
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

YOUR LIBRARY: The Dorval Civic Library, 40 Martin Ave., has had much publicity but there are people in the city who do not know that there is a city library with facilities available to everyone in Dorval. Visit the library during Canadian Library week, April 16 - 23, which is planned to focus our attention on the services of our local library, its needs and potentialities.

The library has grown year by year since it started in a very small room in the Recreation Centre seven years ago. Mrs. M. Lachance took the library project as a convenership and has never deserted it. By her example she has inspired others to work with her. She has been assisted by money from various community associations, school boards, and the city council; she has been assisted by a varying number of volunteer workers which at present are listed at about 30. They work at the library because they like the atmosphere of books, and want to encourage this type of community endeavour. Totalled, the number of hours of time given to this Dorval Library would be startling. Spare a few minutes of your time to discover the library.

Those of you who have not been at the library for a while will, find great improvements in the extended space, the attractive reading areas, the separation between the adult and juvenile sections. Next week only, the library will be open 9:30 - 4:30 each day for visitors and to provide an opportunity for books to be turned in (without fines until April 20). 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



So reads a recent announcement from Montreal that Foster Parents' Plan, the international relief organization, has now begun its merciful work annong children in the Philippines.

The need is not for the anentities of life, even on the humblest scale," a Plan spokesman declared, "but for the relief of grim hunger and suffering from lack of the barest necessities including housing. The slums of Manila are about as bad as any in the world. The poor live in squatter settlements on the edge of town, just outside the walls, in shacks unde of anything they can find -old tin cans, packing boxes, cardboard. Within SO miles of the city there is so much poverty it is hard to know where to begin."

This is the first new country Plan has entered since Hong Kong, in December, 1959. The Philippines will be the eighteenth country in which Plan has worked. Over the years 76,000 children, most of them now self sustaining, have been helped by foster parents and groups in Canada and the United States. There are now about 3,000 active foster parents in Canada.

Any individual or group can join Plan and become personally involved in the solvation of a destitute child. The foster parent financially "adopts" a child by pledging \$15 a month toward the child's support for a minimum period of one year. This provides the child with a monthly cash grant of \$8, plus food parcels, lothing and necessary medical care. Letters are exchanged, translated both ways by Plan, so that, over the mouths, a very warm relationship is built up between the child and his Canadian foster parents.
