## 'Y' MAINTAINANCE DRIVE BEGINS

There were no official opening ceremonies when the 1961 "Y" maintenance campaign for the Lachine-Dorval Y.M.-C.A. got underway on Monday, of this week, stated Dave Loudoun, division chairman, today.

"Our workers were anxious to get started. They didn't need a "pep rally" and they

weren't superstitious. When the thirteenth arrived they were out in force and got the campaign off to a good start."

Mr. Loudoun said that while the main objective of this campaign was to raise funds to maintain the important work that the "Y" is doing for this community, it will also serve as a means of acquainting more people with what the local "Y" has accomplished and what it plans for the future.

This past summer some 225 boys and girls from Lachine and Dorval were provided with outdoor camping experience under able leadership at the "Y" camp site at Isle Perrot" Mr. Loudoun explained. And last year more than 300 swimming tests were passed."

These are just two examples. All of the "UY" workers who will be canvassing the homes and businesses in Lachine and Dorval will be more than wil-

## Help Retarded Children

Final plans and work assignments, for the Annual Financial Campaign, of the Lakeshore Branch, Quebec Association for Retarded Children, were completed recently at a meeting of the district chairmen in the Civitan-Kinsmen school, Beaconsfield.

Campaign dates are from November 17th through the 30th, and coincide with the dates of Retarded Children's Week that is being observed both in Canada and the United States.

This year's financial campaign, of the Lakeshore Branch, will cover all Lakeshore areas with the exception of Pointe Claire, Beaconsfield, and Baie d'Urfe. These communities include the Lakeshore Branch in their annual United Appeal.

General campaign chairman is Mr. R. S. Wade, 54 Hillcrest, Pointe Claire, past president of the Lakeshore Branch. Mrs. W. Whippes, 126 Clement Ave., Dorval, is Chairman of the Residential Campaign section. Commercial Chairman is Mrs. J. Cageorge, 3925 Broadway, Lachine.

Stressing the importance of a successful campaign, Mr. Wade emphasized that the Civitan-Kinsmen School for

Retarded Children depends entirely upon parent contributions, public donations, special sale activities, and a financial campaign to provide operating funds in excess of \$26,000 per year. No assistance is being received from Federal or Provincial governments.

## City Hires Appraiser For Tax Cases

City council has retained the services of Mr. Jean Beique Professional Appraiser to help in the case of various Oil Companies vs The City of Dorval with regard to their tax assessment. The Oil Companies are protesting their tax assessment and have brought their case before the court. Council has also instructed City Legal



Mr. Beique is a Professional Appraiser with a multitude of experience, including cases such as the ones he has been asked to help with in Dorval. He has been a consultant in the appraisal field since 1923.

Advisor, Mr. Roy Amaron to attempt to have the cases of T.C.A., B.O.A.C., K.L.M. and Bowring Brothers Ltd. vs The City of Dorval settled by arbitration rather than in court and that Mr. Beique be recommended as the arbitrator. These cases are also protests of tax assessment.

## Fire Causes Severe Damage In Dorval

Fire struck swiftly early Tuesday morning at 25 Thorncrest Ave. leaving a Dorval family of four homeless. Mrs. J. Ganten and her three school children were awakened at 2:45 am by the pour of smoke and Mrs. Ganten called the Dorval Fire Dept. who were quickly on the scene. Members of the Dept worked from 3:00am - 7:00am extinguishing the blaze.

Police attribute the cause of the fire to electrical system malfunction. Preliminary estimates place damage at between \$5,000 and \$10,000.

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## JOHN PRATT REPORTS FROM OTTAWA

In recent weeks I have been discussing the rather grim subject of fallout shelters for nuclear survival in the event of an attack upon Canada. The future of mankind, threatened with the possibility of an early annihilation, is a matter which has led many people to expressions of cynicism and despair.

It might very well be expected that under these circumstances the young rising generation might be tempted to adopt a similar attitude of surrender. I am sure the older generation remember well the terrible world conditions that were bequeathed to us after World War I, conditions which we, in our enthusiastic youthfulness, confidently hoped to improve for the benefit of the young people that would follow us. We meant well but I am afraid we didn't do a very good job. We have nobly tried to banish war but so far we have only succeeded in making it more ghastly by virtue of our hard work in the fields of science and technology.

I was reminded of all this recently when I attended the graduation exercises of Lachine High School and heard the voice of young Canada, in the person of Wayne Matthews who gave the valedictory in the name of his graduating class. In this present world of great disillusionment I was very much heartened and proud to see the courage and decency of a new generation of Canadians ready to take over from us the eternal task of making this a better world in which to live. Young Wayne Matthews expressed these ideas so well in his valedictory speech that I would like to quote the opening and closing paragraphs, for the benefit of members of the older generation who wonder sometimes where their children are headed. From what I have seen of our recent highschool graduates, I don't think they have much cause for worry.

"My classmates and I salute you. And to me has fallen the honour of trying to say thank you to you our parents and teachers, who have made us what we are, who have made this our graduation day. Our debt to you

part in the great game of life with dignity."

"We want you to know that we do not fear the future - we welcome it and the challenge it presents. We know we are leaving a sheltered world and entering a strange new world of population explosions, nuclear bombs and spaceships. We enter it gladly, for we know that we have been taught well.

The gladiators of ancient Rome, before going out to battle for their lives, used to cry 'Hail Caesar, we who are about to die salute you'. These were words of cynicism and despair. They are not for us. We are the generation of the second Elizabeth, about to embark on a voyage of discovery such as Drake and Raleigh never dreamed of. We do not for a moment believe that we are to die in the flames of nuclear war.

Man has too much to live for. Vast vistas of knowledge stretch before us, and even the far reaches of space are opening to us. And so with pride and confidence we say to our teachers and to our parents. Hail! We who are

about to live salute you."

I left the school auditorium very proud to be a Canadian and very much reassured that the future of our country is in good hands.

**IN FOCUS**

**DIRECTOR OF STUDIES:** With so much emphasis placed these days on reports that Canadians are far behind in the development of their educational resources it is interesting to note that the Catholic School Commission of Dorval this year has taken another step forward in recognition of the growth of its school system requirements by appointing a Director of Studies. Who he is and what his job entails was answered in an interview with the Director, Mr. William Robert Burns, B.A., B.Ed., B.Rel. Sc.

When a school area becomes large enough (60 classrooms) a School Commission may appoint a Director of Studies and this step has been taken in Dorval where the planning involved in the new bi-ethnic Catholic High School adds to the growing complexity of the school system. The Director's job is to co-ordinate, in closest liaison with principals, teachers, and commissioners, all matters relating to studies, personnel and methods, and to curriculum within the set programme; to encourage the best possible education through informed and enthusiastic qualified personnel, purposeful methods and through meaningful extra-curricular activities. "In short," Mr. Burns said, when this explanation threatened to become too long and involved, "it is a question of size and management. An education director is needed in his own field much as a legal advisor is needed." Clearly this is a position in which initiative, interest, and personality must be combined with extensive training.

Mr. Burns, of English and French parentage, is fluently bilingual. Married and the father of four small children, he was educated at D'Arcy McGee, Loyola, Jacques Cartier Normal School, and the University of Montreal; he is presented working on his thesis for his Master's Degree from the University of Montreal. He has taught with the Montreal School Commission and teaches a course at St. Joseph's Teachers College. "I was fortunate in knowing from the time I was in grade seven that I wanted to be a teacher." He is a Director of the Benedict Labre House, a charter member of the Federation of English Speaking Catholic Teachers, and a member of the Provincial Association of Catholic Teachers.

One of Mr. Burns' strongest interests is in the field of public speaking and the educational possibilities of radio, T.V. and films. He has done free lance commentating with the C.B.C. since 1950, religious broadcasts in French and English, and National Film Board work. A former player with the Gesenians he has done varied work with the theatre; he was one of the two Montrealers who went to Toronto to take part in the last Pageant produced by Father Lord. He was contributed to the preparation of literature for UNESCO. He is very interested in L'Accord, a social and cultural organization which works with new arrivals in Canada, making wide use of films through its Cineclub. At a Unions de Familles Meeting in Dorval this week he will make use of a film and commentary in a talk to the parents. "When the new High School is completed," the Director remarked, "it will provide a marvellous centre for great accomplishments in this community through its teachers and pupils, and through a wide cultural exchange."

Intensively interested in bilingualism, Mr. Burns sees in Dorval the ideal opportunity for its development. "Having had the privilege of living in both cultures, I consider it most important that our education system produce truly bilingual citizens. This is not done merely by learning a second language, nor is it necessary that one group assimilate the other or so transform the other that it becomes a replica of itself. On the contrary, an intelligent formation should result in a vital appreciation of the best qualities of the two ethnic groups, an appreciation based on understanding and charity. And what better place to achieve this ideal than in our schools!"

Mr. Ben Fuller was the chairman of the Ball which was held this year for the first time on the Lakeshore.... Miss Marian Gilroy B.A. who is making a survey of Lakeshore Libraries will be visiting the Dorval Civic Library and Community on Nov. 22 and 23.... Mrs. Harold Moncrief of Dorval who is on the Staff of the Family Life Education Council of the Mental Hygiene Institute will be the Commentator and Discussion Leader for the film on Six to Nine Year-olds which will be shown at Nov 28 Home and School Meeting at Courtland Park.... The Unitarian Church Lakeshore Bazaar of the Year at the Edgewater will have a number of Dorval workers again this year. Mrs. M. Hodgson, in charge of the Bake Counter is ambitious to sell twice the amount of home baking and preserves this year; Mrs. Roger Brown and Mrs. D. Smith are in charge of the Children's Booth; Mrs. J. Walcot has the Christmas Decorations Booth; and for teenagers there is a whole section under the convenership of Mrs. H. Klassen.... 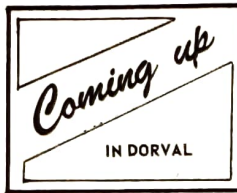
Giants came close again when Jeff Thompson took the kick-off after the Bomber TD

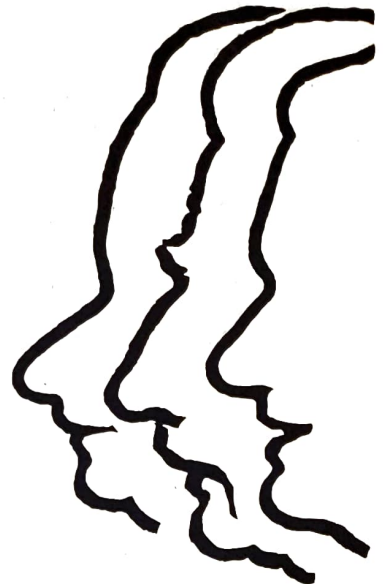
The game was a fitting climax to a great season and the teams, coaches, managers and game officials are to be congratulated on the ocean, hard hitting type of play served up.

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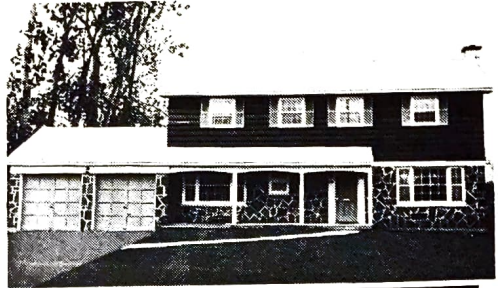
