

Grace & Peace From the Pastor's Desk

My youngest great niece graduated from my alma-mater this month; I couldn't make the ceremony in person but through the wonders of technology I was able to watch her walk across the stage and receive her diploma. It wasn't quite as exciting as being there in person, however it did have advantages. Besides having a clear view of my great niece and all her classmates being individually presented with their diplomas, I was able to clearly hear the speech of the Valedictorian, Salutatorian, and Class Choice. I must tell you, not only were their orations almost impeccable, their content was impressive.

The first speech I heard was a girl who spoke of how the class had learned to "love". She made it clear that she was not speaking of boyfriend/girlfriend type of love (which is also known as

"Eros"), but the love they were showing one another was a deeper respect and caring, or what could be called agape love; a type of love that goes beyond expectations of personal profit.

Following this young woman, a young man spoke about friendship. If the message hadn't been so well presented I'd say it was a typical "we have developed these great friendships and we should stay friends for life" kind of graduation speech.

Now, I don't know if it was intentional, probably not, but it worked out that they saved the best speech for last. The theme of this young woman's speech was "character". She spoke of character development, its importance and the fact that it is a continual process of growth. She was even able to include several Bible verses in her talk.

Unfortunately I didn't take notes while I was watching the ceremony, and the recording isn't available to the public, and I don't have a photographic memory, so I can't tell you the exact Bible verses she used. Another I would choose would be Galatians 5:22-26 "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. Against such things there is no law." I actually think this was one of her choices because, if I remember correctly, she spoke to how these are qualities of good character.

Listening to these graduating students was an uplifting experience, and I believe their subjects can be applied, not only to graduating students but to life in general. Choosing sacrificial love, faithful friends, and building Godly character are lifelong processes.

For those unfamiliar with the annual NWPA ELCA Synod Assembly, it is the annual required business meeting of our Lutheran Synod which takes place at Theil College, Greenville, PA. It is in this forum we hear the annual reports from our elected leaders in the synod, committees, and our representatives from the ELCA in America (National). Bishop Lozano and team have created a three-year theme for our assemblies titled: "I Love to Tell The Story". For the first assembly falling under this theme, it proved to be much more diverse and applicable to our mission than one might expect.

Opening of assembly took place on Thursday at 1:30 with a brief opening prayer service presided by Bishop Lozano. We were then welcomed by Susan Traverso, President of Theil College. In her welcome, Traverso reminded the assembly the Theil's founding pastor William A. Passavant deeply held the belief that our Christian faith is tied to social responsibility and as Lutherans our responsibility to embrace social diversity. Following this warm welcome, we began the business of the assembly as you will see in the schedule. Many of the recommendations to the constitution were updates to modernize language and conform to current day operational procedure. These clinical and technical updates to language all passed on slate. It included adjustment to quorum counts, inclusion of online protocol (pandemic influence), and only one item was extracted for further investigation. The recommendation took away the responsibility of the Treasurer to ensure the proper bonding was in place for secure operation. Later in the assembly it was clarified that this was removed as bonding is currently a requirement of all insurance providers making this a redundancy and responsibility unnecessary to operate. The recommendation was then adopted on Saturday morning. The Bishops report provided statistical information on congregations and the diminishing number of full time pastors to serve our region. This is not a problem we face alone, but is across the entire religious sector. The SAWKS initiative was introduced by Pastor Jake Jacobsen and Pastor Doug Dyson. This is an initiatives focus is that of the future of the church and how to make worship accessible by meeting God's people where they are.

Friday's activities included presentations from MIF, Lutherlyn, Region 7&8 Candidacy and Leadership, Portico, LIRS, LAMPA, ELCA Foundation, Luther Memorial Academy and United Lutheran Seminary. These presentations covered a variety of topics from planned giving, the green initiative, and our direct impact to long term care. Pastor William Cox of Luther Square presented on the emerging foundation formed in part by the late Pastor Al Gessler. This newly emerging grant maker is in its infancy stages and more information will soon be available to the initiatives it will support.

Saturday began with a gathering outside of the Theil Chapel for a field service presided over by Bishop Lozano, Pastor Eric Young, and Pastor Christopher Otten (Representative). This service was to honor Bishop Lozano's retirement from the U.S. Military. Lozano is representative of the Army, Pastor Young, Navy, and Pastor Otten, Air Force. Out of the 65 ELCA Synods in the United States, NWPA is one of two that has a bishop who is also a military chaplain. Following the field service, the assembly returned to finish with technical matters of synodical business and housekeeping. Final vote to adopt budget, council members, and representatives carried unanimously. A final recommendation to the floor was made to authorize the Synod Finance Committee to carry the authority to be proactive on investment funds. This motion passed again unanimously. Recognition of Rostered Leaders and Congregational Anniversaries were recognized at this time. Among awards presented, Pastor Brian Moran and Pastor Karen Lundwall were honored (Thursday Evening) for their contributions to ministry. Pastor Sandra Jones and Pastor Ralph Jones were also honored (Friday).

It is highly recommended to anyone who has not served as a representative to Synod Assembly that you reconsider at the next opportunity. It was an honor to represent Immanuel, re-connect with the synod leadership, and create new friendships throughout our community. Wonders of Stained Glass Windows

Immanuel Lutheran is planning a road trip to visit St. John's Episcopal Church in Franklin, Pennsylvania. There will also be a lunch after, at one of Franklin's delicious dinning spots. St. John's is one of the last remaining churches in the U.S. to house Tiffany stained glass windows.

This Fall, Pastor Shawn Clerkin will host attendees, leading a discussion on the architecture and history of their church and the unique story behind their beloved windows.

After an uncontrollable fire in 1900, the church was left in complete devastation; all that remained was the bell tower. After half a decade of despair, the community came together in 1905, to watch as the old church was made anew, completed with beautiful, ornate Tiffany windows.

In preparation for the upcoming trip, questions about stained glass windows are at the forefront of many congregation members' minds.


delaniann Stained glass has a fascinating history, with colored glass beads dating all the way back to ancient Egypt, somewhere between 2750-2625 BC. These stained

beads laid the foundation for what would someday become the process used to create much larger works of art, like stained glass windows.

The oldest remnants of stained glass windows were found in Jarrow, England, at the St. Paul Monastery. While archeologists were only able to recover fragments of what was once a great masterpiece, they were able to determine the window dated back to 686 AD.

Throughout history, many cathedrals and places of worship used stained glass windows as a way to tell their congregation stories through the use of pictures. It was common to see reenactments of famous scriptures cast into the beautiful artwork, making it a useful tool for many who were unable to read. Windows commonly depicted the crucifixion, resurrection, the great flood and other important biblical occurrences, as well as, the images of prominent Saints and biblical figures.

The stained glass was used to emphasis a church's status and wealth. At the time, such decadent murals were extremely time consuming and costly to create. Very few artists were skilled in the art of molding molten glass. In addition to boasting their prominent status, the stained glass windows added insurmountable beauty to any church, instantly raising the overall appearance and atmosphere, both in and outside the building.





RAIN GARDENS TO LESSEN THE IMPACT OF STORMWATER RUNOFF

There is no denying that humans alter the landscape, leading to more stormwater runoff. Stormwater picks up pollutants carrying them to local streams and rivers. Increased stormwater increases the risk of flooding, decreases infiltration and groundwater recharge and increases the cost of water treatment. Property owners can make small changes to help curb the growing stormwater problem and improve water quality.

- Rain gardens are bowl-shaped gardens designed to capture water, allowing it to soak into the ground. They can drain water from roof downspouts, driveways, walkways or other impervious surfaces. They slow and reduce the amount of runoff from your property, while adding a lovely garden feature that reaps the following benefits: flood reduction, pollutant removal, groundwater protection, enhanced wildlife habitat and improved aesthetics.
- A rain garden must be designed and installed with careful consideration or you may create more problems. First look at the topography, take a walk in the rain and study water flow on your property. Choose a location that gets runoff from a roof downspout or other impervious surface and ask your municipality for specific ordinances.
- Know your soil type. Avoid areas with soils that are permanently or periodically waterlogged. Once constructed, ponding depth should be less than 12 inches; 4-8 inches is best.
- How do you determine the size of your rain garden? It's important to place your garden where it will collect as much runoff as possible.
- To learn more about creating and managing a rain garden to control stormwater on your property, go to https://extension.psu.edu/rain-gardens. By making changes upstream, we can all play a part in improving water quality. https://extension.psu.edu/rain-gardens-the-basics
- Choose native plants suitable to the area based on soil, sunlight and location in the garden. The plants must be able to tolerate variable moisture conditions. Select plants with a variety of shape, color, height and bloom time to maximize the benefits for wildlife, including pollinators. Also consider choosing a plant with some evergreen leaves to prevent soil erosion in winter months. Check out https://extension.psu.edu/rain-gardens-the-plants


