BE TRANSFORMED!

(Jer. 20:7-9; Ps. 63: 2-6, 8-9; Rom. 12:1-2; Matt. 16:21-27)



Philosophy and religion have always tried to understand the mystery of suffering, especially the difficult problem of why good people suffer. In last Sunday's gospel, Jesus said to Peter: "Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah." But, today, in sharp contrast, we hear him say to that same Peter: "Get behind Me, Satan!" One might wonder why Peter who was *blessed* a week ago turned out to be *Satan* seven days later. Jesus wants us to understand that if we want to wear

the *crown of glory* we must be prepared to wear the *crown of thorns*, because there will be no salvation without the cross. Often, like Peter, we fail to understand that when we were baptized we were baptized into the passion, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, our Lord. We were baptized to suffer, and to carry our *crosses* and follow Him daily.

No doubt, the material sacrifices we make are important aspects in demonstrating our faith. But Apostle Paul exhorts you and me to do more: "By the mercies of God, to offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God, your spiritual worship." We must strive to please God, and God alone in all that we do and say. To be a living sacrifice requires a true inner conversion. It entails giving ourselves in humility and obedience to the service of God and humanity. Inner conversion is the only way you and I can attain the true essence of our worship. Attaining true inner conversion in this present age is more challenging than ever before. We live in an era of religious relativism. We live in a consumerist and materialistic society. Our youth are the targets of immoral values and pseudo gods promoted by social media. This is an era when many of our religious and political leaders often opt to be politically correct for fear of rejection and/or persecution by their listeners. We live in an era when many churchgoers want to hear feel-good messages - good music and priests that only tell them how good and blessed they are, without telling them about their responsibilities or challenging their values that are contrary to gospel teachings. Unfortunately, we live in an era when the so-called *liberals* have redefined the value of the human person in terms of pleasure. This is an era when parents prefer to "please the children rather than God" - when we worship money rather than God - when sports and politics have become the preferred religion for many. You and I live in an era when the System wants us to believe that God is irrelevant in our lives - religious practice is nothing but interference in our private and social lives.

Growing up and living in today's society poses many challenges to all, especially to the young people. Thus, St Paul cautions you and me, "Do not conform yourselves to this age..." Do not conform yourself to this age of relativism and individualism - where we value saving our own lives regardless of the cost to others. For a Christian to gain salvation while living in an age like this, he/she must "be transformed by the renewal of your mind, (so) that you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and pleasing and perfect." In trying to live out the values of the gospel message, you and I are going to face similar oppositions to that of Jeremiah and Christ. The temptation, therefore, will be to shy away and try to go the easy way. But Christ exhorts us, "Whoever wishes to come after Me must deny himself, take up his cross and follow Me." Like Christ, we are to offer ourselves as living sacrifices, and be ready to suffer emotional and/or physical anguish rather than conform ourselves to the false values of this age, because in the end Christ will come and "repay all according to his (or her) conduct."





MARTYRDOM OF JOHN THE BAPTIST AUGUST 29TH



The drunken oath of a king with a shallow sense of honor, a seductive dance and the hateful heart of a queen combined to bring about the martyrdom of John the Baptist. The greatest of prophets suffered the fate of so many Old Testament prophets before him: rejection and martyrdom. The

"voice crying in the desert" did not hesitate to accuse the guilty, did not hesitate to speak the truth. But why? What possesses a man that he would give up his very life?

This great religious reformer was sent by God to prepare the people for the Messiah. His vocation was one of selfless giving. The only power that he claimed was the Spirit of Yahweh. "I am baptizing you with water, for repentance, but the one who is coming after me is mightier than I. I am not worthy to carry His sandals. He will baptize you with the holy Spirit and fire" (Matthew 3:11). Scripture tells us that many people followed John looking to him for hope, perhaps in anticipation of some messianic power. John never allowed himself the false honor of receiving these people for his own glory. He knew his calling was one of preparation. When the time came, he led his disciples to Jesus: "The next day John was there again with two of his disciples, and as he watched Jesus walk by, he said, 'Behold, the Lamb of God." The two disciples heard what he said and followed Jesus" (john 1:35-37).

It is John the Baptist who has pointed the way to Christ. John's life and death were a giving over of self for God and other people. His simple style of life was one of complete detachment from earthly possessions. His heart was centered on God and the call that he heard from the Spirit of God speaking to his heart. Confident of God's grace, he had the courage to speak words of condemnation or repentance, of salvation.

COMMENT: Each of us has a calling to which we must listen. No one will ever repeat the mission of John, and yet all of us are called to that very mission. It is the role of the Christian to witness to Jesus. Whatever our position in this world, we are called to be disciples of Christ. By our words and deeds others should realize that we live in the joy of knowing that Jesus is Lord. We do not have to depend upon our own limited resources, but can draw strength from the vastness of Christ's saving grace.
