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BY LAWS OF THE Apostolic Faith Bible College, Inc. Article VII

Doctrine

It is recognized that the true church of Jesus Christ consists of all believers who believe in the saving grace of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and who have accepted Him as their personal Savior. It is recognized and agreed that no organization or man has been granted authority by the Lord to exclude from or accept anyone into the Kingdom of Heaven, as this is done by Jesus Christ only. It is further recognized and agreed that we as Christians are to love all members of the Body of Christ (Christians), and this love and fellowship derives from the unity instilled by the Holy Spirit. Although differences in doctrinal beliefs and interpretations should not influence our love for one another, adherence to similar doctrinal beliefs and modes of worship have bonded together those of the Apostolic Faith Movement as founded by Charles F. Parham in the early 1900's. The scripture teaches us to adhere to the truth and proper doctrine. The common doctrinal beliefs are essentially as follows.

- Triune God; Father, Son, and Holy Spirit
- Creation and Formation.
- Man is basically sinful and in need of salvation.
- Salvation by Grace upon repentance toward God and acceptance of Jesus Christ as one's personal Savior, which is the conception of Spiritual life.
- Sanctification of the Spirit, Soul and Body, A second definite work of Grace by the Lord Jesus Christ.
- Baptism of the Holy Spirit; evidenced by the speaking in other languages.
- Water Baptism (of all believers) by immersion in water in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.
- Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.
- Washing of Feet.
- Divine Healing through Jesus Christ for all believ-
- Do not condone divorce and remarriage.
- Destruction of the Wicked.
- Conditional Immortality.
- Rapture of the Man Child Class.
- Return of Jesus Christ to earth again; bodily and visibly.
- A ministry supported by tithes and offerings.

These doctrines shall be adhered to in the teachings of the Apostolic Faith Bible College, which in addition to other doctrinal teaching approved by the Board from time to time if they are not inconsistent with the above listed basic doctrines.

Church Planting - America's Hope

- Did you know: statistically it is easier for a baby to be born in Asia, Africa, or Latin America to be reached for Jesus than for a baby born in America?
- Did you know: that globally the evangelical population is growing at a rate 3 times faster than the world population, but in America the Church's rate of growth lags far behind population growth:?
- Did you know: one half of the churches in America did not baptize a single convert last year? (88% of church growth in the USA is discovered to be transfer growth.)
- Did you know: every year in America about 3,750 churches close their doors, and only about 1,500 new churches are started?
- Did you know: every month in America 25,000 individuals are converted to non-Christian religions?
- Did you know: every denomination in America that is growing is doing so because it takes church planting seriously?

Christ's commission to "go and make disciples" was not simply a first century command. It is still valid for us today - for you and me - in America. And we have become passive and lazy. The church in America has gone to sleep!

Perhaps you are asking, "Why start NEW churches?" Why not simply fill up the half empty church buildings we now have?

The most compelling reason is that new churches are the most effective way to reach unchurched people. Consider these ratios of church age to converts:

Church age:

- 100 years and older 1 convert for every 75 people.
- 50 years to 99 years old 1 convert for every 50 people.
- 20 years to 49 years old 1 convert for every 36 people.
- 10 years to 19 years old 1 convert for every 19 people.
- 5 years to 9 years old —— 1 convert for every 6 people.

- 2 years to 4 years old —— 1 convert for every 1 person.
- 1 year old 1 convert for every .23 people.

We as part of the Apostolic Faith Movement should be deeply committed to evangelism and reproduction. Even before we launch a new church, we should already be trusting God to "reproduce" or "give birth" to another new congregation.

If you want to be directly involved in evangelism... if you want to obey Christ's command to "go and make disciples"... then give to church planting efforts. Thousands of new churches must be started. WE NEED YOU! Millions may never find Christ if we don't partner together to reach America. And while you pray about giving, please pray for church planters. The church in America needs a huge ingathering of laborers whose eyes are truly on the harvest... on the lost... and not on the ease and comfort of just attending church. May God help us! May God heal our land and save our lost. Amen!

We need to establish a fund for new church planting. Please discuss this in your churches, and at the Bible College. If we don't advance as a Movement, we fall back. New churches are necessary to build the Faith, and the Movement.

In less than two years my wife and I will be attending Bible College, and then Church planting Boot Camp. We then pray that, God willing, to plant a new Apostolic Faith Church in the Miami Oklahoma area. We will need support from the Movement, both spiritually and financially. We will also not do this alone, we will take a team of at least four families with us to be the core and help-meets of the new church. All members of the team are expected to get regular jobs as well as do continuous evangelical work. This job will be hard and draining, but God will provide! A Family Affair

The family, according to a classical definition, is identified as the fundamental social group in a society, typically consisting of a man, a woman and their offspring. We grant that the family in society has changed in the last decades, but is still "Home base" to most of us.

As a youngster I played Junior Legion baseball, and you could be on first, second, or third base, but you were never really safe until you reached home plate. And ideally, family should provide a safe have for its members. Here should be order, discipline, shelter, nourishment, encouragement, training and acceptance, along with love and understanding.

My father had a deep sense of family. His own father abandoned his mother, and his brothers and sisters. His mother died shortly after this, and dad was raised by his older sisters and in an orphanage. He joined the army in 1916, at the ripe old age of sixteen (an older brother signed for him) and they shipped him to France.

And somewhere in all that anguish and trauma he developed a longing for a home and family that no one could take away from him. He and my mother achieved that goal, and all of us, eight brothers and sisters, benefited enormously from their sacrifices.

But my family situation pales and dwindles dramatically when I consider a greater family, where family ties are superior to any we might weave here. A family that can fill the void left by the absence of earthly

family, where even people abandoned as my father must have felt abandoned, could find love and acceptance. IT IS THE FAMILY OF GOD!

Eph. 3:14-15 "For this cause I bow my knee unto the Father of our Lord, Jesus Christ. Of whom the whole family in heaven and earth is named." Here we see reflected the true picture of fatherhood for all the world, providing the pure example of family that has proven true through the centuries.

In Gen. 12:2-3, God promised Abraham that through him all the families of the earth should be blessed. Not through the Law, but through faith; for Abraham believed God and it was counted to him as righteousness.

Then Gal. 10 brings a new testament flavor. "As we have therefore opportunity, let us do good unto all men, especially those of the household of faith." The word household means relatives or family. The family of faith.

Eph. 2:19 describes us as fellow citizens with the saints and the household of God. We as Christians together are close kin. And to be part of this family we must also be blood-relatives. Israel traced its lineage meticulously, because to inherit, the blood relationship had to be proven. To be blood-kin in the Christian household we must be washed in the blood of the Lamb. We cannot be strangers, foreigners or aliens.

The makeup of Christ's church is well defined in scripture. Eph. 1:22-23, tells us that God has made Christ head over all things to the church, and that the church is His body, which represents the fullness of Christ. There is further information in Titus 2:1-7. Here the scripture lists old men, young men, old women and young women. This illustrates the building blocks of the church; the older teaching and training the younger, and the younger giving due respect and consideration to the elder, for the purpose of the edification of a body that has continuity.

The church consists in working form of ever member, from the smallest child to the eldest senior. The church cannot fulfill its purpose as a cohesive body without recognizing its family makeup. Problems arise when we attempt to isolate and separate within the family structure. Such actions disrupt the natural transitions from one Christian level to another. This practice tends to hold certain life-groups in a state of physical and spiritual animation.

We can't imagine thirty year old teenagers, or fifty year old young adults, but if we are not careful we create spiritual generational divisions that may isolate themselves and disrupt the natural learning and growing of the body.

Like the fifty year old lady who still dresses as a teenager, attempting to hold onto her youth when it has abandoned her, there are Christians who refuse to grow in grace and the knowledge of God, never reaching the upward heights one can enjoy when they accept God's life-plan for fulfillment in the family.

You cannot be a stranger and be a functioning member of the holy household. The stranger could not offer sacrifices or touch the holy things. We are made blood kin by the sacrifice of Jesus Christ and the application of that sacrifice to our lives.

There are so many things that depend on our family ties. Our safety lies there; our refuge is the family structure, and everything from happiness to our very existence is woven tightly into the family fabric.

All of us know how devastating it is to an extended family when someone is unfaithful to their family commitment. It adversely affects everyone in the family chain, often having a domino effect that goes on and on. Knowing that, we realize how we disrupt out godly family when we are unfaithful to Him, our Lord.

Let us honor the family of God. We are fellow citizens in the household of faith, and we feel at home when we are in harmony with Christian brothers and sisters. We ought to joyfully say, "I'm so glad I'm a part of the family of God."

If you have doubts concerning your family ties, and cannot claim holy lineage through Christ; join the family. Get you name in the book. And if you already have the keys to the kingdom, strengthen the bonds and let the knots that bind the family together be drawn even tighter.
