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A Message From Fr. Brian Johnson

January 24, 2021

Mk 1:14-20

Dear St Pius And St Anthony Churches,

Everybody's got somebody-problem is that 'the somebody' may know it or not! I know that sounds like a song or book (it is! musician Hunter Hayes or author Robin Roberts). Today's gospel shows that God has all of us-So it turns out that Somebody has got everybody! Yes, God wants us to be close to Him, so we follow Jesus. He calls us to life with Him, to live and work with Him. And last week we saw that God uses other people to draw us to Him. We heard about Andrew going to get his brother Peter and introducing him to Jesus in John 1:41-42. Then the same thing happens later when Philip goes and gets Nathaniel, bringing him to Jesus (John 1:45-46). We all have some person or influence who impresses the goodness of God upon us. Someone brought us to God or brought God to us!

For me every day is 'Teacher Appreciation Day'! I thank all of my teachers: everyone who has given me knowledge (If I held on to it, it's the grace of God!) and given me a love of learning. Do you remember the old bumper sticker, that said, "If you can read this, thank a teacher!" Every chance I get, I remind teachers to be patient with themselves and with their students, because regardless of what they feel on certain days, they are making a lasting impression in their students' lives. At times, teachers are tempted to feel discouraged about whether they are making a difference in their student's lives. I say to teachers, "You are always influencing their students more deeply than you realize." Ask any religious sister (Sr Michael Marie) or CCD teacher in our Catholic Church and they can tell you about how a student may come up to them years afterward to say how they appreciate them still, or share something they told them in class. We never know the impact we may make on others. But, not that good teachers need such acknowledgment, because another sign of greatness among teachers is that the teaching itself and the subject (God!) is its own rewarding gift! The love of continually learning one's subject and sharing it motivates all good classroom dynamics. I think the internal reward of teaching is what Jesus is talking about when He calls the apostles to join Him in the joy of 'catching people'. He is introducing the apostles to the ministry of teaching and sharing faith. Jesus introduces James, John, Peter & Andrew to the business of 'fishing for men'. They are good fisherman and know the thrill of bringing in a good catch. Notice how as the best of teachers Himself, Jesus even uses the familiar 'trade' image they are acquainted with (fishing) to excite them about their new work with Him of 'netting' souls into the kingdom of God. He uses their own experience to communicate His lesson. And now they will teach by 'drawing in others' to life in Christ by their own living example. (And hang on, because Jesus will have his own experiences struggling with 'sleeping', 'unprepared' and 'uncomprehending' students, too!) As a further glimpse of Jesus' teaching method, notice that in his great 'teaching' of the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus tells his followers that they are to be 'salt and light' (Matt 5:13-14). Like a 'show and tell', Jesus calls them salt and light (substance or elements that enrich something else by 'seasoning' and 'illustration'). Continuing with His pictorial example, Jesus says a lighted lamp is not hidden under a basket, but rather "it is set on a lampstand, where it gives light to all in the house" (Matt 5:15). He tells them to 'let your light shine before others". What one does, says so much more, than what one says!

I see Jesus reinforcing this demonstrative 'hands on' teaching style when he calls the apostles while they are themselves working. Peter and Andrew were casting nets (Mark 1:16) and James & John were in the boat mending nets (Mark 1:19). I wonder how many apprentices Peter taught -not in a classroom, but on the deck of the boat or knee deep in water working a catch or servicing the equipment. The only way to learn to tie a sailor's knot is to watch and do it. These good fishermen practiced the 'trade' of fishing passing it on to their apprentices. And Jesus says it will be the same in performing the 'Kingdom of God' work He teaches them. Jesus says, "I will provide the nets, boats, booms, rope, anchors, sails, anything that is needed, just follow me" (Mark 6:8 'take nothing along... I will provide'). The greatest teaching is personal example. And oh, how important that is when it comes to Christianity where the 'haul' is Christ Himself in person! The apostles' job is to introduce people to Christ, and they will do that by their own witness and faithful embodiment of Christ's own temperament and conduct. Faith in Jesus Christ is communicated through both content and context, which includes what is said, how it is said and by the presence & credibility of the speaker. Jesus empowers His followers to share such personal witness to Him, when he says, "In my name they will drive out demons, they will speak new languages" (Mark 16:17 & Matthew 10:1). Also, when Jesus tells them "Where two or three gather in my name, there am I with them" (Matthew 18:20). As His followers, we only have to make the personal introduction. Our mission work and practice is to only set up the meet between them and Jesus! He will provide the rest! Peace, Fr Brian

Another Saint in Time of Plague: St René Goupil, S.J. (Born 5-15-1608 – Died 9-29-1642)

Have you ever been to Camp Ondessonk? This week we highlight a pandemic saint with a little connection to Southern Illinois. 'Ondessonk' is a native word the Hurons used as a name for Jesuit missionary Father St Isaac Jogues, because of his black Jesuit robe (Ondessonk meant 'Bird of Prey'-black vulture). One of St Jogues closest companions, and the first North American Martyr among the eight Jesuit martyrs to be killed by the Iroquois while serving among native Americans in America-Canada, was the French Lay Missioner St René Goupil. St Rene Goupil was a surgeon and doctor who served among the people teaching the faith but also practicing health care for them. So, Rene Goupil is a good saint (patron saint of doctors) to reflect upon as we manage faith and life amid the COVID Pandemic.

Goupil was born May 15, 1608, and very soon after baptized in St-Martin-du-Bois, near Angers, in the ancient Province of Anjou. His parents were Hippolite Goupil and Luce Provost. Not much is known about his early childhood and education. However, his strong devotion to serving Christ in the missions and his longsuffering temperament suggest that he was raised in a deeply pious and traditional catholic home. He studied medicine, and upon completing school, he practiced surgery in Orleans for a couple of years. He entered the Jesuit novitiate in his early twenties, yet he had to leave within a year because of his own recurrent health problems. He was not able to maintain the novitiate schedule of studies and religious formation (it was not recorded what his specific ailments were, but he had lasting neardeafness for the rest of his life). After leaving the novitiate, he went back into work as a surgeon. After practicing surgical medicine for a couple of years in France (mostly wound care treatments to include 'bloodlettings'), he reapplied to the Jesuits to join their religious missions as a volunteer. He was accepted as a Lay Missionary and was sent with Fr Isaac Jogues and other Jesuit brothers to serve in the area of Quebec, Canada. From 1640 to 1642 he served at the Saint-Joseph de Sillery Mission, for the hospitalized sick and wounded. In July 1642, he received permission to accompany St Jogues back to the mission at Huronia, which would be the upper New York area today. The canoe party was ambushed and captured by the Iroquois. During their captivity, Rene Goupil and the others were tortured and treated as slaves. Some in the Jesuit party still tried to witness to Christ and teach their captors about the gospel of Jesus. Even despite the harsh treatment Goupil underwent, he tried to practice some simple medical care. In one of his interactions with an Iroquois child, he taught the child how to make the sign of the cross. One of the chiefs saw him teaching and praying with the child, and reported it to a tribal council. It led to Goupil's execution on September 29, 1642 the Feast of St Michael the Archangel. As he was waiting to be executed. Rene Goupil professed Jesuit religious vows to Fr Isaac Jogues, officially becoming a Jesuit brother finally. He was martyred proclaiming praise of the Holy Name of Jesus. Many of the Hurons who had accompanied St Jogues and his group converted to Catholicism through the powerful witness of faith exhibited by Goupil and the other martyrs. Rene was canonized on 29 June 1930 by Pope Pius XI along with the seven other Canadian Martyrs, also called "North American Martyrs". The other seven are another lay brother John de Lalande, & six priests Isaac Jogues, Anthony Daniel, John de Brebeuf, Charles Garnier, Noel Chabanel and Gabriel Lalemant. A Dorm at Fordham University Campus in the Bronx is named after Rene Goupil as well as the youth facility at Camp Ondessonk in Southern Illinois which has a building named for him. As a health care worker who was familiar with suffering disease himself, St Rene is a good Christian witness for us today of humane and compassionate Christian care of the sick. St Rene Goupil, pray for us!

- --When freedom is used to dominate the weak, to squander natural resources and energy, to deny basic necessities to people, to stand up and reaffirm the demands of justice and charity.

Almighty Father, give us courage to proclaim the supreme dignity of all human life and demand that society itself give its protection. We ask this in Your name, through the redemptive act of Your Son and in the Holy Spirit. Amen.
