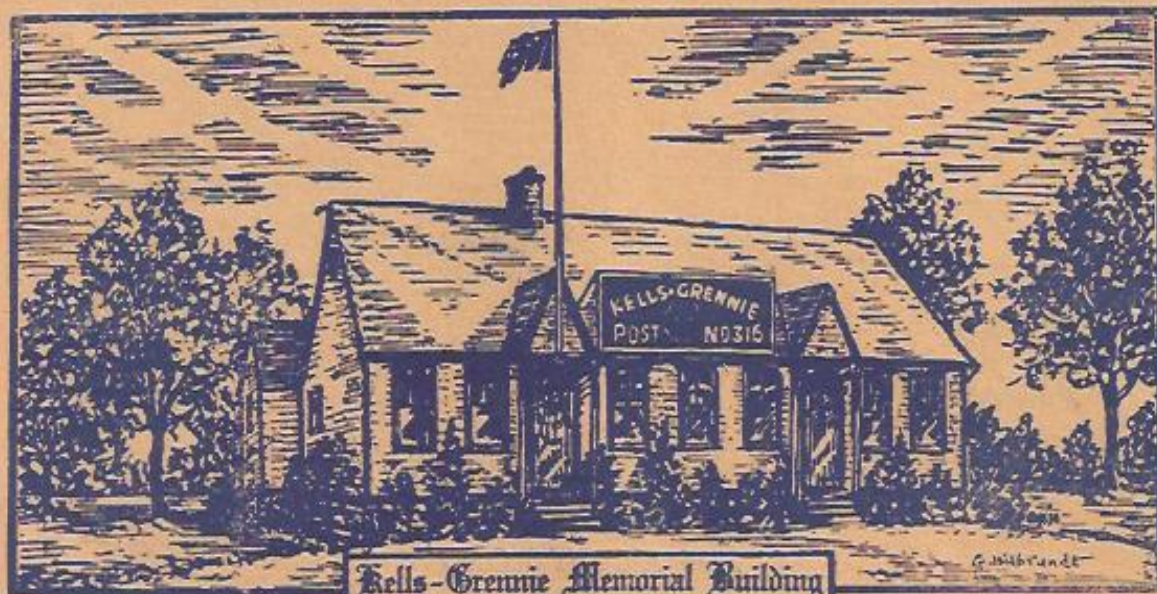

The Story of the Stars and Stripes

The brilliant Henry Ward Beecher said: "A thoughtful mind when it sees a nation's flag, sees not the flag, but the nation itself. And whatever may be its symbols, its insignia, he reads chiefly in the flag, the government, the principles, the truths, the history that belongs to the nation that sets it forth. The American flag has been a symbol of Liberty and men rejoiced in it. The stars upon it were like the bright morning stars of God, and the stripes upon it were beams of morning light. As at early dawn the stars shine forth even while it grows light, and then as the sun advances that light breaks into banks and streaming lines of color, the glowing red and intense white striving together, and ribbing the horizon with bars effulgent, so, on the American flag, stars and beams of many-colored light shine out together...."

More than a score of years ago President Wilson said: "This flag, which we honor and under which we serve, is the emblem of our unity, our power, our thought and purpose as a nation. It has no other character than which we give it from generation to generation. The choices are ours. It floats in majestic silence above the hosts that execute those choices, whether in peace or war. And yet, though silent, it speaks to us---speaks to us of the past, of the men and women who went before us, and of the records they wrote upon it. We celebrate the day of its birth; and from its birth until now it has witnessed a great history, has floated on high the symbol of great events, or a great plan of life worked out by great people.... Woe to the man or group of men, that seek to stand in our way in this day of high resolution, when every principle we hold dearest is to be vindicated and

made secure for the salvation of the nation. We are ready to plead at the bar of history, and our flag shall wear a new luster. Once more we shall make good with our lives and fortunes the great faith to which we were born, and a new glory shall shine in the face of our people." Thus the Stars and Stripes came into being; born amid the strife of battle it became the standard around which a free people struggled to found a great nation. Its spirit is fervently expressed in the words of Thomas Jefferson: "I swear, before the altar of God, eternal hostility to every form of tyranny over the mind of man."

The Stars and Stripes which in 1941 flew over the United States Capitol on December 8, when we declared war on Japan and on December 11, when we declared war on Germany and Italy has indeed proved to be the "flag of liberation." This same flag went with President Roosevelt to Algiers, Casablanca and other historic places, and flew over the conquered cities of Rome, Berlin and Tokio.

The Stars and Stripes that flew over Pearl Harbor, December 7, 1941, rippled over the United Nations Charter meeting at San Francisco and over the Big Three conference at Potsdam. This same flag was raised over the White House at sunrise, August 8, 1945.

During the ceremony of hoisting or lowering the flag, or when the flag is passing in a parade or in a review, those present in uniform should render the right hand salute. Men not in uniform should remove their head-dress and women should salute by placing the right hand over the heart.

TAXES: Military and Naval Pay is subject to the New State Income Tax. NYS taxpayers who are assigned to the U.S. armed forces installations outside NYS remain subject to the NYS tax. They are required to file NYS tax returns at the same time and in the same manner as any other taxpayer. This also applies to wives or husbands of U.S. armed forces personnel who may reside in localities near the military or naval installations to which their spouses are assigned. Military and Naval pay received by members of the several Reserve Corps of the U.S. armed forces is also taxable. Family allowance payments, however, received from the Federal Government by families of the U.S. Armed Forces personnel are exempt from the NYS income tax.

NYS BONUS: Inquiries are continually being made concerning a Korean NYS Bonus. No Korean bonus legislation was enacted during the 1960 session of the State Legislature. Bonus legislation in NYS requires constitutional amendment approved by two successive State Legislatures, after which it is submitted to the voters for their approval. There is no Korean Bonus now in effect, and due to constitutional processes, if the present Legislature should approve one the earliest it could possibly be paid would be 1964.

GI LOANS: The deadline to apply for GI guaranteed loans for World War II veterans is July 25, 1962. The deadline for Korean veterans is January 1, 1965. The interest rate on GI loans now is 5½%.
