
REUNION 2020

Well, Milwaukee is behind us and we are looking forward to Dayton, Ohio. Dates for the reunion are Sept. 30th thru Oct 4th. The Crowne Plaza is easy access off I-70 and airlines into Dayton International Airport include Allegiant, American, Delta and United. There are several non-stop flights out of major hubs. Our hotel offers a free shuttle to and from the airport. Rental car companies at the airport are Alamo, Avis, Budget and Enterprise. We have a scheduled tour of the Air Force Museum on Thursday. Some attractions for individual sightseeing are: Carillon Park, Packard Museum, 2nd St. Market and Hawthorn Hill. These are all great sites that may be of interest during your free time.

Thursday scheduled event:

10:00 AM: Depart Crowne Plaza Hotel, 33 E. Fifth Street, 45402. (Begin loading at 9:45 AM)

10:30-11:30 AM: Dayton Aviation Heritage Park, Wright Brothers Interpretive Center. Tour this small museum depicting the life of Wilbur and Orville Wright and the early days of flight. Includes a 20-minute video providing an overview of the Wright's and their contribution to history. And then the location where the





action took place – **Huffman Prairie**. This is the actual site with a replicate to the catapult used by Orville and Wilbur. A park ranger (if available) will provide a detailed summary of the time the brothers spent in this

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field and guests can get out or stay on the airconditioned coach. Limited walking at these two sites.



12:00-3:15 PM The National Museum of the U.S.

Air Force galleries present military aviation history, boasting more than 360 aerospace vehicles and missiles on display -- many rare and one-of-a-kind – along with thousands of historical items and powerful sensory exhibits that bring history to life and connect the Wright brothers' legacy with today's stealth and precision technology. The newest 4th hangar, opened in June 2016, houses the Presidential planes, along with space exhibits and a guided tour of Southeast Asia exhibit.



- Wheelchairs (30) and motorized carts (10) are available on a first-come, first-serve basis for free.
- The IMAX Theater, within the Museum, will have a show for an additional fee of \$7, for any guest that would like to shorten their walking tour. Show titles and times will be announced on the way to the Museum, for any guest that would like to buy their ticket upon arrival.
- A nice cafeteria is available for lunch (on your own) at the museum.

3:15 PM: Depart the Museum and arrive back at The Crowne Plaza about 3:30 PM.

Sites of interest for individual sightseeing: Hotel shuttle will go within a 5-mile radius of our hotel.



Carillon Park immerses you in the region's history – from Dayton's founding in 1796 through two centuries of expansion, industrialism and innovation. Learn about these revolutionary achievements while strolling through the Park's 25 historical buildings and interacting with the hundreds of artifacts in the exhibits. Meet the "founding fathers" of Dayton (Wilbur Wright, Orville Wright, Col. Edward Deeds, Charles "Boss" Kettering and John Patterson) in an amazing 4D Theater production in the theater. Plenty of time to tour, at your own pace. Where else can you see the original 1905 Wright Flyer III, the world's first practical airplane and National Historic Landmark, the 1835 B&O (Grasshopper) steam locomotive, and the first automobile self-starter?

- This park has plenty of benches to take a break and enjoy the gorgeous grounds.
- Have lunch at the Carillon Brewing Company or the quaint Culp Café. Hours of operation: Monday-Saturday 9:30am to 5:00pm; Sunday 12:00pm to 5:00pm. (1000 Carillon Blvd./3 miles from hotel)



Packard Museum built in 1917, America's Packard Museum is the only restored Packard Dealership operating as a museum. It houses the largest public

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collection of Packard automobiles and memorabilia in the world. Hours of operation: Sunday-Saturday 12:00pm to 5:00pm. (420 S. Ludlow Street/half mile from hotel)



2nd Street Market hosts local growers, bakers, culinary specialists and artisans fill the charming historical freight house. Reminiscent of European markets, it's alive with vendors, people and activity during market hours. Hours of operation: Thursday-Friday 11:00am to 3:00pm, Saturday 8:00am to 3:00pm and Sunday 11:00am to 3:00pm. (600 E. 2nd Street/1 mile from hotel)



Hawthorn Hill is Orville Wright's success mansion. Join the ranks of Charles Lindbergh, Henry Ford, and Thomas Edison as visitors to the world's first pilots last home. Hours of operation: Monday-Saturday 9:30am to 5:00pm and Sunday 12:00pm to 5:00pm. (1000 Carillon Blvd./3 miles from hotel)

CHAPLAIN'S WORDS

Tomb of the Unknown Soldier



Every year, Priests of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese meet with their Metropolitan (head of their district) to get ready spiritually for upcoming Great Lent. This year, our new Greek Orthodox Archbishop of America Elpidophoros decided that we in the Direct Archdiocesan District have our Retreat in Washington, D.C.

As you know, we in the 39th have our Reunion every 5 years in Washington, D.C. So, it was great to go with my fellow priests and experience our Capital and the monuments alongside them. We all know what the Capital and the monuments mean to us, but to priests who have never served in the military, is another.



Of the approximate 50 priests in our group, only two served in the military. Moreover, I was the only one who served in a combat zone and experienced war. All the rest went to college and then seminary to avoid

the draft if they were born in the 1940s or '50s. The younger ones could have volunteered, but it did not fit into their life scheme.

Our accommodations were bare-bones at the Franciscan Sister's Retreat House, part of the Catholic University of DC who hosted us. Their campus is huge and the buildings are scattered all around the area. The center of campus life is the very massive Catholic Cathedral with mosaics and frescos covering the entire interior of the building. Above the altar area, Christ is depicted with a superior physique on the Apse Wall

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facing the people. It was shocking for us to see that he resembles the guys at the gym!

Furthermore, we had time to visit many of the monuments in between the days of lectures and downtime. Our itinerary included a visit to the White House, but it was canceled due to the State of the Union Address and the impeachment hearings coming to a conclusion.



However, the highlight of our trip was offering a Memorial Service for all who are buried at Arlington Cemetery, including Gale Helser. All 50 priests chanted the Orthodox Memorial Service with Fr. Eugene and I leading the group. Since both of us served in the military we were humbled and honored to offer a Wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier.



What an experience and a life-changing event to be able to walk down the stairs and onto the plaza escorted by the 3rd Infantry Division Soldiers who guard the Tomb 24-7. With the assistance of the Sergeant of the Guard and the Honor Guard, we placed the Wreath on the stand. At this point we presented Arms and the Trumpeter played Taps. It was all very surreal for both of us, to realize that we had just done what the President of the United States does every year on Veterans or Memorial Day. What a

humbling experience; I will never forget it!

I opened my conversation along the lines..."I see that you, too, got that free all-expenses-paid trip to beautiful Southeast Asia." From that intro, I usually segue to when and where.

But this fellow said no. Although he was in the military during the conflict (a euphemism for "war"), he remained Stateside for his entire service.

Frankly, at first, I was somewhat disappointed that this individual would display a Vietnam Veteran tag while not having served there. But, upon further reflection, I was wrong to jump to that conclusion. Each of us played a part; some on center stage - others in the wings. We all answered the call to service.

It is true that some volunteered and many conscripted. But the point is that we performed. In my case I enlisted and was "RA", if not "All the way!" As I was preparing to graduate college and lose my 2-S deferment, the draft lottery was instituted. The first birthdate drawn was September 14th – mine! I am a gambler, but never that lucky at the casino.

So, I enlisted as a Private E-0. OK., I realize the rank was E-1, but at the time it felt like zero. I did so with the recruiter's promise of attending OCS after competition of Basic Training and AIT. The Army upheld their part of the bargain and I upheld mine.

We all entered military service accepting the uncertain future and everything such a commitment entails. As in life, the luck of the draw determined where we would go and how our story would end. This gentleman took his chances and remained U.S. bound due to the needs of the service.

For that, I cannot slight him as he, too, did his part, along with countless men and women who served in ways other than deployment...and I thank them.




