

Incongruence in ACA Provisions on PR Calls for Suspension of the Health Insurance Provider's Fee (HIT)

Puerto Rico is exempted from the ACA's exchange mandates and subsidies, but it's still being assessed for the ACA fee intended to fund them. Puerto Rico and the rest of the Territories plans are unfairly subsidizing the rest of the country.

Estimated Impact of the HIT to Puerto Rico Health Care

This suspension will allow for Congress and the Administration to coordinate on the review and establishment of a consistent public policy on which portions of the ACA equitably should apply to the territories without adversely affecting the citizens living in them.

The Federal Departments of Health & Human Services and Treasury possess the administrative authority to suspend the application of the HIT because:

- This administrative transitional relief was formally requested by the local government and the health sector in Puerto Rico:
 - Puerto Rico Governor Letter to CMS and US Treasury (Aug 26, 2014)
 - Puerto Rico Resident Commissioner Letter & Territory Delegates (Oct 8, 2014)
 - Puerto Rico Coalition Letter signed by 9 Associations (Dec 18, 2014)
 - Legal Memo re: Administration's Authority to Act upon request (Jan 13, 2015)
 - Is needed to resolve the ACA inconsistency for Puerto Rico and rest of the territories.
- It would give more time to the healthcare segment to adjust to the impact, considering the current fragility of the Healthcare System of Puerto Rico.
