My family loved to sit down every Friday evening and watch "Family Matters." Hosea bought back his own wife. 30 pieces of silver was the price of a slave, but he got her for half price. She was evidently damaged goods. What kind of price did Jesus pay for you and me in order to lure us back into His love? Romans 5:6, "You see, at just the right time, when we were still powerless, Christ died for the ungodly." That's you and me, God's own creation. The creation He not only made in His image, but also put all of His love into. We left Him, and He had to buy us back.
