
## **Classroom A February Newsletter**

## Dear Classroom A parents!

We have been celebrating Latin America in our classroom. In this spirit, the children are learning about animals which live in South America, the names of Latin instruments and flags of South America. They have been learning to identify the countries within South America and made their own continent maps by tracing and cutting these out. As an extension of this activity, some children have been using the label maker to label each country. We have been talking about the Andes mountains, Machu Pichu and discussing several fun facts, reading lovely stories and singing songs about Latin America. The children enjoy working on the continent box which contains items from South America. In the pictures below, the children are trying on a hand bag from Machu Pichu, a skirt from Uruguay and sweaters from Peru!















As always, Vera gave a beautiful

presentation to the children by reading *Ramon Preocupon*. She not only taught children how to say the names of the colors in Spanish, but also brought in lemony, homemade cookies called *Alfajores* and *Dulce le Leches*. The children assembled the cookies and rolled them in coconut. We all loved those cookies.

As a part of our Practical Life, the children have been wearing and zipping sweaters from Peru and unraveling a blanket to form a ball of yarn. They have also been bottle washing and taking care of classroom plants.

During these processes they are practicing "care of self" and "care of environment" skills! Recently, they have also been tweezing seeds out of a bell pepper. This activity will not only make their fine motor skills stronger, but also help me start the science unit on seeds!








In Math and Sensorial, they are learning to count up to 10 and can recognize the colors in Spanish, respectively. Nothing can catch their attention better than using their own pictures to facilitate learning.

In Art, we are studying Joaquin Torres Garcia, a Spanish Uruguayan artist from Uruguay. Once again, I am thankful to Vera for introducing me to some of his works. The children have been creating their own version of America Invertida and will continue to make their version of his painting called La Pez. Here is a picture of Vera with her family at the New York Museum of Modern Art where this artist's picture was showcased. In our newsletter we compare the original artwork alongside the creations from our Classroom-A artists.





The last week of February was celebrated as Peace Week.
We celebrate this week to honor Maria Montessori and her efforts to establish peace. She is most often remembered for her contributions to the education of young children;



however she is also considered by many to be a founder of peace education. She believed that the root of peace lay in the education we give our children.



The children visited several offices in the Moseley Mills complex, accompanied by a teacher, presented a rose and recited the peace poem to the employees. I consider myself fortunate that I can witness these moments when our children bring smiles and sunshine into these offices! They also learned that *Shanti* and *Paz* also mean peace in Hindi and Spanish respectively.

We will continue to study the rich culture of Latin America as we begin learning about seeds, rains forests, the Galapagos Islands and birds in the upcoming month.

## **Classroom B February Newsletter**

### Hello Classroom B families!

We started our month with a wonderful visit from Mrs. Roeber! Actually, she came in on January 31<sup>st</sup> but close enough! Mrs. Roeber read *The Snowy Nap* by Jan Brett. It is a story about a Hedgehog that tries to stay up during the winter instead of retreating to his burrow to hibernate. He doesn't want to miss all the winter-time fun his friends from the farm tell him about,



like making snowmen, watching icicles form and seeing the pond freeze and turn to slippery ice!

Mrs. Roeber also made a language and art activity for the classroom that the children really enjoyed!

In the photo (below left), two of our Classroom B friends are writing something Hedgie saw while he was watching from inside. In the next photo, a Classroom B friend is making a Hedgie face mask.



We continued our Chinese New Year celebration into February because the holiday lasts 15 days. For the start of the holiday, we practiced making Chinese characters with a brush and

water on a mat that Ms. Joy (Aanya's mom) let us have!
Ms. Joy came in to our class last year and taught us about
Chinese characters and words! In February, she came in and
taught the children how to write with real Chinese brushes
and ink. In addition, I put numerous objects about China in
our geography box. Some items included chopsticks, red envelopes
and coins and clothing from China. We concluded our celebration by
making lanterns and having a dragon dance!







This past month we learned how penguins stay warm and that their feathers are waterproof. Penguins have a layer of blubber which protects them from the cold. Their feathers have a special wax like substance that prevents water from penetrating underneath. To demonstrate this we conducted a science experiment using Crisco in a plastic bag. Then we placed our hand in the bag of cold water and learned that the Crisco acts as blubber to keep our hands warm. We also took a turkey feather and sprayed it with water. We turned the feather over to see that the water didn't seep through.





We also had a very cool visit from Ms. Marissa (Sophia's mom). She read a beautiful book about the life cycle of a snowflake. Then she showed the children an awesome experiment on how to make a snowstorm! The children had so much fun!





We concluded our month with Montessori awareness week! The children and I walked to the different businesses in our complex and handed out roses and recited a peace poem. We have been talking about what peace means, and what it means to be peaceful. We also read many books about being kind, using manners and so on. Even though February was a short month, we were sure able to fit a lot of things in!
