## The Opportunities and Challenges of Shared Space and Shared Ministry by Russell Mitchell-Walker

ome who have been a part of Eastside for a number of years may wonder why we no longer have as many shared worship services with our Living Spirit Centre partners on Sunday mornings. Over the years that I have been here, we have been identifying and working through a few challenges. I, and my colleagues in ministry, felt it was important to offer some reflections and share our understandings and realities that we face within our denominations. To this end, Carla Blakley, the Pastor at Bread of Life Lutheran, has written an article about the ministry staff in the three congregations and the differences we now have (page 4). I wish to explain the challenges from a United Church perspective to help us all get to the same understanding.

The most basic challenge that we face relates to worship times. In the past,

shared worship services took place at 10 am. We have identified that it is difficult for both Bread of Life and Eastside to change our worship times due to the size of our congregations. Regardless of our communication efforts, there is always someone who doesn't get the information and comes at the wrong time and misses the service. The other reality for both of us, is that we have newcomers each Sunday and it is next to impossible to communicate the change in worship time to someone we don't know. We can change the time on the website but they may not get the information. As a result, a newcomer could come to worship and not find a service, which would not be very welcoming. This summer, when we were worshipping at 9:30 am, I spoke with a young family who had never come to worship here. They contacted me about bringing their child for baptism and planned to come to worship on Sunday. I

indicated that our worship service was at 9:30 am but when they arrived, they saw the sign outside said 11:15 am. Because that time didn't work for them that day, they went home. Luckily I already had contact with them and we continued to be in touch.

Another, larger issue is the reality that I am a Diaconal Minister (like a deacon or deaconess in other churches). In The United Church of Canada, Diaconal Ministers have a focus of ministry on Education, Service, and Pastoral Care. Ordained Ministers have Word, Sacrament and Pastoral Care as their emphases. Diaconal Ministers are commissioned into the ministry and have to receive permission to administer the sacraments of Baptism and Communion. In Saskatchewan, this permission is standard and automatic when a Diaconal Minister is called to a pastoral charge (a

The best way to spread Christmas cheer, is singing loud for all to hear. ~ Elf church). Diaconal Ministers are also fully trained in our education program to administer sacraments. The focus of the training is experiential education (learning by doing and reflecting on the doing) with three separate years study in Educational and Liturgical Ministry, Social Justice, and Pastoral Care settings or focus, including an eight-month field placement typically within a congregation.

In the Lutheran and Anglican churches, Deacons are not allowed to preside over Communion. This extends to Diaconal Ministers in the United Church. Both Bishops have been very clear that I, as a Diaconal Minister, cannot preside over Communion at a shared service (or any other Lutheran or Anglican service). For the purpose of sharing services with the Anglicans, such as during the summer months, St. Philip has permission to attend and receive Communion at a United Church service. I cannot lead an Anglican Communion service. This creates challenges for sharing together, especially when the Anglicans have been without a priest and Deacon Rita is in a similar situation as I am with regard to ministry and not being recognized to preside over sacraments. Traditionally the three congregations, when sharing, would each take a part of the service: the liturgy, the preaching, presiding over Communion. This is no longer possible.

It is also easier for Lutherans and Anglicans to worship together as they have a full Communion agreement , the Waterloo Accord, which identifies that they can share Communion liturgies, pastors, and priests between the two denominations. We do not have this kind of agreement with either church. There is a United Church-Anglican Church Dialogue that has been taking place for the last five years. I have just been appointed as a United Church representative to that Dialogue.

As a result of these challenges and realities, we have moved away from Sunday morning shared services. I have been exploring possibilities of other ways we might share special services such as Earth Day. We will continue to offer our *Blessing of the Animals* service and the Wednesday evening Lenten services, and are open to considering other ways we can share together, particularly fellowship opportunities. We will look to other ecumenical ways of sharing such as during the week of Prayer for Christian Unity. This year we are awaiting a new priest for St. Philip, who will start in January, so we will look to next year for that kind of shared service.

I am open to conversation and questions you may have about any of this. We recognize our primary sharing is the fact that we share space together. This, in and of itself, is significant. We will continue to look for opportunities and ways that we can share, most often outside of Sunday mornings, acknowledging that we are three separate (and very different) congregations, with our own programs and goals and mission. These are the challenges and opportunities that being together present.

## Ministry at the Living Spirit Centre

The Living Spirit Centre is a "triparish" Centre but what does that mean for the congregations involved? Pastor Carla Blakley interviewed her fellow pastors at the LSC. Here's what she learned:

Three congregations, Eastside United, St Philip Anglican, and Bread of Life Lutheran, all call the Living Spirit Centre home and share the space. Over the years shared ministry and worship have happened, but there are many variables to this taking place. In the eleven years I have served as Pastor at Bread of Life, I have had the privilege of working with Anglican Priests, Rev. Dave Nevett, Rev. Blair Dixon, Rev. David Kaiser, Rev. Del Bornowsky and two United Church Pastors, Pastor Dawn Rolke, Pastor Noboko Iwai and now a United Church Diaconal Minister, Russell. St Philip is currently without a Priest, but have a locally ordained deacon, Deacon Rita.

#### Eastside United Church

Russell Mitchell-Walker is a Diaconal Minister. Russell is trained in experiential learning and Commissioned to a ministry of Education, Service and Pastoral Care. He has been granted permission to preside at sacraments in the United Church. United Church Diaconal Ministers are paid on par with Ordained Ministers. Russell has a B.Comm. from the University of Calgary and a Diploma in Educational, Social, and Pastoral Ministry from the Centre for Christian Studies. Russell can wear his stole diagonally.

#### St. Philip Anglican Church

Rev. Rita Bran, Deacon, was ordained by the Bishop as a Vocational Deacon. Rita will not go on to be priested. She is locally ordained, and trained by weekend seminars. Rita is licensed to preside at weddings, funerals, and all other sacraments, with the exception of Communion. Rita is non-stipendiary (not paid) and wears her stole diagonally.

#### Bread of Life Lutheran Church

Rev. Carla Blakley is an ordained Lutheran Minister. She has a B.A in Religious Studies (major in Islam), and M.Div from Waterloo Lutheran Seminary and an M.A in Religious Studies from the University of Regina. Ordained Clergy wear the stole around the neck, hanging straight down, it is a symbol of ordination as a pastor.

There are denominational restrictions about our participation in each other's worship. The Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada (ELCIC) signed a formal agreement in 2001 with the Anglican Church of Canada (ACC) called the Waterloo Declaration. In the Waterloo Declaration we recognize that we have similar heritage as catholic churches of the Reformation, similar ecclesiology, and similar understanding of the orders of ministry. Ordained Priests in the Anglican Church and Ordained Pastors in the Lutheran Church can entertain calls in each other's denominations and preside at each other's tables. The Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada has an order of deacons, but they are set aside for education and service. They cannot preside at sacraments, nor are they licensed to marry. Anglican Church of Canada has deacons, who are locally trained in a parish and are supervised under a priest. They cannot preside at Eucharist in their denominations or others, but can preside at weddings and funerals.

At this time, the Anglican Church of Canada and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada do not have a formal agreement with the United Church of

Canada. While there are ongoing talks, the differences in the ways in we celebrate the sacraments, select, train and order sacramental ministers, and exercise the ministry of oversight, have been the greatest challenges. At a national level, there is no mutual recognition of ministries between the Lutheran and United churches at this time.

Orders of Ministry have changed greatly in the last ten years at Living Spirit Centre. These changes have influenced how we have been able to continue in shared ministry, specifically worship. Deacons (United or Anglican) cannot preside at Lutheran Communion Services, although Ordained Lutheran Clergy may preside at United and Anglican Communion Services. As clergy, we are bound to uphold our denominations' decisions on these matters.

At the LSC, all three congregations participate in various events, according to the ability and interests of their members. While shared worship at the Living Spirit Centre is challenging because of changes in the orders of ministry over the years, many aspects of life together have not changed. Fellowship events, pie socials, eating together, mutual support of each others' ministries, delight in our shared building, and the witness of living together, are all things that members of each denomination can continue to support and be proud of.

## **Rainbow Youth Centre Project**

#### This Advent, Eastside is again collecting items in support of Rainbow Youth Centre (RYC).

This December, RYC will be holding its Annual Christmas Celebration for participants. The celebration includes a traditional Christmas supper and the distribution of Christmas Stockings to the youth and the young adults (including their infants and toddlers) who are regularly involved with programming. It is anticipated that there will be approximately 300 Christmas stockings given to participants this year.

On Sunday, November 27 and Sunday, December 4, the Christmas tree in the East Sanctuary will be decorated with candy canes. Each of these will be labeled with the name of an item to be donated for RYC stockings. # Have you heard about the LSC Solar Panel Working Group?

The purpose of this group is to explore opportunities to provide alternative energy sources for the Living Spirit Centre, in order to reduce the Centre's environmental impact. In November 2015, a presentation was made on the possibility of installing solar panels on the Living Spirit Centre roof by the Property and Maintenance Committee to the Living Spirit Council. In October 2016, a Solar Panel Working Group was formed with the purpose of exploring the feasibility of installing solar panels and to inform the Living Spirit Council and the congregations involved. It was decided that three areas needed to be examined more fully before proceeding:

- 1) technical and financial feasibility,
- 2) funding options, and
- branding LSC as "good" environmental stewards.

In the coming months, discussion and research will focus on these three themes. Stay tuned for future updates! The next meeting of the Solar Panel Working Group will be January 19, 2017.

## Financial Update: Jan 1 - Sept 30, 2016

Eastside incurred a deficit of \$2,081 during the first nine months of 2016 (see below), however this does <u>not</u> include the full amount that has been raised to date to reduce the mortgage. Only \$7,500 has been be used from the mortgage fundraiser for the quarterly mortgage payments; the remainder of \$22,850 (\$17,850 of cash plus \$5,000 of pledges) has been carried forward to make future mortgage payments.

As shown below, revenue is comparable to both 2015 and 2013. In addition, expenses are comparable to previous years, other than 2015, in which Eastside received a one -time reduction in contributions for Living Spirit Centre (LSC) costs. It should also be noted that the deficit at March 31, 2016 was \$3,480, so Eastside posted a <u>surplus</u> of \$1,399 between April and September!

Looking ahead to the last quarter of the year, Eastside appears to have a good chance of avoiding a deficit for 2016, particularly now that the mortgage payments for the year have been covered. Operating expenses may decline in the fourth quarter, as it appears that LSC expenses will come in below the budgeted amount. In addition, Eastside will also receive the benefit of some pledges of increased monthly PAR giving that resulted from the mortgage fundraising drive.

Longtime members of the congregation know that Eastside has struggled financially in recent years, however the generous giving to date in 2016 has things moving in a positive direction. Let's keep the momentum for the remainder of the year!
