- **Assessor's August 2017 Report** – Town Sole Assessor Ken Baim
 - The month of October continued to be busy processing deeds recently received. All were brought up to date by month end as the valuation disk had to be submitted for November 1 to generate the January 2018 tax bills. Timely submission was completed.
 - I attended the October Sullivan County Assessor association meeting in Wurtsboro.
 - There was a training on spectrometry and geoportal functions that are available on the Sullivan County website for use in viewing properties from the air and actually determining measurements through the tools in the system at the Government Center which I attended.
 - Mailing of the STAR and aged exemption renewal was completed during October and some have been already returned. There were 100 STAR and 41 aged mailings.
- **UDC (Upper Delaware Council)**- Susan Sullivan gave report
 - Board will be reviewing Laurie's letter and once it is reviewed will be sending a letter to the state requesting funding for the UDC.

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- Regional Park Service – requesting the funding for all unrestricted funds for which the UDC operates; 3 years is all that is required by law and has been sent by the UDC accountant
- Supervisor Carol Ropke Wingert States “this is holding up our Tag Grant as well.”
- UDC is the local representation and we will be meeting with the regional office in December
 - Supervisor Carol Ropke Wingert stated “I would like to attend”

Green Energy Partners Solar Project Fully Operational in Southern New York

Tusten, N.Y. – Today, [Green Energy Partners, LLC](#), and the [Town of Tusten](#) in New York announced a solar energy project that has been generating renewable energy for the town since its completion in late 2016. Green Energy Partners developed the project and worked closely with [Renewable Edge, LLC](#) to construct and finance the 109.8 KW solar system. The ballasted ground-mount solar project, located on a quarter-acre of land at the Tusten Town Barn, is currently on-line and generating electricity. Annually, it is expected to generate 141,226 kilowatt hours (Kwh) of energy.

The Town of Tusten and the Tusten Energy Committee is proud to be the first Township in Sullivan County to install a solar array to offset the towns energy needs. This groundbreaking accomplishment is providing green energy to all of our municipal buildings and facilities. We are inspiring other neighboring municipalities to follow suit and have

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been meeting with and providing assistance as requested. We would like to thank Green Energy Partners and Renewable Edge for their assistance in bringing this project to completion. Both companies have been professional and reliable throughout the entire installation and operations process.

The solar project is part of the town's effort to reduce greenhouse gas emissions as part of the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation's Climate Smart Communities program. Each year, the project is expected to avoid nearly 100 metric tons of carbon dioxide emissions, which is equivalent to the annual energy use of 10 average American homes, or to recycling more than 30 tons of waste annually instead of sending it to a landfill.



Little Lake Erie Bridge Project

- Next month NY is issuing a new Bridge NY grant opportunity
 - Schumaker Engineering said the Little Lake Erie dam under the bridge is in need of repair. Note that this dam is registered with the DEC. This will cost a lot more money and the current grant does not cover it.
 - An option noted by Schumaker is to give back the current grant for \$198k and re-apply for another grant for \$700k, they will do the grant writing at no cost to the town. Due to the importance of the bridge they feel there is no question and we will be awarded.
 - They are giving us a sample letter to send New York that we are rescinding
 - “It is not possible to continue with the grant for the following reasons: The town does not have the financial resources to undertake the project with the revised total cost of between \$600k & \$700k; this includes: surveying, engineering, environmental, permitting, right of way, contract documents, bidding, construction administration, construction inspection, and construction. The original application funding request was limited to construction and did not take into consideration the following substructure is a DEC permitted dam, NYS DOT specification requirement, prevailing wage, substructure....right of way acquisition is anticipated (Town Clerk did just locate the deed showing that we do own it)...based on the above the town is requesting that the grant ...the town will apply for the full funding in the anticipated bridge New York program.” – Councilwoman Jane Luchsinger.
 - The Bridge New York program came out too fast and did not educate the towns so the State of New York is now issuing a new Bridge NY program which will include education in the matter as well as a committee to review the grant applications to ensure that everything has been included in the grant.
 - The dam issue was found by the DEC when they came out looking to see if “we” would need a mussel survey.
 - The original Engineer did not include the dam in his survey so therefore we were not in the know.
- Steve Swendson (from the public & part of the town highway dept.) has shared his concern of urgency, and is worried that the bridge may not be able to last long enough for the town to obtain the next grant.
 - The board replied with thanks for bringing this to their attention.
 - This bridge is the only access for the community on the other side
 - Many heavy large trucks – fire trucks, lumber company trucks, school buses...utilize this bridge daily.

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- Councilwoman states that she did ask if the bridge would last and was told yes but the question on the table now is not only will the bridge hold up for the waiting period but will the dam holdup as well?
- Discussion of a possible temporary bridge
- Councilwoman Jane Luchsinger will contact Shumaker Engineer first thing tomorrow 11/15/17 and inform them of the concern from the town highway dept.
- Mr. Swenson also mentioned the concern of the dam on Cackletown Rd which is just above the Little Lake Erie dam. What will happen if we lose the upper dam and then the next dam?
- Councilman Tony Ritter states that in 1992 the DEC gave a report and the dam was in poor condition then – it isn't any better now.

- Supervisor Carol Ropke Wingert stated that we cannot wait until someone gets hurt, the study need to be done now.

- Would like to hold a recessed meeting to bring the additional information in regards to the dam and bridge conditions.
- Supervisor Wingert and Councilwoman Luchsinger have been working on getting the grant for \$25k form the Sullivan renaissance for the Main Street Deck- we need to get the requested pictures in.
- UDC tag grant – NPS has not approved it yet, “we” are waiting for that.
- Deck Grant for the state- Water Revitalization Grant – more paperwork and deeds... that was just requested.

Recessed meeting to be held November 20, 2017 at 6PM to discuss returning funding for the Little Lake Erie bridge project

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- **Constabulary Committee** – Councilman Anthony Ritter gave report
 - Formed in response to local concerns brought to the town board
 - We would like to mail out a public survey to gain the towns response to answer whether or not we need a seasonal constable. The following is the proposed draft letter/survey:

Introduction

The Town of Tusten is seeking to gauge the public's opinion as to whether there is a perceived need for a seasonal (i.e.; Memorial Day through Labor Day on weekends - roughly 14 weeks @ 21.5 hours per week = 300+/- hours total for season) Constable patrol.

This survey arises from recent concerns brought to the Town Board concerning:

- 1) parking issues on weekends*
- 2) noise complaints and*
- 3) unregistered vehicles and ATV's operating on town roads in residential neighborhoods.*

Currently, the town has a constabulary with three constables who are assigned to the town court for the security of the courtroom and justices.

The town also has a New York State Department of Criminal Justice Service certified law enforcement training program which provides training to our constables as well as other law enforcement agencies for basic courses and annual in-service training. This results in income for the town by charging a fee for those courses.

Due to the concerns brought by local residents, along with recognition of the fact that during the summer months our population greatly increases, we want to solicit the feelings of our citizens on the subject.

Constables' responsibilities would include but are not limited to the following:

Code enforcement officer support

Special event and meetings security

Out of town/vacation/seasonal home and business checks

Elderly and infirm checks

Emergency response support

Traffic enforcement

Service of court summonses

Initial investigation of suspicious activities

Assisting the animal control officer in enforcing stray dog and licensing laws

Assisting local fire companies with traffic control

The constables would in no way serve as a substitute for the Sullivan County Sheriff's Patrol or the State Police. They would be in addition to the already existing services.

It is envisioned that as is the policy in the towns of Bethel, Highland and Lumberland, Tusten's constables

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would arrest or detain law violators to be turned over to Deputies or Troopers.

We are seeking to improve the level of safety, health and welfare of our residents and community visitors.

This would be pilot program which would start in the spring of 2018 and end September 2018 then evaluated to determine if it is a program worth repeating. The constables would be certified as New York State peace officers and have received the required 258 hours of training prior to being placed on patrol.

Such training would be conducted by certified instructors to New York State Department of Criminal Justice Service standards.

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- Councilman Ned Lang responded this afternoon via email the following:

Good afternoon Carol,

It is amazing to me that you as the town supervisor refuses to even take a few minutes of the boards time to listen to a very pressing issue that has the ability to substantially harm our Tusten seniors financially if they require the services of a medic from an NYs ALS service. Let me remind you that the taxpayers of the town of Tusten, the majority of which are seniors, give the Tusten volunteer ambulance in excess of \$15,000.00 in the 2018 budget! This is not a legal issue between Tusten and the Tusten Ambulance, it is a contractual issue that needs some guidance from the town board. You have proven over and over a lack of leadership and most unfortunately a lack of caring for the seniors of our community. This issue has been pressing for more than a year and numerous seniors have received invoices as a result of ALS services that should have been paid for by Medicare, however as a result of the lack of a contract with the TVAS, they are forced to pay between \$800.00-\$1200.00 and you don't want to help them! How sad!!

I am offering free legal representation to any Tusten senior whom is financially harmed due to the lack of a contract between the TVAS and Mobil Medic, to bring an action against the Tusten ambulance in court so they can be reimbursed for this unnecessary cost.

I have asked Mobil Medic to place this offer in any invoice they must forward to a Tusten senior that receives an invoice for these services!

WHEREAS, the Board has determined that the proposed local law is best described as a local legislative decision concerning routine administration and management under the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA").

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board as follows:

1. The Proposed Local Law is a Type II action under SEQRA.
2. The Board shall hold a public hearing on December 12, 2017, at 6:00 p.m. at the Town Hall, 210 Bridge Street, Narrowsburg, New York, to hear all interested parties on said Proposed Local Law; and

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3. The Town Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to publish notice of said public hearing in the official newspaper(s) of the Town, on or before November 20, 2017, which is not less than ten calendar days prior to the date of said public hearing.
