Members in Action

"Light Up the Bay" All City Drills in Contra Costa County, November 16, 2019

Multiple municipalities in Costa Costa County simultaneously conducted all city emergency readiness drills on November 16, 2019. It was partially modeled after the City of Walnut Creek's annual All City Drill. Notable municipalities that activated their Community Emergency Response Team (CERT, https://www.ready.gov/CERT/) to respond included Martinez, Pleasant Hill, Walnut Creek, San Ramon, Lamorida (Lafayette, Moraga, Orinda), Richmond, El Cerrito, Kensington, Rodeo-Hercules and others. City of San Pablo had a limited participation, with Carrie, KK6BKR and Wing, K6YDE. The County used its Community Warning System (CWS, https://cwsalerts.com/) to send out an alert to participants, and the County Sheriff's Emergency Operations Center (EOC) in Martinez was activated to receive messages from the municipal EOC's.



David, KJ6AAT and Diane, KK6RED cocordinated the drill's response from the communities of West Contra Costa County. Multiple neighborhoods within City of Richmond, El Cerrito and Kensington established neighborhood incident command posts (ICP's) to relay voice traffic via ham portable radios, Family Radio Service (FRS) and General Mobile Radio Service (GMRS).



Depending on their level of participation, each municipality responded differently. Some cities sent CERT field teams for damage assessments. Field team members are encouraged to send (radio) traffic to the ICP's. Others staffed only radio operators for the communication part of the drill. The ICP's then forwarded relevant messages to City



EOC's. After triaging the messages, the ICP's sent relevant and critical messages to County EOC.

A good number of Club Members participated in the drill, including Edward, KM6UBY; Alvin, KK6UQX; Howdy, KE6BEE; Karen, KK6ZPM; Jay, KJ6WSS, Jeff, KJ6RHF; Dj, KJ6DJ and others.

ICS/SEMS/NIMS... oh my!

Say, an excited new ham wants to get involved in public service and participates in a drill. This ham, however, is mystified by non-radio related acronyms thrown around like ICS, SEMS, NIMS, COMU, etc.... does that sound like you?

Not to worry, here is a quick primer: (courtesy Wikipedia):

The Incident Command System (ICS) is a standardized approach to the command, control, and coordination of emergency response providing a common hierarchy within which responders from multiple agencies (or trained volunteers from any jurisdiction) can be effective.

ICS was initially developed to address problems of inter-agency responses to wildfires in California as

the Standardized Emergency
Management System (SEMS), but is
now a component of the National
Incident Management System (NIMS)
in the US, where it has evolved into use in
"All-Hazards" situations, ranging from
active shootings to HazMat incidents.

ICS is interdisciplinary and organizationally flexible to meet the following management challenges:

 Meets the needs of a jurisdiction to cope with incidents of any kind or complexity (i.e. it expands or contracts as needed).

- Allows personnel from a wide variety of agencies to meld rapidly into a common management structure with common terminology.
- Provide logistical and administrative support to operational staff.
- Be cost effective by avoiding duplication of efforts, and continuing overhead.
- Provide a unified, centrally authorized emergency organization.

ICS training is *required* for personnel with emergency response duties per SEMS and NIMS in California.

ICS works for big and small incidents, planned events like weddings to parades, to unplanned such as response to an evacuation. Training requirements vary based on an individual's role, but in general, ICS-100 and IS-700 are required for all emergency response personnel.

- ICS-100 ICS-100 Introduction to the Incident Command System
- IS-700 National Incident Management System (NIMS), An Introduction

The Communications Unit (COMU) falls under the Logistics Section's purview. An Auxiliary Emergency Communicator (AUXCOMM) is typically a ham trained in NIMS/ICS under COMU, who are viewed as "subject matter experts."



You, as a duly licensed ham, can be AUXCOMM. Learn all/more ICS! Print and bring copies of your certificates to your next incident and practice ICS!

Member Highlight

Howdy Goudey, KE6BEE

Q: How did you discover amateur radio?

A: I mostly became aware of ham radio through a ham whom I met at one of my first jobs in high school, Ozzie Diaz, W6ICM. After retiring from the broadcast industry, he took an office job at a local (Sonoma, CA) business that built industrial tools and educational kits based on permanent magnets. He invited me to visit his shack. As an aspiring engineer who loved hardware, I was amazed by his

huge collection of radio and test gear. He generously encouraged my enthusiasm by gifting hundreds of pounds of derelict "boat anchor" gear. I have not put it to functional use, but I remain enamored of for all the vintage dials, knobs and heavy-duty construction. I still have all of it (ok, so I'm a bit of a packrat).

About the same time, before I was licensed, I found an old tube-based surplus military receiver at a garage sale that I bought for \$5. I hung a rudimentary long wire antenna and listened to ham and shortwave transmissions, but mostly I remember picking out the frequencies with the coordinated universal time

beacon (WWV). My minor adolescent obsession with Nikola Tesla may have also inspired my interest in radio.

Through encouragement of another Sonoma Ham, **Darrel Jones, WD6BOR** of the Valley of the Moon Amateur Radio Club (VOMARC, https://www.vomarc.org/), I finally received my Technician ticket around the time I graduated from high school in 1993.

I briefly used ham radio while participating in the CalSol solar car team as I studied Engineering Physics at UC Berkeley. I also attended a few



W6BB Amateur Radio Club (https://www.w6bb.org/) meetings at Cal, but I became too distracted by school and work to continue much ham radio activity. I ended up being

off the air for close to 25 years, but my license never expired since I remembered to renew it.

Q: What advice would you give newly-licensed hams?

A: I think it is very important for new hams to get on the air and to be active in a local club to keep them connected to radio. Too many hams, like me, stop using their radio, or never start, even after investing a lot of time and energy in getting licensed.

Lately, a lot of new hams are coming with an interest in emergency communications, which is what initially got me back into ham radio after 25 years. There can always be more effort to engage these new licensees and build a network of local hams with good communication skills. We can't expect them to come to us.



Q: What brings you joy in amateur radio?

A: I enjoy building equipment and working on projects and I always appreciate learning new things (which is great, because I always have a lot more to learn). I don't have a lot of time to devote to ham radio, but I have no shortage of ideas of

things I'd like to try.

Q: What would you do if you have more free time?

A: After recently upgrading my license and starting to do some HF, I would like to improve my HF antenna. Although limited to a city lot in El Cerrito, I've come up with a way to accommodate a 120+ foot dipole fed with ladder line and a tuner to work multiple bands thru to 80m. As always, I am open to suggestions from more experienced hams on versatile HF antennas in the city. I also look forward to learning more about repeater operation and maintenance as part of the 4C's Technical Committee.
