

ANZAC DAY

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Q: What time does the Dawn Service start?

A: The pre-amble address will commence at 5.45am prior to the Dawn Service at 6am. We recommend attendees arrive no later than 4.30am, via public transport.

Q: How early can I get to the Shrine?

A: You can access the Shrine Reserve 24hrs a day, but the Shrine interior will not be open until 7am on Anzac Day.

Q: Do I need to book/register to attend?

A: No. This is not a ticketed event and there is no requirement to register your interest to attend.

Q: Can I reserve a seat?

A: This is a free-standing event with no seating. You can stand at any location designated for public access. Multiple screens will provide a live feed of the service so it can be viewed from any side of the Shrine.

If you require a seat for disability purposes, please contact Shrine Reception on 9661 8100 or **reception@shrine.org.au**. The Visitor Centre Courtyard will be reserved for persons with mobility, sight and hearing impairments.

Q: Can I bring my own chair?

A: Small foldable camping chairs will be permitted. However, it is not permitted to bring large items of furniture i.e. deck chairs and picnic tables, to this commemorative service.

Q: Where can I park?

A: There is no public parking available at the Shrine and local roads will be closed to public traffic. We strongly recommend using public transport and the early running services.

Q: How can I participate in the Anzac Day March?

Q: Can I wear the medals of a relative?

A: Allowance is made for family members of a deceased recipient to wear that person's medals on commemorative occasions such as Anzac Day. When worn by others, medals should be on the right side to show that the wearer is not the original recipient. These can be the original medals or replicas.
