#### April 2024 **Troop 78 Hits the Slopes in Vermont!**

On Thursday March 7 my family and I left to go to Mt. Snow in West Dover, Vermont. My family decided to go a day earlier to meet the troop for the ski trip. It was a long six-hour ride in our car traveling from Malvern, Pennsylvania to West Dover, Vermont. We put our things on the bus and then left on a long seven-hour bus ride back to the troop's cabin in Pennsylvania. We played Among Us, read, or slept until we all started getting hungry. John was the SPL during the trip so we asked him if we could stop for a snack. He replied by saying "No." John got off a little while later to see a nearby college. We then asked the adults when we were stopped to

get gas if we could get a snack. To our surprise they said, "Yes." We then went inside the store to either go to the restroom or buy a bunch of donuts and snacks. We ate and rested for the rest of the ride until we got back home after an exhausting but fun skiing trip.

There was plenty to do like cool 3D shows, live performances, and many shops to check out. Each group was in charge of getting lunch for themselves in the park and having to deal with Disney's high prices. Then each group was in charge of getting back to camp in time for dinner or cooking. Once everyone was back, then we had dinner at 5 o'clock because we wanted to return to the park to ride the Tron ride. We had a dinner of hot dogs and mac and cheese. # **Importance and Expectations of Troop Fundraising**

What about the dues we collect every year?

Exactly \$0 goes to the Troop.

100% of the annual dues go to pay for your Scout's required fees to Chester County Council and the National organization of Boy Scouts of America. We keep none of those funds for Troop operations.

Our program operates exclusively from Troop fundraising and the support of our Charter Organization - Friends of Troop 78.

Nearly every monthly trip is free to the Scouts who attend. Trips like our Vermont Ski Trip and Whitewater Rafting that do have some fees are very heavily subsidized for our youth members. We will be touring the Baltimore Aquarium later this season and it will cost your Scout nothing to come with us. This is all incredible!

#### How do we do it?

We also hold the expectation that every scout and scout family, should have some participation in all of our fundraisers. To further incentivize this, all three fundraisers provide some funds back to your Scout in their individual Scouting Camping Account, based on that Scout's family's contribution to the fundraiser itself. These funds are yours, and can be used to cover costs for trips that are not 100% covered by the troop, or help to cover Summer Camp, Florida, or High Adventure Scout Trips like Canada, Philmont, SeaBase or Switzerland. Your son's participation in fundraisers also allows for a way to get scholarship funds for high adventure trips like some of the ones just mentioned.

In our last fundraiser, the fall Poinsettia and Wreath Sale, we missed our budget target by about \$1,000. This was in part, because only about 50% of our Scouts and their families participated in the fundraiser. The Committee could have made up the deficit by simply not contributing funds to the Scouts that did participate, but voted to accept a deficit and support the scouts who did make sales.

#### What does this mean?

Well, we have 2 fundraisers coming up and your participation is 100% needed for both; and with the spring flower sale in particular. A great deal of work has gone into creating the online store to allow easy ordering and sales; making it easy for scouts and their families to participate in the Flower Sale. We need every single scouting family to participate and to do so strongly. Without selling significantly past our previous sales goals with the Flower Sale, we will not be able to properly cover costs for the remainder of the normal camping season before Summer Camp.

Participation in fundraising is one of the ways to be connected and to contribute to the Troop and help Scouts grow and mature. Many of our families talk about how their Scout's participation in fundraisers allowed them to go on trips that they otherwise would never have been able to go on. Troop 78 runs the premier Scouting outdoor program in Chester County hands down, and at a cost well below anything anyone else does for the individual Scout. We also participate in more centralized Boy Scouts of America High Adventure Programs like Philmont and Sea Base with our own crews and run our own annual high adventure trip in Canada (the most affordable trip anywhere) and every four years an international trip to Switzerland.

Fundraising is key to all of this, not just for the program, or to help your family with the costs, but to assist in the development of your Scout in understanding personal participation, responsibility, and ownership. When I was in the Troop in my youth, and my son in his; we both got to go on trips because of our individual hard work (yes folks, even in the 1980's we had scout camping accounts). Fundraising is part of the program, and we work hard to have good products and provide great service.

Please help the Troop and your Scout by heavily participating in the Flower Sale and of course Radnor Races. Send as many people as you can to help us on Race Day and sell **very** hard on the Flower Sale. With you and your Scout's hard work, I know we will be able to complete this camping season on budget.

As always, if cost is a factor for your Scout's participation in our 'in season' camping program or Summer Camp please contact me or our Scoutmaster Mr. D. Scholarship funds are available.


#### Ben Wheeler News Release from Chester County Council
