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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

December 2017

Last year, December of 2016, we were celebrating the community's recovery from hurricane Hermine that caused so much damage on the Beach in September of 2016. This December we are thankful to have been spared the devastation that had been predicted to happen from hurricane Irma, September of 2017. All home owners on the coast breathed a sigh of relief when it turned before reaching Tampa Bay, that was a very frightening week.

Our elected HBPOA board for 2018 will be Kathy Frase as President, Bennie Martinez as Vice President, Pat Cordova as Secretary, Margo McConnell as Treasurer, Gladys Moore as Past President, and Diane Greenwell and Laine Wightman as directors with Joy Martinez and Vicki Anderson to finish the last year of their second term as Directors. Let us all give our new board our full support this coming year as they work toward the betterment of our beautiful community. HBPOA strives, through its officers and directors, and our Government Affairs Committee (GAC), to be the voice of the residents of Hernando Beach to Hernando County Government, SWFWMD, and Florida state in matters that directly affect Hernando Beach.

The Landscaping Committee reported that the leaks in the pond at our Dolphin Fountain at US Highway 19 have been an ongoing source of cost to HBPOA. The county has made repairs and has the fountain up and running again but there still seems to be a leak somewhere within the system. County officials plan to shut it down once again to try to find and fix the leak once and for all. The Triangle Park has been getting a muchneeded facelift from the overgrown bushes being trimmed back. We have had damage there twice this year from vehicles going too fast to make the turn from Shoal Line onto Osowaw Blvd. One vehicle took out part of the irrigation system, AJ's Pump and Sprinkler repaired that, then there was a second accident. That accident damaged a hose bib and two memorial benches. John Romanyak from Coastal Pro repaired the hose bib for the community and Don Bowers and George Watkins repaired and reinstalled the 2 benches. 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
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

HERNANDO COUNTY'S ARTIFICIAL REEFS AND PLANS FOR THE FUTURE

Hernando County has had a long history of artificial reef construction thanks to the support of its residents, fishing clubs, dive shops, members of the Hernando County Port Authority and the Board of County Commissioners and especially the support and involvement of County Commissioner Wayne Dukes. Through this grass-roots initiative and continued community support there has been a concerted effort to create viable and diverse marine habitats, while also creating interesting underwater destinations for scuba divers and free-divers. Today there are a total of 4 artificial reefs that range from 15 nm to 20 nm offshore in water depths ranging from 18 to 25 ft depth. Collectively, the County's artificial reefs benefit both the local economy and enhance our quality of life through increasing opportunities for fishing, diving, and spearfishing.

The County's artificial reef projects actually started in the late 1970's with the deployment of Richardson reef, followed by its expansion in 1987, and the creation of the Jim Champion Reef in 1991. These reefs

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

were constructed of concrete culverts and various types of concrete rubble and even a sunken barge. In 1994 and 1995 two different types of reefs were deployed with one reef constructed of 180 reef ball A CLASSIC TOUCH modules (1994), and was simply named the Reef Ball reef. In 1995 Hernando County was fortunate to be part of multi-county cooperative project with the US Army, named Operation REEFX. The purpose of operation REEFX was to deploy surplus US Army Sherman M-60 tanks to create unique fishing reefs that not only serve as tributes or memorials to our Veterans but also create exciting dive sites. The tanks provide both high relief structure and deep cover habitat for desirable fish like both gag and red grouper, mangrove and gray snapper, Spanish mackerel, but also pelagic species including amberjack, cobia, and kingfish. Although the tanks can be snorkeled during the spring and early summer when the water is typically the clearest, scuba diving is the best way to explore the tanks up close. The army tank reef in Hernando County known as "Bendickson" reef was named after a long term member of the Port Authority similar to both Richardson reef and Jim Champion reef (Figure 1). Additional deployments of material have taken place through time at these three reef with the most recent deployment taking place in 1997. It's important to note that the earlier reef projects were made possible through grants obtained from the Florida Department of Environmental Protection and more recently from grants obtained from the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission.

Thanks to the efforts of the Hernando County Board of County Commissioners and Port Authority and, expansion of the Bendickson reef was com-



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pleted in August with 600 tons of a variety of precast concrete structures deployed. The project was funded by a grant through the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission Artificial Reef Program. The material was deployed on sand bottom areas near the army tanks to create additional structure for fish habitat. A wide variety of structures were deployed at three locations. These included three massive 38,000 lb box culverts, four 60 inch culverts, twelve 48 inch culverts, and approximately 300 concrete pipes ranging in size from 15 inches to 36 inches (Figure 2). Other structures deployed included 30 miscellaneous junction boxes and manhole basins, as well as, custom fabricated pyramid modules (Figure 3) constructed by Colleen Marine, the reef contractor selected for this project. All of the materials deployed were provided by the contractor and shipped from the contractor's facility in Port St Joe in the Panhandle with the barge captain transporting the material over 225 miles to reach the Bendickson Reef site.

With the completion of the expansion of the offshore reef expansion, the next project to be completed are three shallow water reefs located within (Continued on page 17)

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close proximity to shore at locations 6 to 7 miles west and northwest of Hernando Beach. This project will provide greater accessibility of artificial reefs and recreational fishing to Hernando County's residents and are anticipated to provide almost immediate recreational benefits since they will be accessible to family's owning smaller vessels. Each reef will be comprised of an array of reef ball modules weighing 1400 lbs each, providing the complex structure needed to create habitat for a diverse population of fish, while also providing interesting structure for snorkelers. The shallow depths of the reefs will make these sites ideal for snorkeling to view many species of fish and marine life, and will become a popular destinations for both residents and tourists that wish to explore the underwater marine environment. The anticipated deployment date for the three shallow will be this fall and is expected to take two to three weeks with good weather conditions.

Once the shallow reefs are deployed there will opportunities additional community involvement through volunteer clean-ups of the reefs and for individuals or businesses that would like to sponsor their own reef ball for future reef deployments. The

Hernando County Port Authority has developed a fundraiser program in which a memorial plaque will be installed on a reef ball on behalf of the sponsor. Approximately twenty-five reef balls deployed this fall have designated sponsors.

Stay tuned as the County continues to plan additional artificial reefs. Hernando County has submitted funding requests through the RESTORE program with \$2,000,000 allocated for artificial reefs over the next ten years.
