must grieve, we understand that in the hearts of our fellow citizens of

color, incidents like these connect to a long history of unequal justice in our country, going back to the grievous Jim Crow and slavery eras. The images and information we have available to us in this case are

horrific and remind us that there is much more work to be done to ensure that there is not even a hint of racial inequity in the distribution of justice in our country. We grieve to see examples of the misuse of force, and call for these issues to be addressed with speed and justice.

While we thank God for our law enforcement officers that bravely risk their lives for the sake of others and uphold justice with dignity and integrity, we also lament when some law enforcement officers misuse their authority and bring unnecessary harm on the people they are called to protect. We further grieve with our minority brothers and sisters in the wake of George Floyd's death, pray for his family and friends and greatly desire to see the misuse of force and any inequitable distributions of justice come to an end.

Throughout the Old and New Tes-

taments, the Bible speaks to matters of justice and human dignity. We are taught by Scripture that human beings are distinct among the rest of creation as those beings which bear the divine image. From the beginning of life to the end, all human beings, both male and female--of all ethnicities, colors and ages--are sacred beings that God values and loves.

Throughout the law, the prophets, the gospels and the entire canon of Scripture, murder is condemned and God's people are called to protect the vulnerable. The Bible further condemns injustice and the misuse of authority and force. And in the example of Jesus Christ, God's people are called to love others, care for their needs, grieve with them in brokenness and labor for the well-being of our neighbor. To follow Christ is to follow in these examples He puts before us.

Therefore, as a matter of Christian obedience and devotion, followers of Jesus Christ cannot remain silent when our brothers and sisters, friends and/or people we seek to win for Christ are mistreated, abused or killed unnecessarily.

Therefore, we pray for our local, state, and national leaders as they seek justice, and call on them to act quickly and diligently to ensure that these situations are brought to an end. As a people, Southern Baptists stand ready to help towards that end. May God give us His favor, help and strength in this effort.

Church Strengthening

This is the start of a monthly book review column for pastors and church leaders. As the Church Strengthening

Team leader I would like to pass on some short reviews of books that I think would benefit ministry leaders. The first review will start with a book I received for free from www.truth78.org.

Zealous: 7 Commitments for the Discipleship of the Next Generations, by David Michael, (Minneapolis, MN: Truth 78, 2020), 134 pp., paperback.

This book is divided into three parts: acknowledgements, four appendices, and some general information about ZEALOUS Truth 78. Part I asks what is zeal and why does it matter? Eleven pages cover the answer to these ques-

tions. This section also works in evidence for the downward trend in church attendance and particularly the decline of church attendance among young people. While building on Romans 12:11, "Do not be slothful in zeal, be fervent in spirit, serve the Lord," the author states zeal in Scripture is not simply enthusiasm. It is fervor and diligence born out of a passion for God and His glory. It is the result of a heart on fire for the glory of God that is uncontainable and spills out in zealous evangelism, discipleship, service, and good works.

Part II is the largest section of the book and contains the 7 commitments for the discipleship of the next generations. They are 1) Embrace a Biblical Vision for the Faith of the Next Generation; 2) Foster a Robust Partnership Between Church and Home; 3) Teach the Breadth and Depth of the Whole Counsel of God; 4) Proclaim the Glorious Gospel of Jesus Christ; 5) Disciple the Mind, Heart, and Will; 6) Pray with Dependence on God's Sovereign Grace; 7) Inspire Worship of God, for the Glory of God.

confronted by the giant David said, "You come to me with a sword, a spear, and a javelin, but I come to you in the name of the Lord of hosts, the God of the armies of Israel, whom you have taunted. This day the Lord will deliver you up into my hands, and I will strike you down and remove your head from you. And I will give the dead bodies of the army of the Philistines this day to the birds of the sky and the wild heasts of the earth, that all the earth may know that there is a God in Israel, and that all this assembly may know that the Lord does not deliver by sword or by spear; for the battle is the Lord's and He will give you into our hands" (1 Sam 17:45-47, NASB).

God says elsewhere, *Not by might, nor by power, but by my spirit*. When we fight the enemy the wrong way we take matters into our own hands. God says, in essence, "he who lives by the sword dies by the sword."

So how do we fight? God replies, If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves, and pray, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways; then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin, and will heal their land (2 Chron 7:14, KJV).
