on Thursday 4 February at 7 pm

Gillian Walnes Perry was the Co-founder and Executive Director of the Anne Frank Trust UK. The

Trust was set up in 1990, along with family and friends of Mr Otto Frank. When Gillian retired in 2016 the Trust had a staff of 35, taking educational programmes to combat prejudice and discrimination to schools, prisons and communities in all parts of the UK.

Gillian now lectures on the life and legacy of Anne Frank, as well as other social history topics, in the UK, the US and other parts of the world. She also acts as an ambassador and advisor to the Anne Frank Center for Mutual Respect in the USA. She has spoken at the United Nations in New York, 10 Downing Street and most recently the Clinton Presidential Center in Little Rock Arkansas. Her first book, 'The Legacy of Anne Frank' was published in 2018. In 2010 Gillian was awarded an MBE (Membership of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire) by Her Majesty The Queen for her work in education.



We normally exchange Christmas cards in our WI at our Christmas meeting but because there was no meeting this year we made the decision to donate to the local food bank instead. One of our members Wendy Field has some involvement with the food bank run by St Saviour's Church, and was very helpful in sorting the logistics of collating all the donations and their distribution. She kindly let us have this photograph of the donations as they were displayed in Church. The collection was such a success that we will certainly consider the same option next year. The food bank benefitted, we didn't have to spend time writing and distributing cards and there was certainly much less landfill after Christmas. All round a win win situation. I appreciate that some WIs already do something similar but thought the sight of the photograph might encourage other WIs to consider a similar option.



It was early. A cold, rainy morning in February, standing, waiting for the 'pit bus' which transported coalminers to the local colliery. I had worked in the Wages Office for over 20 years and knew when I boarded the bus the normally expletive-peppered conversations would become more respectful.

Waiting, looking around, in the half light, I saw the mountainous pit-spoil heap, crouching like a huge monster, towering over the village, constantly growling with the noise of the conveyors disgorging waste from the mine deep below.

I knew that in the rain the pit-yard became a quagmire — with deep ruts etched by heavy lorries, greasy puddles punctuating the soup-like grey surface. When I complained to the Colliery Manager, he had said, non-too kindly, "It's a bloody pit-yard not the Chelsea Flower Show." The bus came and I took a seat in front of four miners.

Sat alone, I unashamedly listened to their conversation.

Jock – the burly red-haired Scotsman who had relocated to Barnsley to work in the richer, longer-living collieries in South Yorkshire said, "I saw Jack Jones coming out of the Manager's office yesterday – och! – he would be asking for more overtime – what a creep!"

Sat next to him was David, a slim but solid six-footer, athletic and dependable – he said, "Poor old Jack, he would do anything to get away from his nagging, demanding wife. He prefers to be at work."

Sat immediately to their left was Bill, a conscientious underground fitter, sturdy and reliable, he said, "Yes, I rang for an appointment to see the Manager, but was told he was with Jack Jones and couldn't be disturbed – they would be talking about nothing more important than last Saturday's football match."

The last of the four seated miners was Ivan, a rather small narrow-faced, nervous looking Hungarian who had come to England after the Hungarian uprising in 1956. He was known to be hard-working and sometimes difficult to work with. He was, however, very good at his job and was called upon if there were dangerous problems with the roof supports. He said, "Nah – Jack would be 'informing' – telling the Manager that some miners were taking home 'noggings' of wood to make sticks for lighting their home-coal fires."

The bus, now full to capacity pulled into the pit yard after having 'hoovered up' a motley collection of miners from the bus stops en route.

Making my way across the pit yard I thought of the overheard conversation and wondered how they would feel when the real truth behind Jack's visit to the Manager's office became public knowledge.

Yesterday, Jack had poked his head round my office door asking if "I had a minute." I invited him in. He sat down heavily, shoulders slumped and said, "I was summoned to the Manager's office this morning, when he told me that because of a necessary reduction in manpower – I am sorry – you will be made redundant at the end of March."

A few years ago she started making jam and marmalade to raise funds for Yorkshire Cancer Research. She's always been a jam maker, but decided a few extra jars was a good way to help raise funds for a friend who's daughter-in-law had died from cancer. Then Lynda's husband was diagnosed with Parkinsons.

Before Covid-19 came, Lynda and her husband regularly went to a monthly whist drive in aid of YCR and she went with her husband to a Parkinsons exercise class and took her jam to both venues. In March 2020 everything stopped, what would happen to the jams and marmalade?

She picks her own fruit at home, but a friend has got used to bringing her lots of raspberries, strawberries, jostaberries, blackcurrants and plums. A jostaberry is a cross between a gooseberry and a blackcurrant. In fact, the fruit was coming faster than Lynda could use it, so she was putting it in the freezer.

Not being able to take the jam to the whist drives or to the Parkinsons meetings, Lynda decided to put the preserves on a table at the end of her drive with an 'Honesty Box.' Another friend asked her if she would like some apples, so they were bagged up and put on the table at the end of the drive too. In total Lynda collected an amazing £554.00 which has been shared equally between the two charities. This story restores one's faith in human nature.

How it all works?

On the day, you will log onto Google Meet using the code provided and then you will cook-along step by step live with Raheel who will be showing you how to do each element of the dish in real time.

yo yo's

Ingredients:

6 oz Margarine 6 oz Self Raising Flour 2 oz Custard Powder 20z Icing Sugar Pinch of salt Butter icing

Method:

6

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Cream the margarine, then sieve in the flour, custard powder, icing sugar and salt. Mix well together. Roll the mixture into balls the size of a walnut, bake in a moderate oven Regulo 4 for about 15 minutes or until golden brown. When cold, sandwich two together with pink icing. Makes about 12 biscuits.
