Florida Becomes a State

Elmer's Genealogy Library recently purchased a book titled "Florida Becomes a State," written by the State Librarian W. T. Cash in 1945. This was published by the Florida Centennial Commission. In the index there are several references to Madison and Madison County.

The first reference was that persons in the community of Madison were interested in becoming a state and had started to work toward that end. The second reference stated "The Democratic Convention met at Madison on April 14 and 15 (1845.) So in 1845, at the time of statehood, Madison was such a large metropolis area that a state convention was held here.

The first reference to Madison County basically stated that following public meetings in some of the communities that various counties had decided to move forward on statehood. This motion seemed to be encouraging those that had not met or approved such a document that they get started.

The fourth and final reference was also to Madison County. In the index it simply states "1837 census in" (Madison County). That a census was compiled in 1837 was a surprise to Elmer. When you go to the text it states "Returns were made from Gadsden, Madison and Jackson Counties (printed Journal, 1838, App., treasurer's report, unpagged.)" I then called the State Archives and the State Library and no one has a copy of this Journal. I am sure that it existed otherwise Mr. Cash would not have put this story in his book. But sometime since 1945 the Journal must have been misplaced. So at this point we have no 1837 census to publish. We can not even tell you what information was recorded. We will continue to look for this census. Of course, the State did take a census in 1867 and we have already published that reference book.

There were no other references to any communities in this book although persons from Madison County were reported on and even the Chuleotah Anti-bellum home among others was mentioned.

This book is on the shelves of the Library for anyone wanting to refer to it.

Last Letter Written by Ex-Governor Drew

Jacksonville Florida Sept 24th 1900

Dear Vannie,

Your mother is very sick, I awoke up just before four o'clock and heard something that sounded like one slapping them selves, and I called your mother, and she couldn't give me an intelligent answer, and I went in the room and found her slapping he[r] right thigh, and she could not speak plainly, and I dressed and wet over and called Maggie, and then came back and telephoned Dr. Mitchel to come out as soon as he could, and he came right out, and examined her, he found that she was paralyzed on her left side, he left a prescription for her, and said he would be out again in the afternoon, but he has no doubt bat she will have another attack but say that no one can tell when she will have another attack, I write you this so that you may know if I wire you that it is serious, that this is the begining of the end, and that we shall soon be parted, and when she is taken I don't care to live any longer, we have lived together so long that there can be no comfort for the one that is left and I have always wished that I might be taken first, and I may be yet, but I do so dred these paraletic shocks, and when any one has one attack it is sure to be the end of them, we will do all for her we can, and if she does not rally I will wire you Maggie send Nellie money to come home on, but I don't know as she wants her to come until Saturday, have just talked to Maggie and she thinks that Nellie had better come at once, by the way of Leesburg so as to get in here in the afternoon, but she sends a note to her in her letter, I am all torn up this morning and may not have written intelligently.

Death of George F. Drew and Amelia Drew

Bodies of former Governor George F. Drew and his wife, Amelia Drew, both of whom died suddenly yesterday, were this afternoon interred in the Evergreen cemetery in a double vault grave, the caskets being placed side by side.

The funeral was the largest and most impressive ever seen in Jacksonville. Committees from various political and commercial organizations attended in a body, and the floral tributes all representing unity of life and death, were several feet high in the newly made double grave.

The funeral services were conducted at 2:30 o'clock in the library of the Drew residence in Riverside, Rev. V. W. Shields, rector of St. John's Episcopal Church officiating. Hundreds of friends of the aged couple gathered and viewed the bodies, the two caskets forming the center in a pretty mount of ferns, cut flowers and palms.

Editors Note: Amelia died the morning of September 26, 1900. Drew made funeral arrangements for his wife, and then sat down in a chair on the veranda of his Jacksonville home where he died. The Jacksonville paper reported that he died "of a broken heart."

THE FLORIDA STATE ELECTION OF 1876

For eight embittered years the government of Florida had been controlled by a radical Republican Administration. Those Republicans in power had not only fought the Democrats (conservatives), but had fought between themselves as well. There were signs of a slight shifting as the Democrats had made small gains in the preceding two years; in addition, the Republicans were hopelessly split and were fighting with each other worse than they had ever fought with Democrats.

The Democrats saw a chance for victory in the election if they could but find the right man to run as a candidate. The needed man could not be widely known in political areas. If well, known, he would quickly be torn apart by the opposition. He had to be a capable man, but one who was unknown in party politics, something of a “dark-horse” candidate.

On March 17th the Republicans issued a call for a state convention to assemble at Madison on May 31th. They continued in their split. Congressman W. J. Purman and Senator S. B. Conover, both carpet-baggers, headed factions who bitterly criticized the public career and even the personal character of Marcellus L. Stearns, also a carpet-bagger and incumbent governor hopeful. Stearns was accused of profiting from public land deals, railroad bond issues, and from tax receipts. The session lasted four days with the first three days engaged in bitter exchanges of words. Stearns, however, had made certain of his renomination before the session and that of David Montgomery, carpet-bagger and late delinquent tax collector of Madison County as lieutenant-governor. This caused a further break in party ranks and Senator Conover with his followers started an independent campaign. It was almost Election Day before Conover withdrew and advised his friends to support Stearns for a second term.

The Democrats assembled at Quincy on June 7th. Without serious controversy or division, they nominated millionaire businessman George Franklin Drew for governor; N. A. Hall for Lieutenant-governor; R. H. M. Davidson and J. J. Finley as congressman from the first and second districts.

Drew seemed the perfect candidate for the election of 1876. He had not been involved in politics as such, but was an extremely successful businessman, having acquired his wealth through the lumber industry. He could finance his own campaign as little money was available through the party; however, he failed to make a ten thousand dollar contribution as promised by his friends who spoke in his behalf. Drew was not a native of Florida, but was a Northerner by birth and a Southerner by adoption. He had openly opposed secession, but had willingly supplied Confederates with lumber, bridge timber, and salt. Admittedly, he was an ex-Whig and had voted for U. S. Grant in the election of 1868. Drew was known and respected by many wealthy businessmen of the period and had himself acquired the nick-name “Millionaire Drew.”

Drew and Hall campaign clubs soon sprang up over the state, and a list of seven resolutions were distributed. Briefly, they promised [1] fidelity to the Constitution; [2] the rebuilding of the economy; [3] reduction of taxes; [4] free schools for both whites and blacks; [5] opposition to centralization and federal interference to local government; [6] punishment of corrupt officials found guilty; and [7] equal rights and justice to all regardless of race.

Orators and editors of both parties went ablaze. The Democrats accused the Republicans of keeping the Southern question alive for the sake of politics and charged them with dishonesty and incompetence. The Republicans endorsed their own administration as being wise, just, economical, and progressive; then publicly accused each other of being everything but that.

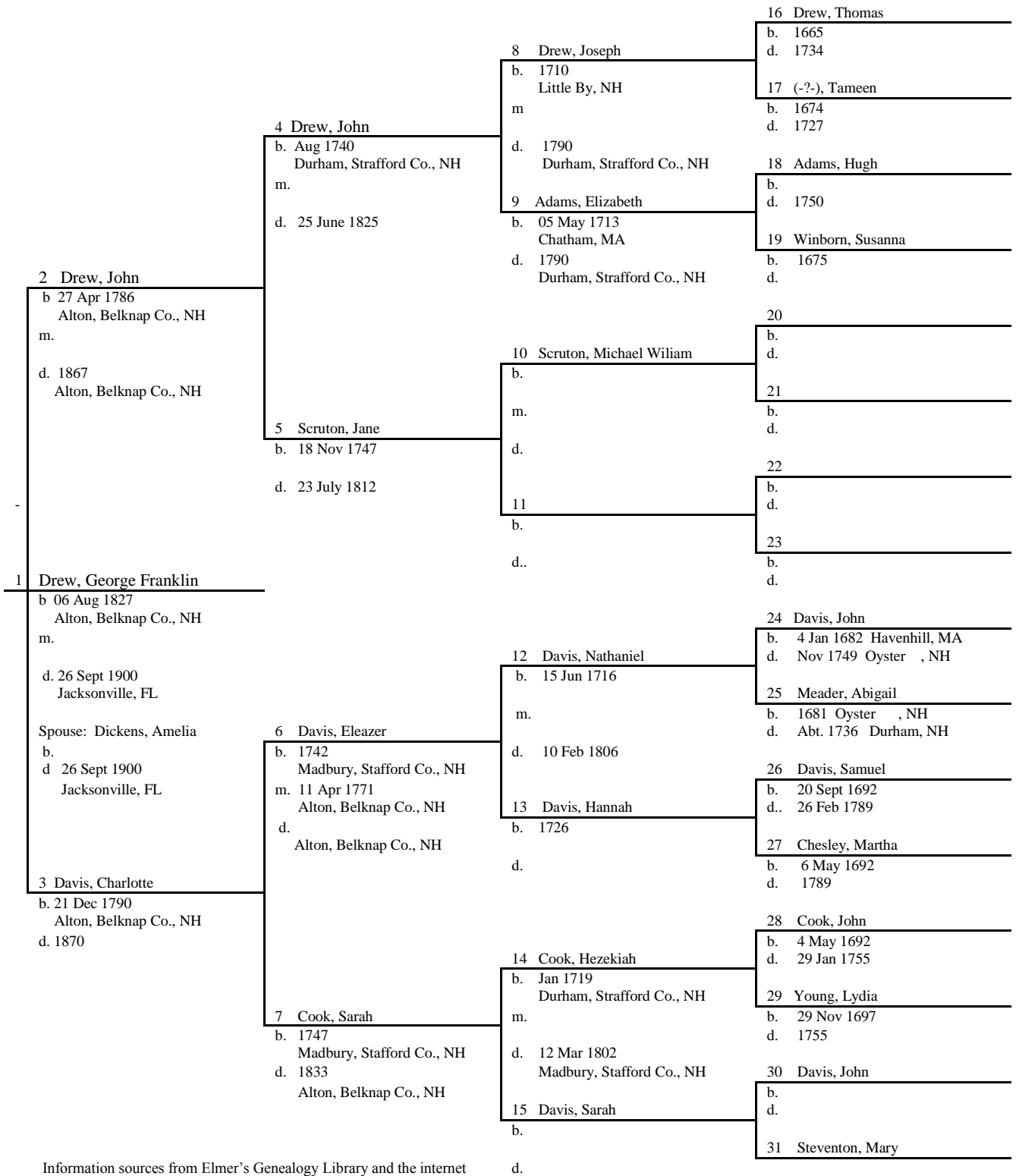
Election Day both parties were guilty of dishonest balloting, just as they were in campaign practices. Testimony was later given that the Democratic Manager in Jacksonville, trying to assess the situation on the night of the count, had wired the Democratic Manager at Madison. “By how many votes will Madison County go Democratic?” The manager at Madison shot back a wire while votes were still being counted and asked, “How many do you need?” It was widely known that employers directed their employees with threat of losing their jobs unless they voted as instructed, and many times employers had them vote while on the job on prepared forms which were turned in later at the polls. Unregistered voters were allowed to vote, and poor whites and negroes were used to vote several times at different polls.

Drew obtained a court order to have the Canvassing Board count the returns from the counties as they received them. In that way a closer watch could be kept with less chance of adding to the totals later. The board ignored the court order and declared Stearns to be the winner. The Democrats made an appeal to a Republication State Supreme Court who issued a unanimous decision in a Writ of Mandamus. They declared Drew to be the winner of the election after a recount of ballots which gave Drew a majority of 195 out of 48,163 ballots cast.

Drew was inaugurated on January 3, 1877 as Florida’s twelfth governor. There were some tense moments preceding the inauguration in Tallahassee when Stearns declared he would not allow Drew to take office. Armed supporters of both men began to appear on the streets. Stearns was finally persuaded by his own friends to drop his protest and to remove himself from the city as soon as possible. In a very peaceful atmosphere George Franklin Drew received the Oath of Office from Chief Justice Edwin M. Randall.

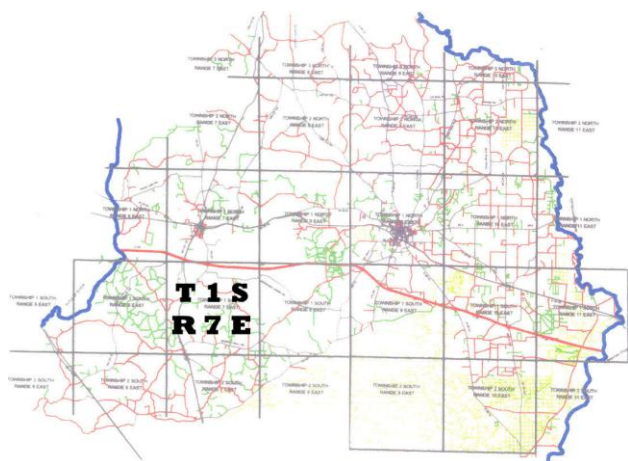
