COMFORT VERSUS AFFLICTION



I have heard the beautiful saying "Comfort the afflicted, and afflict the comfortable" many times; and I love it. I didn't think it came from Jesus or that it was scriptural, but for some reason I kept looking for it in the bible. Finally, I decided to Goggle it. I found out that it had been attributed to many people over the years, but was originally expressed by the author and

humorist Finley Peter Dunne.

Anyhow, it sounds so scriptural and although Jesus never put it that way, His teachings and ministry are simply about comforting the afflicted and afflicting the comfortable in His days. Today, He calls us, His followers, to continue this ministry of comfort and affliction.

In the first reading from Jeremiah 38:4-10, we encounter the great prophet who had to deliver an uncomfortable message from God to King Zedekiah, King of Judah. The message was that to save Jerusalem and the Israelites, the King must surrender to Babylon or risk being destroyed by the Babylonian and Chaldean armies. It was an uncomfortable message and would bring a lot of discomfort to the comfortable King, his family, and nobles. So rather than listen to the warning and directive from God, the King, his sons, and nobles had Jeremiah locked up in jail. Jerusalem was finally destroyed.

In the Gospel, Jesus tells us that He came to set the earth on fire and that He did not come to establish peace on earth, but rather division (Luke 12:49-53). We will be wrong to take this literally, especially when we consider passages like Luke 9:54, where James and John wanted Him to call down fire and brimstone on a Samaritan village. He rebuked them. In the Garden of Gethsemane when Peter struck out at a Temple Guard, Jesus ordered him to put his sword back in its place (Matthew 26:52). Yet He constantly challenged the comfortable religious and political leaders. His challenge afflicted them in no small measures. He was a thorn in their flesh; that ultimately led to their seeking the death sentence on Him - to get rid of Him and have their 'peace of mind'.

Not much has really changed in terms of the comfortable and the afflicted in Jesus' times and our modern society. Many in our world today who should be ashamed and uncomfortable in what they do and who they have become are very comfortable and set in their ways. Anyone who speaks the truth to them becomes the enemy, a thorn in the flesh. On the other hand, there are millions around the world who are afflicted in various ways, spiritually, economically, socially, morally, emotionally, culturally, physically, who need comfort.

When we talk of 'million around the world,' our mind travel to distant places or countries. But in a very practical way, if we look or observe closely, we will see people in both categories around us and among us. They may even be in our family or circle of friends. We may even be one of them.

Jesus calls us to comfort the afflicted and afflict the comfortable in season and out of season, no matter who is involved, no matter the cost. May we be given the grace to do as He asks us. Amen.

CANONIZATION OF POPES JOHN PAUL II & JOHN XXIII

The news media have published a lot of speculation recently about the canonization of Blessed John Paul II. Here is the latest information:

- Pope Francis has signed decrees for the canonization of both popes.
- Fr. Lombardi of the Vatican Press Office announced that the two popes will likely be canonized during the same ceremony.
- A special Consistory of Cardinals will determine the logistics and is expected to convene in September.
- Fr Lombardi expressed the opinion that the canonizations will occur before the end of the year. The most likely dates appear to be Sunday, November 24th (Christ the King), or Sunday, December 8th (Immaculate Conception of Blessed Virgin Mary).

FEAST OF THE PATRON SAINT OF OUR PARISH, BARTHOLOMEW THE APOSTLE

AUGUST 24



In the New Testament, Bartholomew is mentioned only in the lists of the apostles. Some scholars identify him with Nathanael, a man of Cana in Galilee who was summoned to Jesus by Philip. Jesus paid him a great compliment: "Here is a true Israelite. There is no duplicity in him"

(John 1:47b). When Nathanael asked how Jesus knew him, Jesus said: "I saw you under the fig tree" (John 1:48b). Whatever amazing revelation this involved, it brought Nathanael to exclaim, "Rabbi, You are the Son of God; You are the King of Israel" (John 1:49b). But Jesus countered with, "Do you believe because I told you that I saw you under the fig tree? You will see greater things than this" (John 1:50b).

Nathanael did see greater things. He was one of those to whom Jesus appeared on the shore of the Sea of Tiberias after His resurrection (see John 21:1-14). They had been fishing all night without success. In the morning, they saw someone standing on the shore though no one knew it was Jesus. He told them to cast their net again, and they made so great a catch that they could not haul the net in. Then John cried out to Peter, "It is the Lord."

When they brought the boat to shore, they found a fire burning, with some fish laid on it and some bread. Jesus asked them to bring some of the fish they had caught, and invited them to come and eat their meal. John relates that although they knew it was Jesus, none of the apostles presumed to inquire who He was. This, John notes, was the third time Jesus appeared to the apostles.

COMMENT: Bartholomew or Nathanael? We are confronted again with the fact that we know almost nothing about most of the apostles. Yet the unknown ones were also foundation stones, the twelve pillars of the new Israel whose twelve tribes now encompass the whole earth. Their personalities were secondary (without thereby being demeaned) to their great office of bearing tradition from their firsthand experience, speaking in the name of Jesus, putting the Word made flesh into human words for the enlightenment of the world. Their holiness was not an introverted contemplation of their status before God.

The simple fact is that humanity is totally meaningless unless God is its total concern. Then humanity, made holy with God's own holiness, becomes the most precious creation of God.
