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## INTRODUCTION



The Wyoming Association of Sheriffs and Chiefs of Police has been collecting substance-related data from all persons booked into county detention facilities in Wyoming since 2005. The data-collection process has been refined since that initial effort and has now been institutionalized as a part of the book-in process year-round for all custodial arrests in all twenty-three counties in Wyoming.

Although it had always been suspected that alcohol was a significant factor in custodial arrests in Wyoming, reliable data had not been available previously to more accurately determine the scope and impact of alcohol on crime in this state. A sufficient amount of substance-related arrest data has been collected during the past thirteen years which can now be analyzed to identify trends relative to alcohol, as well as other drug involvement in crime in Wyoming. Consistent patterns

of alcohol and other drug involvement for certain crimes are now more evident and the frequency of occurrence more predictable.

This report contains an analysis of substance-related arrest information collected in all twenty-three counties in Wyoming during a twelve-month period (January 1 through December 31, 2017) by the Wyoming Association of Sheriffs and Chiefs of Police. Information was collected from a total of 13,638 persons who were arrested and subsequently detained in a county detention facility. Data collected from 1,898 persons booked into the Volunteers of America Center of Hope in Fremont County is also included. The substance-related arrest data contained in this report provides a statistical picture of the impact that substance abuse is having on crime in Wyoming.

***To date, information has been collected from a total of 201,638 persons who were arrested and subsequently detained in a detention facility in Wyoming.*** Specific information collected during the book-in process includes the following:

- Type of offense;
- Whether alcohol or other drugs were involved;
- Location of last consumption and point of sale;
- Blood alcohol content levels for alcohol related arrests; and
- Demographic information.



The Wyoming Association of Sheriffs and Chiefs of Police publish the results and analysis of the data-collection efforts each year in three separate reports. The main report provides statewide statistics and averages, along with comparisons of county statistics in specific categories. An accompanying supplemental report provides county, community and local law enforcement agency specific statistics. The third report is an Executive Summary which provides selected statistics, information and highlights from the main report. 
**EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

This Executive Summary highlights a few of the significant findings contained in this report. It focuses on issues that are of obvious concern or which may be of greater interest to the general public; however, a careful review of other relevant findings and statistics contained in the main body of this report is essential in order to gain a more complete perspective of the impact of alcohol on crime in Wyoming.



The profile of the average person taken to jail in Wyoming continues to be relatively consistent with previous years. About three out of four times it was a male (females have increased incrementally in recent years, 24.68% this year), average age 35. 15.5% of the time it was an out-of-state visitor and 6.8% of the time it was an in-state visitor. Juvenile arrests resulting in detention in a detention facility accounted for less than 1% of the total custodial arrests (86 out of 13,638).

A review of the data collected from persons arrested and subsequently taken to jail indicates that Wyoming continues to be relatively safe from what is generally considered to be “serious” crime. The number of persons who are arrested for felonies are relatively low when compared to the number of persons arrested for minor crimes (misdemeanors). Felony arrests accounted for 12.5% of the total arrests statewide.




*Although Wyoming is relatively “safe” from what is generally considered to be serious crime (felonies), the high percentage of alcohol-involved arrests, the inordinate number of arrests for public intoxication and driving under the influence, and the high levels of blood alcohol content for drivers arrested for being impaired represent real and significant threats to public safety.*

The information collected from a total of 13,638 persons who were arrested and subsequently detained in a county detention facility in Wyoming during 2017 confirms what law enforcement officers who patrol

the streets and highways and who respond to calls for service in Wyoming already know from experience – alcohol is the contributing factor most often present in situations that result in someone going to jail.

### Meth. Alcohol and Other Drugs Involved Arrests



#### SUMMARY OF SUBSTANCE-INVOLVED ARREST STATISTICS FOR 2017:

- Alcohol was involved in 48.83% of all custodial arrests.
- Methamphetamine was involved in 9.91% of the 13,638 reported arrests.
- Marijuana was involved in 14.35% of all custodial arrests.
- Drugs were involved in 23.63% of the reported arrests.
- Arrests for public intoxication accounted for 13.62% of all arrests.
- The average blood alcohol content for persons arrested for public intoxication was 0.2191.
- Driving under the influence arrests accounted for 26.60% of all arrests.
- The average reported blood alcohol content for DUI arrests statewide was 0.1546<sup>1</sup>
- 45% of persons arrested for DUI had a reported BAC level above 0.16 and 9% had a BAC of 0.24 or greater.
- The average reported BAC for 530 persons who were arrested for DUI after being involved in a traffic crash was 0.1713.
- The age group with the highest percentage of DUI arrests was age 26-30 (16%), followed by age 21-25 (15%) and 31-35 (13%).

<sup>1</sup> In Wyoming, a person driving with a blood alcohol content of 0.08 is legally presumed to be impaired.

*To grasp the significance of the blood alcohol content statistics, it should be noted that a physically fit male who weighs 180 pounds would have to consume at least seven drinks in one hour to achieve a BAC of 0.15 – a female weighing 120 pounds would have to consume four drinks in one hour.*

### EMERGING TRENDS

**EMERGING TRENDS IN THE TYPE OF SUBSTANCE INVOLVED IN CRIME:** Alcohol and/or other drugs were involved in 76% of the 13,638 custodial arrests in 2017. Although alcohol continues to be the drug most often present in situations that result in someone going to jail, drug-involved arrests in Wyoming have increased significantly in recent years.

During the last eight years in which data is available for a calendar-year period (2010-2017), *the number and percentage of alcohol-involved arrests have continued to decrease - while the number and percentage of other drug-involved arrests have continued to increase.*

The number of alcohol-involved arrests have decreased each year since 2010. Alcohol-involved arrests in 2017 were 6,939 fewer in number (a 51% decrease) than in 2010.




The number of other drug-involved arrests has increased each year since 2010 (except for one year). Drug-involved arrests were 1,431 more in number (an 80% increase) than in 2010.

*The number of meth-involved arrests has increased each year since 2011 and has more than tripled since then.* There were 1,351 meth-involved arrests in 2017 (there were 420 in 2011).

The Association began collecting marijuana-involved arrest data in March of 2014 in an effort to assess the impact on public safety in Wyoming from Colorado's legalization of marijuana. Data collected thus far indicates an increase in the number and percentage of marijuana-involved arrests each year. 7.63% in 2014; 9.51% in 2015; 12.22% in 2016 and 14.35% in 2017.

The four counties with the highest number of arrests involving marijuana were: 1) Laramie – 259; 2) Natrona – 238; 3) Campbell – 221; and 4) Carbon – 213.

### Substance-Involved Arrests: Number of Total Arrests






## Alcohol and Crime in Wyoming - 2017

**TRENDS IN ARRESTS FOR IMPAIRED DRIVING:** The statistics for persons arrested for driving while impaired mirrors the recent trends for all substance-involved arrests. The percentage and number of persons arrested for driving impaired has decreased during each of the last five years while the percentage for other drug-involvement for impaired driving arrests has increased.

The average blood alcohol content for persons arrested for impaired driving during the last seven years remains at double the presumptive level for impairment – while the average blood alcohol content for persons arrested for public intoxication remains at almost three times the presumptive level.

Although the number and percentage of DUI arrests have decreased statewide in each of the last three years, the percentage of DUI arrests in several counties in the state have been consistently above the statewide average.

**PUBLIC CONCERNS**


*The statistics contained in this report identify significant public safety issues which merit further discussion, analysis and action by local law enforcement, citizens and state/community leaders*



The high percentage of alcohol involved arrests (49%), the inordinate number of arrests for public intoxication (1,858) and DUI (3,628) and the high levels of BAC recorded for these individuals (average BAC: 0.219 for public intoxication and 0.155 for DUI) appear to validate the concerns about alcohol abuse expressed by Wyoming residents in the most recent statewide public opinion survey<sup>2</sup>.

Some excerpts from the survey that involved 4,798 Wyoming residents:

- 79.7% view alcohol abuse by Wyoming adults as a serious or somewhat serious problem
- When Wyoming residents were asked whether they would support a state law that would prohibit selling or serving alcohol to someone who is obviously intoxicated:
  - 64.3% strongly supported such a law
  - 17.9% somewhat supported such a law
- 84.5% of Wyoming residents believe that drinking and driving in their community is a serious or somewhat serious problem.

## SIGNIFICANT STATISTICS AND FINDINGS

This report provides statewide statistics and averages, along with comparisons of county statistics in specific categories. In addition, there are approximately one hundred pages of data in a supplemental report that provides county, community and local law enforcement agency specific statistics.

Detailed charts and graphs included in the Data/Statistics section of this report are helpful in identifying trends involving alcohol-related arrest activity and provide a statistical picture of the circumstances which result in someone being arrested and subsequently taken to jail in Wyoming. The impact of substance abuse on crime statistics varies by county across the state. This report also includes a detailed analysis by county for comparison purposes.

Listed below are a few of the noteworthy statewide averages and county specific alcohol-related statistics and findings from the Data/Statistics section of this report.

- **Alcohol was a factor in 49% of the custodial arrests in Wyoming.**
  - Counties with significantly higher statistics:
    - Teton – 72.86%
    - Sheridan – 68.06%
    - Fremont – 61.25%
  
- **Methamphetamine was involved in 9.91% of the arrests statewide.**

- **178 persons were arrested for DUI with a BAC of 0.24 or higher.**



## JUVENILE/ UNDERAGE DATA


The data in this report does not represent a complete accounting of juvenile arrests as these arrests often do not result in detention in a county facility.

248 underage youth were taken into custody and placed in a detention center this year for being a minor in possession of alcohol. The average BAC was .1253.

173 underage youth were arrested for driving under the influence – 47 of these arrests involved drugs. The average BAC was .1110. Eleven of the underage youth arrested for DUI were under the age of 18.



- 5% of all persons arrested for driving under the influence (DUI) were under the age of 21.
- Juveniles accounted for less than 1% of the arrests statewide (86 total).
- 13% of the juvenile arrests involved alcohol (11 total).
- Four of the juvenile arrests involved methamphetamine.
- 23 of the juvenile arrests involved marijuana.
- 29% of the juvenile arrests involved “other” drugs (25 total).
- 156 minors arrested for alcohol-related offenses reported obtaining alcohol at:



### PROJECT DESIGN AND IMPLEMENTATION

The Wyoming Association of Sheriffs and Chiefs of Police contracted with Johnson and Associates, a Wyoming based management consulting firm, to manage and staff this project – to create the master database, to collect and input data, to author the final report and to make presentations to select groups. The Association has contracted with Johnson and Associates to manage and staff this project since its inception.

A task force comprised of administrators and detention facility personnel from each of the county law enforcement agencies involved in the initial data collection efforts in 2005 determined the scope and intent of the project and provided specific direction for its implementation. In the following years, all law enforcement and detention facility administrators in the state were involved in deciding the appropriate fields for collection of data, selecting the subject areas that would be targeted for analysis and refining the process and procedures for collecting the information.

A supply of reporting forms and self-addressed stamped envelopes were provided to all detention facilities in the state - along with an instruction sheet for processing the completed reporting forms. In addition, all detention facility personnel who were assigned the responsibility to oversee their agencies' data collection were provided individual orientations. All completed reporting forms were submitted to Johnson and Associates for data entry on a weekly basis.

The master database for this project was created in a manner that will allow “harvesting” of additional information in the future should a need arise. The data in this report is presented by “county” and by “department,” by actual numbers and percentages, and by various categories of interest. The information was assembled in this manner to assist law enforcement administrators, as well as community leaders, to better analyze the information and to facilitate follow-up inquiries of notable concerns.

### DATA COLLECTION

A one-page reporting form consisting of fill-in or checked boxes was constructed and refined for this project. It is estimated that the form requires the booking and/or arresting officer two-to-three minutes to fill out during the book-in process. Specific information that was collected during the book-in process include: type of offense, whether alcohol was involved; whether drugs were involved; location of last consumption and point of sale; known blood alcohol content levels for arrests involving public intoxication, driving under the influence and minors in possession; and demographic information. (A sample of the reporting form is included in this report)

A total of 15,536 reporting forms were submitted by the twenty-three county detention facilities and the Volunteers of America Detox Center in Fremont County during the twelve-month data collection period January 1 through December 31, 2017. A complete accounting of the number of reports submitted by each county compared to the number of actual field-arrests book-ins is provided after the Data/Statistics pages.

### DATA /STATISTICS

All information contained in the reporting forms that were submitted by the participating counties was entered into a master data base by week and by month. This information was subsequently assembled by category, by county, and by department to facilitate appropriate comparisons and further analysis.

A detailed breakdown of information for each county is available in a separate Supplemental Report.<sup>3</sup> A sample of the county statistics is included in this report. Natrona County was selected as the sample to be included as this county generated the greatest number of arrest statistics.

The substance-related arrest data in this report is presented in a series of tables and graphs:

**PLEASE NOTE:** Cheyenne Police Department officers have an option to cite and release persons arrested for DUI for a first offense and the arrestee's vehicle has been impounded. These additional arrests statistics have not been included in the DUI statistics in this report (as they were not booked into a detention facility) but are added as a footnote in the DUI graph and in the Supplemental Report for Laramie County.







### Meth, Alcohol, and Other Drugs Involved Arrests




# Alcohol Involved Arrests as a Percentage of All Arrests by County

(Bold line indicates statewide percent - 48.83%)




## Other Drugs Involved as a Percentage of All Arrests by County

(Bold line indicates statewide percent - 23.63%)




## Public Intoxication Arrests as a Percentage of All Arrests by County

(Bold Line indicates statewide percent - 13.62%)




## DUI Arrests as a Percentage of All Arrests by County





### DUI Arrests with Reported BAC in Each Range


Number of DUI arrests with BAC in each Range








# Traffic Crashes by Gender




