#### OCTOBER MONTHLY MEETING

On October 20, sixteen Broomfield Spellbinders gathered at Brunner Farm House to share stories and fellowship. Julie Toepper welcomed all and asked each to share a favorite Halloween memory. There were lots of memories of favorite costumes worn or made and memorable house and yard decorations, including at a castle in Edinburgh, Scotland. Sheila Brush distributed an updated membership list and requested corrections. Janis Lievens reported on non-school storytelling opportunities. The Septembers 15 Anthem Ranch session (Janis, Sandy Hopper, and Sheila) attracted eight children and ten seniors. Additional Anthem Ranch dates are November 5<sup>th</sup> (2:00-3:00) and December 9<sup>th</sup> in the morning. Contact Janis if you are interested in telling at the December event. Janis is reaching out to Mountain View Elementary about hosting a Tell-a-bration where we supply tellers to all their classes on a single day. We did this a few years ago, and Janis is hoping to spark interest in this school as we only have tellers in their Kindergarten classes. We congratulated our new members—Janet Rope and Scott Carrico, who have completed their shadowing assignments, and Sonja Wendt, who will soon complete hers. Julie reminded us that Vicki Tiedeman has created the 2023-2024 Data Sheets and sent instructions via emails. Contact Vicki for more information or help. Julie reminded us to look for information regarding Colorado Gives and to consider giving to BCAH or Broomfield Spellbinders.

Julie shared an e-mail from Spellbinders National regarding a student's letter about being told a "too scary" story by a Boulder Valley Spellbinder. It cautioned all of us to be mindful of the need for age-appropriate stories--especially this time of year. We decided to discuss that issue although it would delay Kathy Daniels' planned tour of our library. We agreed that ALL kids say they like scary stories, but that may not be true. Most of us tell funny "kinda" scary stories for younger listeners, and **Vanita Moore** suggested that we prep the class prior to the story. We agreed to take this warning to heart and to carefully reconsider the scary stories in our repertoires. We then took a break to enjoy snacks provided by **Janny Darby** and Wynn. Kathy reminded us that we have plenty of plates, napkins, cutlery, and glasses. There is no need to for members providing snacks to purchase more.

**Wynn** opened the second half of the meeting with "The New Mother"— a creepy story by Lucy Clifford that is a favorite of his 5<sup>th</sup> grade listeners. In an unplanned (but perfectly-timed) moment in the midst of the story, a woman opened the door just as Wynn yelled "Stop! Go away! We don't want you here!" She quickly backed away from the door, shocked. Wynn stopped his story, went to the door, and asked if she was here for storytelling? She said: "No, just out for a walk." Wynn apologized profusely and invited her in. She stayed and enjoyed the stories. Afterwards, she said she might be interested in becoming a Spellbinders volunteer. **Vanita** then recited two poems by James Whitcomb Riley-"Raggedy Man" and "Little Orphant Annie" ("The goblins will get you if you don't watch out!"). **Kathy Daniels** closed the meeting by showcasing some books for Halloween and Thanksgiving. Referring back to the discussion of scary stories, she suggested that we all read the stories and put our own twist on them. She reminded us that there are four identical binders that list our library books; they are available for check-out. Books are listed alphabetically and by genre. Check them out to help you plan stories for the rest of the school year. Kathy then took interested members on a "tour' of our library.

### SEPTEMBER STORY CIRCLE
