Captivated by this lovely tradition, she taught herself to carve, developed her own very distinct and delicate style, and became quite renowned as a lovespoon carver.

She's had several collaborations with world-famous, lovespoon carver, David Western, and has been featured in multiple publications, including David Western's "History of Lovespoons."

Though some injuries have slowed down her carving in recent years, she still loves to speak about this lovely traditionqa and its history.

She's delighted to be giving a talk at WSCO's St David's Day celebration, where she'll explain a bit of the history, talk a little about the carving process, and offer some insights into the romantic symbolism often used to distinguish this cherished, centuries-old Welsh tradition.

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
WSCO's 2024 Statehouse Flag Raising

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Fond Farewells

P. William "Bill" Miller

Bill passed away on September 17th 2023. He was born November 12, 1932 to the late John and Mary Miller. He was preceded in death by his sister, Betty Stilton (Duart Stilton); his brother John Miller (Betty Miller); his sister Ruth Prichard (Bill Prichard); and his sister Gail Shaw.

He leaves behind his brother-in-law Don Shaw and many nieces and nephews. Bill is survived by his beloved wife of sixty-five years Geraldine (Jerry) Miller; daughter Lisa Wood (Bill Wood); son Matthew Miller (Angel Vercruysse) and Bill's only and much loved grandson Lincoln Miller. Bill also leaves behind brother-in-law H. G. Miller (Carol) parents of Kelli.

Bill had many cherished in-laws precede him: Father and Mother-in Law Edmund and Myrtle MacCartey, sister-in-law Margaret Rader and her daughter Sharon Rader; brother-in-law and wife Ed and Pat MacCartey and baby Pam; niece Kelli MacCartey.

Bill was a graduate of Oak Hill High School, the Mighty Oaks, class of 1951. He graduated from The Ohio State University, School of Business, in 1958. Bill graduated from Capital Law School in 1970.

At OSU Bill was in the Naval ROTC program and served as an officer in the Marines for three years at Camp Lejeune. Yes, he did drink the water!

Bill was employed by Gates McDonald and Co. for many years where he developed wonderful and lasting friendships. The Villa Nova group is still getting together.

After graduating from Capital Law School Bill worked for Thomas Morgan and Associates and Barkin and Barkin. He stayed friends with many of his co-workers at both firms.

Bill played basketball and football at Oak Hill High School and even tried out for the football team at OSU. The only thing "Woody" ever said to Bill was "Hey you! Get over here and hold this tackling block."

Bill loved "The Arts". He won the OSU Strollers Oscar Award in 1953-54.

Bill dabbled in book writing and short stories and gags which he shared with family and friends. Bill became very interested in genealogy. Bill was especially proud of his Welsh heritage. He collected volumes of info and often intertwined this with his stories.

Bill started water-color painting under the guidance of Leland McClelland and Brenda Mason.

Bill's real passion was singing, both in the choirs at Reynoldsburg United Methodist and Church of the Redeemer in Reynoldsburg. He cherished the friends he had in both choirs. Bill found the words for a song called "The Lost Chord". Choir director Kathy Vansant found the music and accompanied Bill singing the song on July 9th this year at Redeemer.

The last verse of the song is as follows: "It may be that Death's bright angel will speak in that chord again. It may be that only in Heav'n I shall hear that grand Amen."

Bill sang with the Singing Buckeyes Chorus and some really fun quartets. He sang and directed Newark's Land of Legends chorus. Some early friendships developed from the "Big Church's" Doubles Club. Bill was still trying to meet with the New Year Eve group. These people became very special to Bill. He carried printed cards saying "I'm gonna sing 'til I die. It's the only way to live." Bill did a little singing at the New Albany Rehab Center two days before his passing.

Bill and Jerry had many wonderful trips and adventures. He loved the singing adventures with JABS.

Bill was a "giver". He enjoyed volunteering at Mt. Carmel East (Emergency) and in Oregon for the Red Cross Blood Center. Bill tutored at Old Orchard School in Columbus and his grandson's school in Oregon. He was a "big time" blood donor. His age and health ended his run at 43 gallons. Bill liked to say "I didn't give it all at the same time." He is now the ultimate giver: Bill's body is at OSU Medical Center helping some young doctors-to-be learn how to save a life. A memorial service will be held at OSU in August 2024 where Bill will be honored along with all the other ultimate givers who donate their body to the Body Donation Program this year.
