AWARDS AND RECIPIENTS:

The Conservation Award: Wynn Anderson, designer and curator of the Chihuahuan Desert Gardens at UTEP since 1999, will receive the El Paso / Trans Pecos Audubon Society conservation award at its annual dinner Saturday, February 24 at Jaxon's Restaurant, 1135 Airway Blvd. Anderson is well-known for his dedication to preserving indigenous Chihuahuan Desert plants and promoting their inclusion in regional gardens. As curator, he teaches, lectures, and consults about native plants. UTEP faculty and students utilize the Chihuahuan Desert Gardens as sites for teaching and research. Anderson also serves as a horticultural resource for local citizens and conservation organizations such as the El Paso Native Plant Society.

The Meritorious Service Award: Scott Cutler, curator of the UTEP Centennial Museum, will receive the EPTP Audubon Society meritorious service award given annually to a member who has contributed significantly to the organization over time. For many years, Cutler has held the position of chapter hospitality chair, and has been recently elected president for 2007-2009.

AT FEATHER LAKE

After it was dry for 2 months, the storms in late January put water back in Feather Lake. The lake was closed during the dry period, but now we're open again!

We're often asked why Feather Lake is dry so often these days. The year 2003 was pivotal. Prior to that year, the lake generally received water from 2 sources: storm runoff and, during the irrigation season, water remaining in the irrigation laterals after deliveries. The basin was typically flooded most of the year. In some years, it would go dry briefly in winter if there were no significant winter storms.

In 2003, the effects of continuing drought hit home. Allocations of river water for irrigation were cut dramatically. The water that was available for irrigation was used as completely as it could be. Very little found its way to Feather Lake. That pattern has continued. Since 2003, Feather Lake has seen very little irrigation water. The lake has been largely dependent on storm runoff and now is dry more often than wet. Without water in the basin consistently, the local water table has dropped, and water in the lake, when it is present, percolates more rapidly to groundwater.

Last summer's rains put a lot of water in Feather Lake, but it disappeared relatively quickly. Still, we were able to open Feather Lake to the public for 3.5 months between September and December. Sincere thanks go to our volunteers who staffed the sanctuary during this time: Lupe Barrera, Lucretia and Eddie Chew, Jean and John Coyle, Scott Cutler, Jane Fowler, Chriss and Paul Gerbino, Inga and Joe Groff, Carlos Humphreys, Bob Johnson, Carol Moreno, Flora Pittard, Roxanne Schroeder, Ursula Sherrill, John Sproul, and Kathy Whelen.

Last summer's rains not only brought a lot of water to the basin, they also brought a lot of trash that had been dumped in the drains upstream. Over the past few months, we've removed an amazing variety of debris, but there is still much remaining. Join us for our next workday on **Sat., Mar. 24**, starting at **2 p.m.** Be part of the elite crew that will remove the refrigerator now found along the basin's inner berm.

Feather Lake is located at 9500 North Loop at Bordeaux in El Paso, 0.3 miles west of Americas Ave. Hours are 8 a.m. to noon on Saturday mornings and 2 p.m. to dusk on Sunday afternoons. Admission, free.

Audubon at RIO BOSQUE WETLANDS PARK

Except for a week in early December, Rio Bosque Wetlands Park has received water since late October. The wetland cells are fully flooded, and




wintering waterfowl are abundant, highlighted by a male Eurasian Wigeon. Raptor and corvid numbers are also high. Opportunities to view the water birds won't last much longer, though. Last year, water deliveries to the Park ended Feb. 14; in 2005, they ended Feb. 28. Upcoming free walking tours:



FRANKLIN MOUNTAINS POPPIES CELEBRATION



MARCH 17, 2007

Over 5,000 people have signed our petition to Representative Silvestre Reyes asking him to help protect Castner Range, the site of breathtaking poppy blooms on the east side of the Franklin Mountains. The petitions will be presented to the congressman on **Saturday, March 17th, at 2:30 p.m.** on the grounds of the Museum of Archaeology, 4301 Transmountain Road, in the heart of the poppy fields on Castner Range. The presentation will be the highlight of a free, outdoor family event that day, the **Franklin Mountains Poppies Celebration**, featuring dozens of educational exhibits and wildlife demonstrations.

The petition states support for a resolution unanimously passed by El Paso City Council on March 14, 2006, in favor of permanent preservation for the range. Signers ask Congressman Reyes "to work actively with Congress and the Department of the Army to achieve the preservation of all of Castner Range in its natural state for the benefit and enjoyment of all Americans forever." Signatures were collected over the past nine months by members and friends of the Franklin Mountains Wilderness Coalition.

Coalition acting president Scott Cutler stated, "The enthusiasm of the public for protecting Castner Range from development is inspirational. The thousands who signed the petition are from all walks of life and political persuasions. To El Pasoans, Castner Range is a special place."

The Franklin Mountains Poppies
Celebration will kick off at 10 a.m.
on March 17 with a full program



of nature talks, wildlife demonstrations, educational exhibits and photography workshops. Everyone is invited to come out and enjoy the beauty of the mountains and the poppies during this free event which will last until 3 p.m.

The Chihuahuan Desert Education Coalition, (CDEC), is organizing the Celebration. CDEC President Rick LoBello noted, "This will be a festive day and a wonderful opportunity for us to help educate our community about both the wonders and threats to our Chihuahuan Desert."

We will, of course, continue to collect petition signatures until shortly before the event. Blank petitions can be downloaded from the Franklin Mountains Wilderness Coalition Website, **www.iloveparks.com/fmwc/** Click on the Conservation issues page. Let's keep the petitions coming.





BOSQUE DEL APACHE NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE

The trip to the BDA on Jan 13 and 14 was very successful. 25 birders came and enjoyed the bus tour on Sat. afternoon, it was led by a volunteer staff member and all learned quite a bit about the refuge. Great sightings for all were the Bald Eagles, Sandhill Cranes and Snow Geese, Mountain Blubirds White-throated Sparrow, Wilson's Snipe, Ring -necked Pheasant and Feeruginous Hawk. At Percha State Park on the way back on Sunday we saw Ceder Waxwings, White-breasted Nuthatch, Vermillion Flycatcher and a GREAT HORNED OWL. Then over to Caballo SP for Common Mergansers and a rare (for the time of year) Bonapart's Gull.

CHRISTMAS BD CT HUECO TANKS

Twelve (12) counters showed up on Sat. Dec 30 at 6:30 in the morning. Four (4) people visiting in El Paso, and three (3) from here but new to the organization.

Total species 56; last 10 year average 56.7, total birds 1674; last 10 year average 2023. Some species that were higher than average; American Kestrel, White-winged Dove, Long-eared Owl (14), Green-tailed Towhee. Species that were lower than usual Scaled Quail, Ladderback Woodpecker, Northern Flicker, Verdin, Crissal Thrasher.


