SPOONFULS OF COMFORT: WINTER'S LOADED POTATO SOUP



This loaded potato soup is thick and creamy with cheese, bacon, and sour cream. All the fixings the way momma always made it. but slow cooker style!

Prep Time: 30 mins
Cook Time: 6 hrs
Total Time: 6hrs 30 mins

Servings: 8

Ingredients

4 pounds russet potatoes, peeled & chapped

1 (32 ounce) carton low-sodium chicken stock

1 yellow onion, diced

1½ teaspoon salt

1½ teaspoon ground black pepper

1 (16 ounce) package thick cut bacon, cut into ½ inch pieces

1 cup shredded cheddar cheese, (leave some for topping)

4 tablespoons butter

¼ cup all-purpose flour

2 cups heavy cream

1/4 cup sour cream

2 teaspoons garlic powder

2 tablespoons chopped scallions

Directions

Step 1

Combine Potatoes, chicken stock, onion, salt and pepper in slow cooker. Cook on high until potatoes are tender, about 4 hours.

Step 2

Meanwhile, place bacon in a large skillet and cook over mediumhigh heat, turning occasionally, until evenly browned, about 10 minutes. Drain bacon on paper towels and wipe out most of the grease from the skillet.

Step 3

Puree potatoes in the slow cooker with an immersion blender until smooth. Add $\frac{1}{2}$ cup cheddar cheese and $\frac{1}{2}$ of the cooked bacon, set temperature to low, cook for an additional 1 to 2 hours.

*If you don't have an immersion blender, you can mash the potatoes by hand instead.

Step 4

Melt butter in the skillet over medium-low heat. Whisk in flour and stir until the mixture becomes paste-like and light golden brown, about 5 minutes. Add heavy cream, sour cream and garlic powder; whisk until thickened. Pour into the slow cooker and cook on low for 1 more hour.

Step 5

Ladle into bowls and garnish with remaining bacon, cheddar, sour cream and scallions.

COLD WEATHER SAFETY



Winter Reminders...

Avoid Falls in Cold Weather:

- Dry walking aids thoroughly: Be sure to dry the wheels and legs of any walking aids before entering your home to prevent slips.
- Clear your entryway: Keep the entrance to your home free of clutter and use ice melt or sand to clear walkways outside.
- Use a small table or shelf: Place one near your entry door to hold items while unlocking, so you're not juggling too much at once.
- Choose a safer entrance: If your main entrance tends to get icy, consider using another door to avoid slipping.
- Stay indoors when possible: If the weather is particularly harsh, it may be safest to stay inside. You can also consider using delivery services for prescriptions, groceries, and other essentials.
- · When in doubt, stay safe, stay home.

Winter Emergency Plan

Stay Informed:

 Sign up for weather alerts via the FEMA App,
 Weather.gov, or your local weather station to receive realtime updates.

Clear Walkways and Driveways:

 Ask for help in getting your driveway and walkways cleared before heading outside. This will reduce your risk of slipping or falling.

Keep Emergency Contact Info Handy:

• Keep up-to-date contact information for a family member or friend who can check on you during bad weather.

Plan for Emergency Situations:

 Ensure at least one person in your support network has an extra key to your home, knows where your emergency supplies are stored, and is familiar with any lifesaving equipment or medications you may need.

Write Down Important Information:

- Keep a written list of essential information in an easy-toreach location, such as:
 - Where your prescriptions are stored
 - Family contact numbers
 - Any allergies
 - Other helpful tips for emergencies

MELTING SNOW IS WATER TOO!!

Stormwater runoff can come in many forms, including melting snow. Winter snow often brings a unique feel to North Carolina as it doesn't happen often: making for beautiful photos and lots of family fun. However, it's not long before the sun comes out to expose a host of issues created by the melting snow.

Heavy rains sweeping across your yard and driveway carry pollution and high volumes of water into our nearby streams, lakes, and other waterways. Melting snow does the same things. Both rain and snow melt can seriously impair North Carolina waters when they travel over the land in our developed communities. n winter, melting snow actually causes a few unique stormwater problems. Because the ground is often frozen at the surface, melting snow can't infiltrate into the soil the way a light or moderate rain would be able to. So even a small amount of snow can cause localized flooding on your property.

When snow builds up over several small storm events without melting in between, it can turn into large winter storm impacts when it finally does melt – leading to potential community wide flooding events. In both cases, that standing and flowing water on the ground is picking up all kinds of debris, pollutants (especially deicing salts and chemicals), and litter that will find their way into nearby streams. When shoveling/plowing snow this season, pay attention to where you place it. Try to pile snow in areas where it will have a chance to infiltrate, not runoff!

Winter Stormwater Pollution Prevention Tips

Start shoveling early! The more snow you remove, the less salt and sand you'll need. Below are some do's and don'ts when shoveling or plowing snow



- Pile snow in locations with the most opportunity to infiltrate into the ground.
- Pile snow in areas where water does not pond.
- Clear away any snow that may have been thrown onto the storm drains
- Clear your downspouts to allow melting roof snow to flow and not collect at your foundation.
- Pay special attention to places that are eroding during snow melt, and make a plan to improve these areas in spring using plants that can slow and stop erosion, like native grasses and meadow plants or native trees and shrubs.

Tips to Avoid Using Salt as a De-icer

More salt does not equal more melting snow. Follow product instructions when spreading deicing material and give it time to work. Sweep up any material remaining after the snow/ice melts.

When temperatures hit 15° F or below, salt is not effective. Consider using traction materials that contain an acetate, potassium chloride, magnesium chloride, or cracked cornmeal instead of sand or kitty litter.



- Do not pile snow on top of storm drains or near water bodies and wetlands.
- Do not pile snow onto rain gardens or bio retention areas.
- Do not over use de-icing chemicals and salts, and avoid spreading around sensitive areas like waterways and your private well.
