Words from Our Pastor

im Collins is a well-known business guru and widelyread author. In his book entitled *Good to Great*, Collins
helps organizations to excel in part by identifying
what he calls their BHAG (pronounced bee-hag) that stands
for a Big Hairy Audacious Goal. A BHAG is a "strategic
business statement similar to a vision statement which is
created to focus an organization on a single medium-long
term organization-wide goal which is audacious, likely to be
externally questionable, but not internally regarded as impossible."

Trinity – like all churches - is called by God to pursue a BHAG. It is to join in the activity of the Kingdom of God by conveying the message of Jesus, by demonstrating the love of Jesus, and by loving our neighbors as we love ourselves.

But we need to translate this call into what Collins refers to as "a single mediumlong term organization-wide goal." I recall being invited to attend a local Rotary Club meeting at which a Rotarian gave what I would call "an altar call." After describing the benefits of joining the Rotary Club and after laying out their BHAG of eradicating polio from Africa, he asked for a response – "join us in this endeavor." I have to admit I was compelled by the audacious goal. I wanted to be part of something that was changing the world.

What do you think would be a good BHAG for Trinity?

One possibility is in the developmental stage. Our Director of Missions, Rebecca DeBreau, is working on a short-term mission opportunity for the fall. However, this mission trip is not to some far off destination but to our own backyard. The opportunity is for us to partner with churches and other organizations working in El Cajon to welcome, befriend, and assist refugees — mostly Syrian at this time — who are coming into our area. This "mission trip to El Cajon" will involve us in a number of activities designed to equip us to relate crossculturally, to discover the challenges that refugees face, to be involved in helping in the settlement process, and to demonstrate the love of Jesus to people in a very traumatic process. More information is forthcoming.

Can you imagine the impact we could have as we embody Jesus to people this way? Perhaps this is the beginning of a BHAG for Trinity – the goal of helping Syrian (and other) refugees to settle into their new lives and introducing them to the love of Jesus Christ. It's audacious. It's questionable. But, it's not impossible.

Please join me in praying for this venturesome undertaking. Also, please continue to pray for our Pastor Nominating Committee and for God to identify the right person for the future of Trinity.

I am grateful that we are on this great adventure of faith together. Pastor Jim

hank you for your prayers throughout the Intermediate Writers' Workshop. By God's grace, we made it through and finished in pretty good shape. The students were pleased with their booklets and put on a lovely closing program for our dozen guests about all they had learned.

I cannot thank God enough for keeping me able to teach all the classes that were my responsibility. It was hardly less than a miracle. Another HUGE blessing was that none of the students or staff became sick, which was one of my chief concerns. After the workshop, I sought out an ear, nose and throat doctor in Oaxaca City,

who immediately sent me for a CAT scan and found a pretty complete sinusitis. Now I am on more antibiotics for that condition, but I feel quite encouraged that this time we will finally clear it all up.

One of the classes we teach in the Intermediate Writers' Workshop is called "Comprehension." In this class. we analyze texts in Spanish for the main idea, supporting ideas, the method the author uses to convey his information or make his point, etc. On the last day of the Comprehension class, we studied the John 1:1-13. There was instant resistance to looking at a text from the Bible. I was surprised at the intensity of the resistance. Most of the students eventually got into the passage as an academic exercise of following and understanding the author's reasoning, but one student, Elijah, would not contribute to the discussion or take

I Would Have Laughed Out Loud (LOL)

od works in mysterious ways. Many of us know this personally. I see it all the time as I work in the church office. If you had told me four years ago that I would be on staff at Trinity Church, I would have laughed out loud (LOL).

The most incredible aspect of my life right now is the convergence of the Trinity Church Bible studies in which I am involved.

Firstly, I am one of three facilitators of the Monday Bible study (Mornings: 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. Evenings: 6:30-8:30 p.m.) We are using Philip Yancey's book, "The Jesus I Never Knew." Our conversations in this class have been wonderfully expressive and lively. Yancey has challenged our understanding and view of Jesus in many ways that are truly memorable. Many of the participants in the class have been Christians most of their lives. It is interesting to see how our

preconceived notions of Jesus have colored our thinking. Yancey has certainly challenged those notions.

Secondly, I am involved with the Wednesday night Bible study which is going through "The Hole in Our Gospel," by Richard Stearns. I led my first Bible study at Trinity Church using this book.

This study, too, has brought to the forefront issues deeply held that may need to be rethought and revised based on the Gospel Jesus taught and how he lived.

These two studies have merged in such a way in my life that I am overwhelmed by our Jesus, who He was, what He did, and what He calls us to do. If I ever think I have reached the pinnacle of my life as a Christian, God is faithful to show me how much more there is to know about Him, His love for the world, and His desire

that I serve this world in ways I do not find easy to do. I am in such a place now. God does not want me to ever become complacent.

As a Christian, I always want to be eagerly ready for God. God is ALWAYS calling me deeper - deeper in my love for Him, deeper in my service to Him, and deeper in my obedience to Him. I can never rest on my laurels.

This does not mean I work to go deeper, but remain open to God's calling - realizing, as Richard Stearns writes, "God does not call the equipped, He equips the called."

part in the exercise at all. This has been weighing on my mind and I am concerned for him. He is like Saul when he was confronted by the Lord Jesus on the road to Damascus.

I sometimes think that the more resistance a person has to the Gospel, the more God can work in them. If God brings him to mind, please pray for Elijah. He badly needs a Savior. And when he comes to know the Lord, he will be a powerful witness for the

Gospel. I also pray that the other students, none of whom are Believers, will have less resistance to the idea of looking at what the Bible is saying, having analyzed one short text from John. And I pray that those words we looked at for about 45 minutes will stick in their minds and work in their hearts, perhaps even unconsciously, and eventually bear fruit.
