A privileged experience

I've been with Agoriad for over four years now, and I enjoy my work greatly. It is not easy work but it gives me a real sense of achievement in seeing people develop, become independent and gain fulfilling employment.

Over the past year there have been many changes within Agoriad, and the project I have

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LLYS LLEWELYN IS A UNIQUE INNOVATION **FOR ANGLESEY**



A new social enterprise cooperation project between Agoriad Cyf, Anglesey County Council Social Services and Menter Môn has provided a refurbished and much improved Café and Heritage Centre at Llys Llewelyn, Aberffraw, on the island's south-west coast.

Building upon the ERDF and Anglesey Charitable Trust investment carried out by Menter Môn, the Café refurbishment represents the final chapter in the redevelopment of the whole site.

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LLYS LLEWELYN IS A UNIQUE INNOVATION FOR ANGLESEY

Mike Dillon, a local business consultant, trustee of Agoriad and contracted by Menter Môn, has headed the project and has been assisted by Emily Robinson, an interior designer from Beaumaris. The result brings a much improved café to complement the holiday cottages, the exhibition gallery, the remodelled craft and gift shop and the laundry which offers cleaning, drying and ironing services to both visitors and local holiday businesses and communities.

The Llys Llewelyn heritage centre is built around an attractive cluster of cottages converted from a range of traditional 19th century stone farm buildings to offer warm, compact, modern and comfortable holiday accommodation. Aberffraw village sits in lovely countryside, just 200 yards from a sandy beach, 4 miles from the surfers' hot spot at Rhosneigr and Cable Bay and is ideally placed for the many resort and leisure attractions of the Island. The area is a haven for visiting bird-

watchers and coastal walkers with stunning views to enjoy (a walking festival route even starts from the heritage centre gate). The local roads are quiet and are a delight for serious and family cyclists. Golf, riding, fishing, tennis and a sports centre with an indoor swimming pool are all found a short drive away and Llyn Coron with great fishing lies a little east of the village.

Mike Dillon is upbeat about the changes to the Centre and the area around Aberffraw...

"We have restyled the image (of the Centre) to recall that Aberffraw was once the most important place in Wales with a golden age under

Llywelyn Fawr (1173-1240) who was the recognised ruler of most of Wales during his lifetime. Until the death of his grandson - Llywelyn ap Gruffydd in 1282, Aberffraw was an important regional seat of the Princes of Wales. No remains of the palace exist, but a garden at the South end of the village still bears the name of Gardd-v-Llvs or "palace-garden." The eisteddfodau, or assemblies of the bards, were anciently held here. History is very important to the area but we've not lost focus of our objectives and Agoriad is able to provide training and very real job development prospects to progress local people into open



employment whilst at the same time providing a café and catering service, an exhibition area of interest and a craft and gift shop for both local and visiting people to this beautiful part of the island."

The Café has been refurbished to offer an alfresco area and the new interior is cosy, friendly and welcoming, where guests can enjoy the extended new menu, the great home-made cakes and puddings and the 'specials board' that changes every day to offer a variety of hot and cold lunches.

Outside catering has been introduced and this has proved very popular for local events. Families staying at the cottages and visiting groups of birdwatchers, cyclists and walkers are happy to order packed lunches as they enjoy the area around Aberffraw and with local people using the Tea Rooms Café as a meeting point a real social enterprise project is developing from the combined efforts of Agoriad, Menter Môn and Anglesey Social Services.

The new décor and the revised space is now ideal for evening group bookings and as the centre has a large meeting room with a DVD-driven large screen television it is proving popular with societies and groups who can enjoy their meetings and retire to the Café for a drink (there is now a licensed bar) and a meal.

Good daytime use of the meeting room has been made as a continuous programme outlining the history of North Wales is available, making it a great place to relax for a while during the visit to the centre. A visit is well worthwhile, and Agoriad hopes this unique alliance could prove a model for future social enterprise projects on the Island.


THE PHILLIP CASE AWARDS


The awards were retrospective and looked back upon the achievements made by many of those gathered during 2007.

led has been the introduction of a business Database to control and record client information to help with work placements and paid employment. This has saved a significant amount of time and paperwork

The database has been implemented alongside a new marketing initiative and it has given us the opportunity to integrate both the data and company listings into a working programme. If a Client is suitable or attracted to a particular job we know which and where the prospective employers are and can identify them at a key stroke. If a prospective employer wants to know which clients are available in any region we can quickly access the information. A new website has also been introduced which gives our Clients and prospective employers a clearer understanding of what we can do as an organisation and what services are available. Our new site is very attractive and easy to use; it even incorporates eBook functionality which is great to use and download.

All this has enabled Agoriad to become more efficient in the services it is able to offer its clients and employers.

Agoriad inspires me to take my role in helping others a step further and I was successful in obtaining a position with an NGO to carry out volunteering work in Africa.

I travelled out to Tanzania in early May this year to volunteer for a period of two months, starting my journey by train, travelling from Bangor to Birmingham, and from there flying out to Dubai before catching the connecting flight to Dar es Salaam to meet up with the rest of the volunteers.



In Dar es Salaam we had a week's training on customs, basic Swahili, instructions on setting up camp, shopping duties and food preparation. From there we travelled by Jeep on a 16 hour drive into Mvae near Singida, which is a rural village in the middle of

Tanzania. Our "accommodation" was an 18ft by 24ft tent and our task, helping the village fund and build a new medical centre. The nearest one to the village at the moment is a 14km walk.

This was an opportunity to be part of a culture very different from our own but in their own way the people shared all the aspirations we see here, of bettering themselves and their lives. Here in Wales we start from a much more advantaged position and it brings home a realisation that there is always someone less privileged than ourselves in whatever context we care to look at. There is also a great opportunity for us all to help our own disadvantaged people make a better life in our own society. My visit to Tanzania helped me realise what a privilege it is to be part of delivering the Agoriad objectives here in Wales.

PATHWAYS - A NEW HELPING HAND FOR THOSE LOOKING FOR EMPLOYMENT

Agoriad is pleased to partner the revolutionary 'Pathways' programme, which will increase the choice and opportunities for individuals who are looking for employment.

Pathways is a new fast-track programme that uses tailored individual support to build on and enhance the New Deal programme aimed at improving the lives of specific groups of people, such as those on Incapacity Benefit (IB) and Severe Disability Allowance.

Agoriad delivers the contract throughout the Gwynedd and Anglesey regions and will be working directly and indirectly with A4E and support networks throughout the area.

The programme offers:

- One-to-one information, guidance and support
- 'Direction Events' an innovative two-day motivational and confidence building event which will also provide comprehensive information on all of the support available in the area.

- Signposting to all of the locally available support programmes, organisations and projects.
- Occupational support assisting clients to manage their condition in a workplace environment. Qualified occupational support workers will provide this.
- Choices free resources, help, advice, support and training to help clients secure employment, including a full job-matching and recruitment service.
- Money advice help with in-work benefit calculations and money management/debt advice.
- Working directly with local and national employers encouraging, helping and supporting them to employ people with health issues.
- Provision of 52 week in-work support to both the client and employer to ensure that the employment is sustainable.
- Access to additional financial support on entering employment and for up to 52 weeks after securing employment.

WORKSTEP

The Workstep programme provides disadvantaged people with an opportunity to develop the level of contribution they can make to the workplace and the chance to progress to employment.

WORK PREPARATION

Agoriad provides this service for people with generic disabilities, learning disabilities and mental health needs throughout North Wales. Clients need to be referred by their JobCentre Disability Employment Advisor [DEA].

R.U.R.A.L

Redressing Under-representation through Reskilling and Active Liaison.

This is an excellent project for people currently on Incapacity Benefit. It provides the chance to develop their experience with new skills and provides a base for the search for further training and employment opportunities.

CITY & GUILDS

Agoriad is a centre for City & Guilds to deliver Basic skills in adult literacy/numeracy and Start IT in line with the Welsh Assembly Government's drive to improve levels across Wales and of course this also increases our clients' ability to perform well in the work place.

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WORKRIGHT

ASDAN - Employability Qualification called Workright.

These qualifications provide a framework for developing and recognising employability skills which have been accredited by QCA, DELLS and CCEA. There are 2 levels: Entry 3 and Level 1.

AGORIAD AN OCN CENTRE

Since 2003, Agoriad has been recognised as an 'Approved Centre' for the delivery of National Open Colleges Network (NOCN) qualifications.

Agoriad has also developed its own nationally approved qualification through the above, known as 'Open Door'. This qualification is available at every NOCN level, through from 'Entry Level' to 'Level 3'.



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
