From the Ritual Chair....

The festival of *Shavuot* (שבועות) begins at sunset on the sixth day of the Hebrew month of *Sivan* (or Tuesday, May 30, 2017). *Shavuot* commemorates the anniversary of the day Moses received the Ten Commandments at Mount Sinai. *Shavuot* is the Hebrew word for "weeks" and refers to the Jewish festival marking the giving of the *Torah* at Mount Sinai. Occurring seven weeks after Passover, *Shavuot*, like many other Jewish holidays, began as an ancient agricultural festival that marked the end of the spring barley harvest and the beginning of the summer wheat harvest.

According to the Torah, after the Exodus it took precisely 49 days, or seven weeks, for the ancient Israelites to travel from Egypt to the foot of Mount Sinai. There, Moses ascended the mountain to meet God, who gave him the Ten Commandments, which were written on two tablets to be delivered to the Children of Israel. In ancient times, *Shavuot* was a pilgrimage festival during which Israelites brought crop offerings to the Temple in Jerusalem. Since in modern times, we can no longer bring offerings to the Temple, there are no particular *mitzvot* associated with *Shavuot*. Maybe that's why we find it so easy to overlook its observance. There are, however, some customs that can make it a rewarding holiday, including:

- Staying up all night with your friends to study Torah
- Eating dairy foods
- Decorating your house with vines and flowers
- Reciting the Ten Commandments in the synagogue on the morning of Shavuot

Traditionally, the Book of Ruth is read during services on *Shavuot*. Ruth was a young Moabite woman who married an Israelite man. When her husband died, she followed her mother-in-law, Naomi, back to Israel and adopted the Jewish faith and people as her own. Eventually she married Boaz and among their descendants is King David.

The theme of Ruth's conversion to Judaism is central to this story. In Ruth 1:16, she states, "For wherever you go, I will go. Wherever you lodge, I will lodge. Your people shall be my people, and your God my God." Ruth is often

Sylvia Speaks of Jewish Culture

An Investigation of Origins and Variations

The history of Jewish people in Europe is a tale of a wandering people with some extended stays. The earliest record is of Jews in Greece in the period of 300-350 BCE.

Jews were in the Roman Empire prior to the Roman-Jewish wars. There is possibility Jewish proselytizing there might have been causal in the wars. Jews were in Rome since the first century BCE. Many Jews arrived as prisoners or slaves. Italy has the oldest continuous Jewish population in Europe.

By late antiquity, there were Jewish communities in modern day France and Germany.

Jews were on the Iberian Peninsula as traders from an early age and had eras of varying prosperity until the 1492 Spanish expulsion. Many of these exiles went to Holland where there was a spirit brought on by oppressive Spanish occupation. Many of these Jews later moved on to Central and Western Europe and Britain and ultimately to Eastern Europe. This means, say many, that Ashkenazim are descended from Sephardim.

The 1492 expulsion was followed by expulsions from Austria-Hungary and Germany. This stimulated widespread migration to a more tolerant Poland. Poland became a recognized haven for Jews from the rest of Europe and a cultural and spiritual center. This lasted until the Nazi holocaust.

As early as 300-200 BCE, Jews in Roman Empire came to Hungary as merchants and slaves. By the mid seventeenth century, Budapest was a home to famous scholars, Rabbis, writers and poets; developing into the most important European Jewish community of the time.

considered to be the archetype of all who "choose" or convert to Judaism – accepting the Torah, just as Jews accepted the Torah at Mount Sinai – and this passage traditionally has been understood as her conversion statement.

I once belonged to a congregation where all "Jews by choice" were called to the *bema* on *Shabbat* of *Shavuot*. As sort of *b'nei mitzvah*, we all recited the Ten Commandments. It was such a perfect way to tie all of the themes for the holiday together.







As many of you know, I have been involved with the Cultural Council of Georgetown County for several years. As an advocate of the arts, I have worked with a group of terrific people to bring a variety of art, music and \$cholar\$hip programs to youth and adults in Georgetown County. We are a non-profit organization and often have fundraisers to keep our programs available and free.

On page 5 is a poster advertising an upcoming juried art event taking place in Georgetown. Last year was our first effort to offer an ARTWALK. I know many of you came out to enjoy the art displayed in the windows of Front Street businesses and explore the exhibitors in the parks. There were over 2,000 people at last year's event. This year we are adding three ticketed events: Wine Walk; Saxophonist De'Sean Jones accompanied by Denny Hess (you may have heard him at one of our House Concerts); and Jesse Willis, plus the Long Bay Symphony Chamber Music Concert on May 13th. We hope we'll be able to bring people to Georgetown for a week of cultural arts.

The Georgetown Historical Museum will host a Student Art Exhibit representing student artists from elementary through high school. There will be hands-on youth art activities; children's theatre performances; several book signings; a Wall of Love, Remembrance and Caring to display photos of mothers plus written sentiments. There will be a PhotoVoice Exhibit, the outcome of a partnership with the Bunnelle Foundation's initiative, Opportunity Ready. This exhibit highlights narratives and photos from student and adult interviews about future opportunities for youth in Georgetown. There will be music in the streets by several of our Young Treasure and American Roots \$cholar\$hip winners; a concert by the **Coastal Reaction Band** at the Georgetown Library; and a special Mother's Day concert by Anderson University on the Kaminski House Lawn.

I'm hoping you'll join in the fun and enjoy some of the events of ARTWALK and Art Week!


New Memorial Plaques


